

ALL EYES ON IRELAND

Agrarian Outrages and Boycotting In creasing—Bad Effect in England. London, Sept. 29 .- Once more the Irish uestion is coming to the front in Engish politics almost to the exclusion of everything else. Ever since the dissolution of the late Parliament there has been a steady increase in the number of agrarian outrages in Ireland. Simultaneously with this there has been a wholesale and unprecedented application of the boycotting principle in revenge for alleged wrongs of every description, some of which are purely personal, while many others are fantastic or imaginary. The English begin to regard these acts of violence as the deliberate answer of the common people of Ireland to Lord Carnarvon's conciliations and the late Parliament's conces

> There is in England a growing belief that the Irish people regard every concession as a confessson of weakness, and an encouragement to take the law into their own hands for the redress of their wrongs; that the hope of independence which has been fanned in Ireland by incautious speeches has incited the peasantry to a warfare which resembles Nihilism in its methods, and that Parnell is hopelessly unable to control the whirl

wind he has raised. The Tory Government in the meantime is absolutely quiescent in regard to Irish matters. Its energies seem to be devoted to the tardy formulation of the tardy platform, which, it is now announced, is to be incubated for still another week, and submitted at next Tuesday's Cabinet council. All the Tory speakers thus far have fought shy of the Irish question, and Lord Randolph Just Received; A Full Sup- Churchill, who could not well be trusted ply of the above to speak at all on the subject, has been shunted off by a convenient illness. The Radicals have come out plumply with a defiant rejection of Ireland's aggressive claims, and have thereby captured the heart of the average Englishman. The Whigs have mildly endorsed this plank of the Radical platform, but the Tory leaders are still silent. This is causing much discontent and many signs of incipient rebellion in the rank and file of the Tory party. Denunciations of the Government's Irish policy are published daily in increasing numbers, and one after another the Tory papers in London and the provinces are joining in the

demand that the Government shall suppress boycotting, if nothing more. The friends of the Government assert that the Cabinet is powerless to do anything until Lord Carnarvon shall arrive at a decision. The moderate Parnellites are undoubtedly alarmed at the ferocity and the independence of the local branches of the National League. 'These bodies are daily ordering the boycotting of people of all classes on the most frivolous grounds. The branch at Fermoy has just put the Cork Herald under the ban, ordering that it shall not be read, bought, or patronized by any member of MOTHER WASHINGTON! the League, and that all tradesmen who continue to advertise in the Herald shall also be boycotted. Its reporters are also to be excluded from all future meetings of the League. The cause of this action is that a reporter of the Herald, while on his way to a recent meeting of the Fermoy branch, ventured to speak in a friendly way to a man who had already

been boycotted. These arbitrary measures are leading to defensive action on the part of the victims. The loyalists are arranging county conventions of landowners and magistrates throughout the country, and by the time of the general elections the bulk of the people of Ireland may be found arrayed against each other, not on

lines of politics or principle, but on mere neighboring quarrels. In a few minutes the place was a paudemonium. Sticks were used, stones flew in every direction, and the memories of Boyne water marred the harmony of the whole fair.
