To Miss Harris belongs the honor of getting the largest head, hers having a spread of 55 1/2 inches with 28 points and a wide heavy web. Mrs. Sinclair made good her reputation of last fall as a hunter by getting another large head. The party were fortunate in getting some fine snap shots of live game as they saw 26 moose, loup-capeer fox, and partridges.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry on proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties.—Six months residence on and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may on within nine miles of his homestead or a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned, and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empt section six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra).

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emptive may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

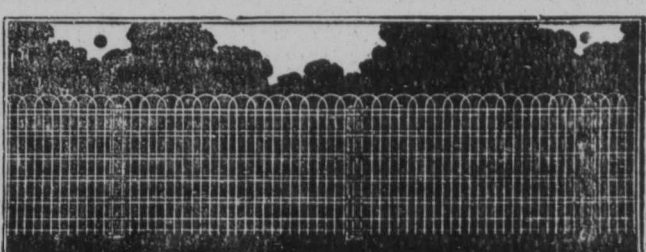
