LATEST From the Front.

Messages Received Previous to 9 a.m.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, July 22.
The Governor, Newfoundland:
The French Government report enemy attacks repulsed in the Vosges; also successful air raids on railway stations at Colmar, Conflans and Autey.
The Russian Government report a local success on the right bank of the Narv; and the enemy offensive checked on certain portions of the Lublin-Chelm front.
The Italian Government report increasingly intense fighting on the Isonzo front. Part of the heights commanding Gorizia were captured. About 3,500 prisoners have been taken during the last three days.

BONAR LAW.

FISCAL CHANGES PROBABLE.
LONDON, July 22.
Under the present exceptional circumstances, the question of further taxation of imports needs serious consideration, and the Government and Chancellor of the Exchequer will give the matter early attention, said Premier Asquith to-day to a deputation of bankers and merchants which interviewed him for the purpose of urging greater national economy, increased taxation of imported goods, as well as of a tax on smaller incomes. The Premier said he was in full agreement with the deputation. The country had not gone far enough in providing additional resources from taxation for carrying on the war. He for a long while had been of the opinion that the present income tax was very arbitrary, and that it ought to begin on a lower scale. As to direct taxation, it was obvious that if credit was to be maintained, the pecuniary resources needed for the effective conduct of the war must be procured. The consumption of imports must be diminished and the export trade maintained on an increased scale. The question must be dealt with as a whole, and not by piece-meal in the budget.

AROUND THE EUPHRATES.

LONDON, July 22.
The British have occupied Suseh Sheykh on the Euphrates River in Arabia, according to an official report issued to-day.

NO MARINE LOSSES FOR A WEEK.

LONDON, July 22.
So far as British vessels are concerned, the German submarines drew a blank during the week ending yesterday. Not a single British merchant ship or fishing craft was sunk. This was the first week since the commencement of the war that some loss of British shipping has not been occasioned by either German cruisers, mines or submarines. During the week under review more than 120 vessels of more than three hundred tons each, arrived at or departed from ports of the United Kingdom.

FROM THE DARDANELLES.

LONDON, July 22.
The latest official report received from General Sir Ian Hamilton says: In the northern section of operations a raiding party rushed a trench in front of our line during the night of July 18th. All the enemy fled except one, who was killed. On July 19th an anti-aircraft gun was located and hit with the second round from one of our guns. The fifth round blew it into the air.
In the southern area the Turks on July 18th made an attack on some newly-constructed trenches in the French section, but were repulsed with ease. In the British section, there has been steady progress daily, consolidating, and in some cases extending the trenches won on the 12th and 13th.
Yesterday, 21st, a small rebound was captured with insignificant loss. A successful attack was made on a part of a communication trench held by the enemy. A Turkish machine gun opposite to it was knocked out by French artillery.
Both sections of the enemy's artillery have been active.

SERVICE OF PRAYER IN RUSSIA.

PETROGRAD, July 22.
In the order of the day issued in connection with the services of prayer being held throughout Russia to-day, Grand Duke Nicholas calls upon the troops to accomplish fresh deeds, and achieve a victorious end to the great battle now raging.

FRENCH REPORT.

PARIS, July 22.
Westward of Muenster in Alsace, ten miles west southwest of Colmar, a set-back by us was followed by nine German counter-attacks, despite heavy losses. Two battalions of Chasseurs holding our positions held the enemy's troops, and inflicted heavy losses upon them. We captured and held a trench in the neighborhood, 150 metres in length, and maintained all our previous positions. To the north of Muenster our forces organized the positions they had conquered on the crest of La Lique. We took 107 prisoners.
Our aviators dropped eight bombs of 50 and four of 150 millimetres on the station at Autry, northwest of Binarville.
In the Dardanelles quiet prevailed since our success on July 12th and 13th.

TYPHUS EPIDEMIC UNDER CONTROL.

WASHINGTON, July 22.
The American Vice-Consul at Belgrade reported to-day that the typhus epidemic in Serbia and Montenegro was under control. The Red Cross officials have notified the Rockefeller

to provide any necessary funds in co-operation with the Red Cross for completing the work and putting that part of the European War zone under the jurisdiction of the American sanitary commission.

CONSULS LEAVE WARSAW.

WASHINGTON, July 22.
The American Consul at Warsaw cabled the State Department to-day, that the Belgian Consul had left Warsaw. The States' Consulate has taken charge of the affairs of both Belgium and Serbia there.

MACHINE GUNS PROMISED.

OTTAWA, July 22.
Subscriptions sufficient for the purchase of 1,000 machine guns, have, so far, been received by the Government. The principal contribution comes from Ontario, the Provincial Government having contributed half a million dollars. One hundred thousand each has been received from Huntley Drummond and James Caruthers, of Montreal, while various other sums range from \$10 to \$5,000 from individual clubs and various institutions.

STEAMERS RELEASED.

LONDON, July 22.
The Danish steamers Virginia and Curra, under detention at Kirkwall, have been released.

NEUTRAL SHIPS DESTROYED.

LONDON, July 22.
The Swedish barque Capella and the Norwegian barque Nordlyset, both timber laden and bound for England, have been set on fire in the North Sea, by German submarines. The crews were saved.

SIR SANFORD FLEMING DEAD.

HALIFAX, July 22.
Sir Sanford Fleming died this morning of pneumonia, aged 83 years.

BAYONNE STRIKE FATALITIES.

NEW YORK, July 22.
Whether the militia will be called out to preserve order, was the question to-night in Bayonne, where two more men were killed to-day in a fight between striking employees of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, and armed guards, bringing the total deaths up to three, since the inception of the strike. Wilbur F. Sadler, Adjutant General of New Jersey, has been ordered to Bayonne, and on his report rests the calling of the militia. A development to-night which may have the effect of helping to end the strike, was the acceptance by the strikers of the offer of five city commissioners to act as arbitrators. The strikers will present their demands for fifteen per cent. increase in wages in writing to the commissioners to-morrow, and the latter will lay them before the Standard Oil Plant officials.

Furriers do Well.

Foxes were numerous and the number of black and silver fox skins taken was the largest on record. Sagona Back from Labrador.

The s.s. Sagona, Capt. W. Parsons, arrived in port from Labrador at 7 o'clock last evening having been as far north as Ford's Harbor. Dense fog was experienced both going and returning, and the ship was compelled to steam very slowly through the Straits. Capt. Parsons brings the following report of the codfishery:—
Cape Harrison—A good sign; Holton, Brig Harbor and Indian Tackles, just a sign; White Bears, a sign; Horse Harbor, traps from 50 to 100 qts.; Emily Harbor, traps from 50 to 100 qts.; Indian Harbor to Flat Islands, doing well; Sand Banks, two crews with 300 and 250 qts., respectively; Griffin's Harbor, doing a little; Batteau and Smokey, traps getting from 50 to 100 qts.; Flat Island south to Battle Harbor, doing a little; Chimney Tackle (Straits), doing well. The Sagona brought a small freight and as passengers Messrs. Tobin and Dewa, Miss O'Brien in a tug, and 10 second class.
