YORK LOAN INVESTIGATION.

Officials and Some Employees of the Company Are Summoned.

Toronto, Dec. 23.—Subpoenas were issued yesterday for a number of the officials and employees of the York County Loan Co. to appear before Investigator W. H. Cross at the York County office, Bonaventure avenue, at 10 o'clock next Tuesday morning. Mr. Cross did not care to name the first witness to be examined. Seven subpoenas were issued.

W. P. White, manager of the liquidating company, says at this time it is impossible to estimate the cost of winding up the company or say how long it will take before affairs are in shape.

It is estimated that it will take perhaps four years.

Attacked With Axe.

Napanee, Dec. 23.—About noon yesterday farmers discovered an Assyrian peddler named Saad of Napanee lying unconscious on a fence about fifteen miles north of here.

He was badly wounded about the head. An axe covered with blood was found at the home of the farmer with whom Saad stayed yesterday night. Saad was removed to Kingston General Hospital yesterday afternoon, but it is not expected he will recover.

Appointed Registrar.

Toronto, Dec. 23.—David John Hunter has been appointed registrar of deeds for Dufferin County to succeed Mr. McKim, relieved from office a short time ago. He is a son of W. H. Hunter, a wealthy East Grafton farmer, who was defeated in Centre Wellington in 1891 in the Dominion election.

Found Dead in Stable.

Campbellford, Dec. 23.—James Strachan, a farmer residing at Menie, 6 miles from here, was found dead in his stable yesterday morning. Deceased was a sufferer from heart trouble. He was about 55 years of age, and unmarried.

Eagle Doesn't Protect.

Vienna, Dec. 23.—The American Embassy has received several complaints in which Hungarian officials are accused of having subjected nationalized American citizens to petty persecutions on the ground that their papers were incorrect.

Another Canadian Candidate.

London, Dec. 23.—(C. A. P.)—Mr. Campbell, the Conservative candidate for mid-Lanark, in Scotland, was born in Ontario. At the last election the Liberals had a majority of 192.
