Town Council Meet In Regular Session

The Police Committee recommended the following appointments:

School Trustee for five years from date vice A. A. Davidson term of office expired—A. A. Davidson

School Trustee for four years from date vice Dr. H. Sproul resigned—E. A. McCurdy.

School auditors—J. H. Sargeant and P. J. McEvoy to be reappointed.

Constable—Burton Somers

The report was received and on ballot being taken the above were all elected.

Ald. Stables referred to the petition presented at last meeting for permanent road to Bridgetown. He had gone over the road and found it very bad. It was not possible to do the work with the money on hand. He would ask that the Committee be allowed to overextend their appropriation by \$1000. It was not fair to town or county to have the Bridgetown road in such a state. The last few years as little as possible money had been spent on the upper section, leaving the roads in bad shape. A start on permanent road making was now needed. A sum should be set apart each year. The Public Works Committee were blamed, but the fault was not all theirs.

Ald. Scribner said Ald. Stables was quite right in his statement re the bad roads. But the appropriation for roads was too small. He favored granting Ald. Stables' request for more money.

The Mayor said the whole Council should be present when such an important question was settled. \$1000 would not touch a permanent road.

Ald. Hayward—What does a "permanent" road mean?

The Mayor said that permanent work means \$3000 a mile for light traffic and \$7000 for heavy traffic. The town should not be expected to keep up such a long stretch of highway. The Government was spending an enormous amount on the road between here and Douglastown, and they should help with this road.

Ald. Stables said he had written to the Government, and he had been told that his letter would be referred to the new Minister of Public Works. The Sinclair Lumber Co., said that if the town cut off Bridgetown they would have this road repaired. Permanent road, in the opinion of the Committee, meant a road with a stone bottom. The Sinclair Co. had offered to widen the road and put it in shape, if they should be given the contract. From here to Curtis Corner could be (Ald. Stables) thought, be fixed with the money on hand. It would pay to borrow money to finish the job.

The Mayor—It is the easiest thing in the world to borrow money.

Ald. Stables said that the Town Treasury could afford \$1000 extra this year from the current account.

The Mayor—Notwithstanding we have so many ratepayers in arrears?

Ald. Stables—The money is in the treasury, nevertheless.

Ald. Hayward favored getting money, if possible, from the government. The town had been very easy with the Government in this road matter.

The Mayor said he felt sure that the government would give something.

Ald. Stables said that when Hon. Mr. Morrissey was Minister of Public Works, the latter had said that he did not see how the Government could give a grant to a town street. If it were granted, other towns with long stretches of road, might make the same demands.

Ald. Hayward understood that the Government had recently helped in constructing roads in St. John within the city limits.

Ald. Stables said he had started the matter going with the government, anyway.

The Mayor said the Government should be first asked for assistance. We ought to get some money on that road.

Ald. Hayward favored giving the Public Works Committee power to over-expend their appropriation by \$1000 for this road and asking the Government to help on the further end.

Ald. Stables said that the Pub-

lic Works Committee intended to start on this end of the road, and work up as far as Vye's Hollow and Allison's Hill.

The Mayor—Go ahead with what you have, and we'll see what we can get from the Government.

Ald. Stables said the Sinclair Co. had made an offer to make good road, widening it, ditching it, and stoning it. The Sinclair Co. did not put their heavy teams on the highway. They hauled to Derby Jct., and through their mill yard, when they shipped via Derby Jct.

Ald. Scribner of Park & Fire Committee read a letter from Chief Dickson of the Fire Department, which said that the firemen needed:

New horse collar, 2 pairs-boots, a more effective fire alarm system, the floor of the fire house repaired, and asking that the fire bell be rung no more at 9 o'clock as the clock could warn children of the streets and the ringing of the curfew deceives the firemen; and also asking a substantial increase of salary for the firemen, leaving the amount to the council's judgment.

Ald. Scribner read the following report:

Your Park & Fire Committee beg to make the following report:

We feel that we have a very efficient Fire Company, and that it is worthy of recognition, but, owing to the appropriation that was apportioned to the Fire Committee for 1915, we cannot make the remuneration as large as we would like, but we have decided to increase their pay Five Dollars each per year to date from May 1st; Engineer R. B. Clouth of the fire engine, to be \$35 per year instead of \$25. We find that the engine has been kept in good condition and was tested last month.

We feel that the firemen should hold their monthly drill and have asked the Chief of the Department to comply with this section of their By-Laws.

With regard to repairs of floor or the fire engine building, we have this under advisement.

On motion of Ald. Scribner, seconded by Ald. Kingston, the report was received and adopted.

On motion of Ald. Stuart and Hayward, the matter of Firemen's supplies was left to the P. & F. Committee.

Ald. Hayward submitted the report of Chief of Police Finley for May 18—June 15, 1916, as follows:

Above "n" less than 6 months, brought about \$1714.20 into the treasury, all but one case being decided in town's favor, and that is not yet decided either way.

On motion of Ald. Hayward and Stables, the reports were received and placed on file and offered to news papers for publication.

Ald. Stables asked why there were so many first offences.

Chief Finley, on being asked to explain, did so.

He said that when the 3rd offence against Mr. Willis had been appealed, nothing but first offences could be brought until the third was decided. So with the second offence against Mr. Dalton. Now that both appeals were dismissed, the way was clear once more.

Ald. Stables said that he had seen Mr. Thompson about moving his house. He was willing to move it, but wanted \$300 for doing the work. He would not let the town touch it. Ald. Stables didn't think \$300 should be spent on that house.

The Mayor—We'll have to let the house stand for awhile where it is.

Ald. Stables—The street above cannot be made straight, either.

Ald. Stuart reminded the council that, after this, no new streets could be laid out or houses built without permission of the Building Inspector.

Adjourned.
