## BREAKS HER ENGAGEMENT

WASHINGTON, Thursday.—Miss Helen Squiers, youngest daughter of Herbert C. Squiers, American minister to Panama, has broken her engagement to Joseph W. J. Lee, United States minister to Guatemala, now on sick leave in this country.  
Miss Squiers, who is now in Washington, and is about to return to Panama, says that personal reasons led to her decision.  
"Stories that Mr. Lee was engaged to someone else, who wished to make trouble, have absolutely nothing to do with this matter," she said to-night. "We all hold Mr. Lee in high respect, but he and myself have come to an understanding without consideration of any outside circumstances."  
The statement virtually shows that Miss Squiers doesn't believe Countess Festetics, divorced wife of Count Rudolph Festetics, who said that Mr. Lee was engaged to her, and that she had not and would not release him.  
Mr. Lee, Miss Squiers says, is now in New York, recovering from the attack of fever which he contracted nearly a year ago. Formerly of the Rough Riders, now United States minister to Guatemala.

## MANY MINERS ENTOMBED

FAYETTE CITY, Pa., Monday.—Between twenty-five and thirty miners possibly more, are entombed in the Naomi mine of the United Coal Company, located three miles west of this city, and there is practically no hope that any of them are alive. Their imprisonment is due to an explosion of black lamp at 8 o'clock last night, soon after the night force went to work. It is said a miner entered an old working with an open lamp and caused the explosion. Had the disaster occurred on any other night except Sunday, the number of victims would have been twice as large.  
Only mail force at work.  
The mine employs from 275 to 300 regularly, about one fourth of them driving entry at night, but on Sunday night only about half the regular force go to work. The shafts and the concrete sides are broken down so as to completely close the passage back a considerable distance. About 100 feet from the entrance is located the first air shaft, and from this deadly gas is pouring in in great volumes. The gas found in the mines in this territory is so poisonous that no human being can live in it for more than a few minutes, and for this reason it is not believed a single one of the entombed men are still alive. One man, an unidentified foreigner managed to climb to the top of the first air shaft, but dropped dead there.  
No sign of life.  
No sign of life has come from the others. Just after the night force entered the shaft there was a flash which lighted up the mine and all around it, there was a roar as stones, coal and slate crashed down into the entries crowded with workmen. Then utter darkness followed the explosion, putting out of business the lighting and air facilities of the mine. The mine immediately filled with gases, and several not hurt by the explosion perished while running to get into the fresh air. The shock of the explosion shook buildings in Fayette City and could be heard for miles. In the homes of miners the explosion fell like a death signal and emptied every miner's cottage in the vicinity.  
Women and Children Sob.  
The occupants of these, men women and children gathered around the mine this morning. The women and children cry continually, and stare with horror at the seemingly fruitless work of rescue. The explosion completely wrecked the air system, and that alone means that nothing can live long in the mine. Thousands are flocking to the mine's mouth, where every means known to mine operation is being exerted to reach the men. Aid has been secured from nearby towns. While some hold torches others are plying away with pick and shovel to reach their fellow workmen. What seems an almost insurmountable mountain of debris is between the struggling workmen and the imprisoned men. Some rescuers are trying to tunnel this, while strenuous efforts to reach the imprisoned men by other means are being made.

## DIED IN IGNORANCE.

PHILADELPHIA, Monday.—Ignorant of the sensational developments following the killing of Harry Ferree by A. J. Detsch in her house, 1840 North Twenty-second street, and uninformed as to relations between Ferree and Mrs. Josephine Detsch, who as a child was her charge, Mrs. Sarah M. Worthman died of senile debility in her home late Sunday night. She was 87 years old.

Mrs. Worthman was the last of eleven before Detsch, the injured husband, shot Ferree, and apart from the actual shooting, which she heard, knew nothing of the affair. Relatives, fearing that the end was near, saw to it that her tranquillity was not disturbed and a newspaper was never in her room.

Mrs. Detsch, as Miss Josephine Gorgas, was partly reared by Mrs. Worthman, who had also cared for Mrs. Detsch's mother before her. After her marriage Mrs. Detsch continued to reside in the same house as Mrs. Worthman.

Mrs. Worthman was the last of eleven brothers and sisters, each of whom lived to be more than 85. She leaves no descendants, but is survived by seven nieces and two nephews. She will be buried from her home at 2 o'clock next Monday afternoon, her pastor, the Rev. Dr. John Loughran Scott, of McDowell Presbyterian Church, officiating at the funeral services.
