Upper Trend
In Sugar Prices

The steady advance in the price of sugar continues and the real reason seems to be speculation in the American stock market. Wall Street receiving the blame and in this case probably being responsible.

Thursday an advance of forty cts. per hundred pounds was reported. This following an advance of ten cts. per hundred pounds on Monday makes a total of fifty cents already in the week.

Since January 1st the advance up to date has been three dollars per hundred pounds. This being three cents on the pound has been felt severely by the consumer. The quantity retailed for one dollar has fallen steadily and owing to the recent advance will fall again.

Direct word from the West Indies is to the effect that the price of molasses there has been advanced five cents per gallon. That makes a total advance of ten cents per gallon since the market opened in February.

In the United States there has been an investigation of operations by speculators. Although a big Cuban crop is in prospect the manipulation so far has been successful and the price has advanced without stop. The question is how long the speculators can keep it up. It is possible that there will be a sudden break in the market.

DIABETES
LIKELY TO BE
CONQUERED

The Winnipeg Free Press publishes the following from its Edmonton correspondent:

"That a cure for diabetes lies latent in green onion tops, onion roots, barley roots, sprouted grain, green wheat leaves, bean tops, lettuce and various forms of yeast, has been demonstrated through a long series of experiments conducted by Dr. Jas. B. Collip, head of the Department of Bio-Chemistry at the University of Alberta and co-discoverer of the insulin treatment of diabetes with Dr. F.G. Banting, Dr. J.J.K. McLeod and Dr. C.H. Best, at the University of Toronto more than a year ago. The new discovery, it is said, will supplant insulin in the near future. It means the final victory over diabetes."

To Insure Their
Own Property

Ottawa, April 20—The House today adopted a resolution to enable the Canadian National Railways to insure their own property.

In a reply to a query by Hon. Arthur Meighen railways in regard to insurance, Hon. G. P. Graham said that the practice of buying insurance from companies has been profitable to the insurance companies. It had been estimated by the board of directors that the company would save \$750,000 a year by carrying its own insurance. The Canadian National Railways would have a net egg of \$2,900,000 to begin with, from Grand Trunk and Intercolonial funds.

A bill based on the resolution received first reading.

A bill to amend the Industrial Disputes Act received third reading in the House. Hon. James Murdock explained that one of the changes made by the bill was introduced to facilitate application for boards of investigation.

A bill received first and second readings, providing for amendments to the Admiralty Act. Under the bill the governor-in-council is given power to appoint for any admiralty district one or more deputy local judges and revoke such appointments. The governor-in-council is also empowered to appoint for any district or registry division of any district a deputy registrar.

Before the Senate bill to suppress publication of reports of divorce proceedings was given second and third readings in the Commons.

Hungarian Partridge
For Provinces

Suggestions that Hungarian partridge or quail to be imported into the province for the purpose of replenishing the supply of game birds, have been made to Chief Game Warden, L.A. Gagnon. These suggestions have been made simultaneously with the announcement of a new British export industry which has been established for the purpose of shipping eggs of English pheasants to the United States, where these will be hatched and distributed by the American state game farms. The initial export of these eggs is being undertaken shortly when shipments of a consignment of 10,000 eggs will be commenced from England. Special precautions will be observed in the shipment of these eggs, which require cool quarters and daily turning. The Hungarian partridge is at present bred at various places in the United States and provides a game bird suitable to the American climate, while game authorities doubt the ability of the English pheasant to survive the Canadian winter.

The importation of 150 pairs of the Hungarian partridge, it is claimed, would provide ten pairs for distribution in each county of the province, which is considered a sufficient number for breeding purposes.

SECESSION MOTION
IN N.S. LEGISLATURE

Halifax, N. S. April 19—Secession from the confederated provinces of the Dominion of Canada and the setting up of Nova Scotia as an independent, self-governing British Dominion was advocated in the House this afternoon by H.W. Corning, Conservative, Yarmouth, in a resolution calling for a referendum vote of the electors to ascertain whether or not the people of the province were in favor of such a motion.

Mr. Corning's argument was based on several points which he claimed justified the action proposed. The spirit of confederation compact, he said had been violated in respect to the Intercolonial Railway, now part of the Canadian National System, and Nova Scotia, as a part of the Dominion was not receiving fair treatment in the matter of freight rates, railway shipping and other activities upon which the prosperity of the province depended. By her remoteness from populous centres, he declared, Nova Scotia could not compete with Quebec and Ontario in the marketing of farm products, and in addition the markets of Nova Scotia were invaded with the surplus products of these provinces, which did not offer a reciprocal market for N.S. products. Nova Scotia was forced to support this policy of protection duties that were mainly beneficial to Upper Provinces, while increasing the cost of living at home with no balancing benefits. He referred to the neglect of Atlantic ports owing to the indifference of Quebec, Ontario and the Western provinces, impairing of home markets and those abroad due to confederation: the burden of tax that was becoming intolerable; enforced share in loss in operation of a huge railway system which was building up commerce for American ports at the expense of the Canadian Atlantic ports and the intercolonial division of the system. He declared that Nova Scotia as an independent self governing British Dominion would be able to protect its farmers, fishermen, and industrial workers through trade treaties and tariff measures, preserve home markets and furnish employment for its capital and build up enterprise and population.

Mr. Corning asked that the rules of the House be suspended so that his resolution might be debated tomorrow afternoon.

Mr. Corning has been the leader of the Conservative group of three in the Local House. While there was no recognized probability in legislative circles here tonight that the Liberal government party, with a majority of fifteen over a combined opposition of fourteen, would allow adoption of the resolution as it stands it was suggested that the resolution might be amended rather than defeated outright. Probable amendments would likely confine the resolution to an urgent request for more Liberal treatment in railway and trade matters, it was said.

Is Willing To Act
As Peacemaker

Dublin, April 19—It is again stated that Monsignor Luzio, envoy of the Holy See, is willing to act as peacemaker in the present conflict between the Free Staters and Republicans if invited to do so, it is stated on good authority. Mgr. Luzio came here recently with credentials from Cardinal Gasparri, papal secretary of state, to investigate conditions in Southern Ireland. Some years ago Mgr. Luzio was on the staff of Maynooth University.
