It is a curious fact, and in a line with Japanese traditions, that this bulwark, along with the entire eastern coast of Japan, has been rising gradually higher and higher from the sea for centuries past. Geologists have verified this.

Near the summit of the mountain, which commands a superb view not only of the Pacific ocean but also of the entire plain and city of Tokio towards Mount Fujiyama, there is an ancient and most picturesque temple dedicated to Izanagi, which is the bourn of many pilgrimages.
