next week. The libel consisted in a

ment published in a pamphlet telling
how the Jesuits had wrested the sov-
ereignty of Austria from Francis Jo-
seph, and would soon compel him to
abdicate in favor of the Pope. The
Emperor was represented to be almost
blind and failing in mind.Prosecution was undertaken at the
instance of the Austrian Government,
as Wiemann sent a copy of the pam-
