Chautauqua Opens at Kent- ville.

The first tour of Chautauqua to
Kentville opened auspiciously on
Wednesday last. The big tent cap-
able of holding over 1000 people was
pitched on Mr. John Redden's land
adjoining Crescent St., and it proved
an ideal spot easy of access from all
parts.

On Wednesday afternoon Dr.
Wood Superintendent opened with
a magnificent lecture on the events
leading up to the present war. This
was followed by a concert by the
talented McKinnie Operatic Co. who
furnished rare and favorite songs in
solos and quartettes. The audience
was large for opening.

In the evening the McKinnie Oper-
atic Co. gave a part rendering of
Il Trovatore which delighted the
large audience under canvas. Mr.
Peter MacQueen one of the greatest
war correspondents of modern times
gave a lecture for one and a half
hours on the great world war. This
was illustrated throughout with
magnificent colored views, the views
and the word pictures of the lecturer
carried the hearers through the bat-
tle scarred zone and gave all an idea
of the war such as has never been
heard here before. Mr. MacQueen
stands pre-eminent as an illustrator
and descriptive lecturer on the
theme he had in hand.

Last evening another great audi-
ence crowded the tent to hear the
Revue Co. in a concert of rare merit
and a lecture on the subject "The
Calf Path" by Dr. P. Marian Sims.
We have not space to tell of the
merits of that evening's performance.
The afternoon concert and lecture
were of a high order.

Chautauqua is filling all expecta-
tions of the merits of the series of
entertainments. Every one is of rare
merit. The lecturers are men of in-
ternational renown such as we have
rare opportunity of hearing and the
concerts and operas the best that
Chautauqua could assemble for their
tour.

Those who have not yet attended
Chautauqua should not fail to hear
the remaining entertainments of the
course. Most educational lectures are
given every evening.

Today the great attraction will be
the "Old Homestead Quartette"
with a concert in the afternoon, and
their famous drama in the evening
"Robin Hood," an unequalled opera
will be given on Monday evening
and on Tuesday afternoon the Junior
Chautauqua play "Liberty's Torch"
will be presented. Every child and
young person will want to see this.
The afternoon concerts are at 2.30
and the evening performance opens
at 8.15.

ate a letter from me.

The late Sapper Brown, who had
been ill at different periods during
the last year, as your doubtless have
been previously made aware, suc-
cumbed on the 13th., inst. to an
attack of Nephritis. In accordance
with the telegram received from you,
the funeral was carried out on the
16th., inst., the deceased being ac-
cording full Military Honors. A de-
tachment of the men of the com-
pany to which he belonged, attend-
ed the funeral.

In accordance with Military Reg-
ulations, details of the late Sapper
Brown's effects, etc., have been for-
warded to the proper authorities,
and you will doubtless be communi-
cated with in due course by the de-
partment handling such matters.

In conclusion I would state that
Sapper Brown was popular among
his comrades, an excellent soldier,
and the officers N. C. O. S., and
men extend to you their deepest
sympathy.

AMSTERDAM, July 31—Emper-
or William has issued a proclama-
tion, dated August 1, addressed to
the German Army and Navy, saying

desperate efforts of the enemy,"
says a Berlin despatch received here.
