The Powers are apparently reconciled t the situation. Neither Japan nor Britain has any intention of intervening in any way in China, much less o imposing a form of government. The general feeling here is that the only alternative to the present situation is for the representative of the Imperia Government at Pekin to yield.

So far as known no reply has been receive from Yuan Shi Kai, the Imperial Premier, in regard to the establishmen of a Republic, which is insisted on by the revolutionaries.
