### Sir Ian Hamilton.

Sir Ian Hamilton suggests the romance of war, says Alfred G. Gardner in Atlantic Monthly. In temperament and appearance he is the cavalier, and very little effort of the imagination is needed to picture him fighting a forlorn battle for the hopeless Stuart cause.

He is without the tragic seriousness of Montrose, perhaps without that depth of intensity that give Montrose so enduring a hold on the imagination; but it is the spirit of Montrose that he recalls in his mingling of the poet and the adventurer, and if there is any distrust of him at all, it proceeds from the pedestrian fear that a man who looks so much like an embodiment of romance cannot at the same time possess the humdrum qualities of the organizer of victory.

Now Sir Ian Hamilton has not only committed the fatal error of publishing poetry, but he carries in every lineament the impress of the poet and of the man of romantic ancestry and taste. He is the painter's soldier, and with his tall, spare figure, his mobile, aristocratic features and dark eyes, gives the impression that his main function in life is to adorn the walls of the Royal Academy and then to die a heroic death on behalf of some mistaken loyalty, and with a cavalier just upon his lips.

And, indeed, there is no doubt that the natural instinct of the man is a chivalrous intrepidity rather than a calculating caution. The withered hand and wrist serve as a reminder of that. For that a souvenir of that memorable day, thirty years ago, when the young lieutenant of the Ninety-second Highlanders shared in the disaster on Majuba Hill, and gave the first conspicuous expression of the stuff that was in him.

But though he has the Highlander's love of the charge, it would be a profound mistake to regard him simply as a brilliant adventurer of the battle field. He is that, but he is more than that. When Lord Roberts, not long before his death, was asked whom among the generals of the British Army he regarded as the ablest commander in the field, he replied, "Ian Hamilton." The judgement was disputable but not indefensible; and it was founded, not on Hamilton's audacity, but on his knowledge and on his coolness in directing the complex movements of the battle field.

Like General French, he has been a serious student of war all his life. As a youth he went to Germany and from the old Hanoverian, General Dammer, acquired the strategy that had made the Prussians the military masters of Europe. And since then he has learned to apply and qualify that science by the actual experience of war in many fields—in India, in Egypt, in South Africa.

The operations in Gallipoli are as formidable as any that a military commander has ever had to face. They call for daring, for swift inspiration, but they call also for caution and calm judgment. On the first gate of Buzurane there was inscribed the words, "Be bold;" on the second, "Be bold and ever more bold;" on the third, "Be not too bold." These are the invisible inscriptions on the gates of the Dardanelles. There is

confidence that Sir Ian Hamilton has the vision to see them and understand their mingled warning and challenge.—Ex.

### D'Annunzio in Sky Comforted Trieste.

Tells How He Flew Over City in Aeroplane and Dropped Message to the People.

Venice, Aug. 16.—Lieutenant Gabriele d'Annunzio, authorized by his military superiors, has consented to give some particulars of his flight over Trieste, in an aeroplane driven by Naval Commander Miraglia d'Annunzio. The latter, who has perfected himself as an aviator since he entered the army, received his first lessons from the American aviator Curtiss, with whom he flew for the first time at Brescia some eight years ago.

The poet said the martyr city of Trieste, "Sister Queen of the Adriatic with Venice," looked more imposing than ever in her desolation, seen from a height of over 3,000 feet. Their first thought, despite the attacks of the enemy, who immediately fired from all quarters on the aeroplane, was to throw into the city little sandbags surmounted by Italian flags, containing d'Annunzio's message to the people of Trieste. It read:

"Courage, brothers! Courage! Perseverance! We will free you soon. We are fighting without cessation, in Trentino Province, in Cadore, in the Carnia Alps, on the Isonzo, we daily gain ground. Every effort of the enemy is repulsed by the valor of our soldiers, every impudent lie of our enemy is pricked by our bayonet. We have already over 20,000 prisoners. Soon the whole Carso will be conquered.

"I tell you, swear to you, brothers, our victory is sure. Italy's flag will soon be hoisted on your Arsenal, on the sacred Hill of Giusto.

"Courage, Perseverance! Your martyrdom approaches its end. Our rejoicing is imminent.

"From the height of these Italian wings, which the brave Miraglia conducts, I send you this message and my heart.—I, Gabriele d'Annunzio, in the sky of our fatherland."

### Bulgarian Loan Held Up

London, August 16.—A Rome despatch to The Daily Telegraph says: "New difficulties have arisen in connection with the payment of the first part of the German loan to Bulgaria. Austro-German bankers are imposing extraordinary conditions which Bulgaria cannot accept. It appears that the bankers cannot dispose of so much gold and offer an equivalent amount in German and Austrian paper. In fine, the loan runs the risk of postponement or abandonment.

"Difficulties of a similar kind have also arisen between Bulgaria and Turkey in regard to the Dedeagatch-Adrianople Railway. Turkey is proposing conditions which are extravagant and unacceptable."

Have \$2,000,000 for Machine Guns.

Ottawa, Aug. 14.—The firm of John Bertram and Sons, of Dundas, Ont., of which General Bertram, chairman of the Shell Committee, is president, has given \$10,000 toward the supply of machine guns to the Canadian troops, enough to buy ten guns. A request accompanies the contribution that the guns be given to that section of the First Battalion, First Brigade, which is composed of men from Wentworth and Dundas.

It is understood that the total contribution now received by the Militia Department for machine guns amount to \$2,000,000, enough to buy 2,000 guns.

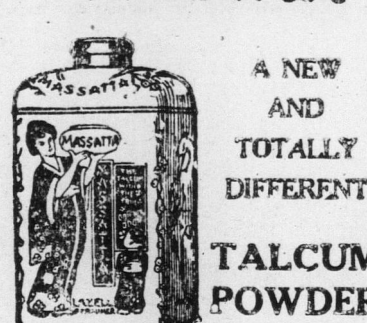

### MUKHTAR PASHA RECALLED FROM BERLIN FOR TALKING.

Athens, Aug. 14 (Dispatch to the London Daily News).—Mukhtar Pasha, the Turkish Ambassador at Berlin, has been recalled at the Kaiser's request, because he reported to Constantinople that Germany and Austria were in the last stage of exhaustion and that the first serious German repulse would bring destruction.

He recommended the Porte to employ discretion, pointing out that if Germany lost she would use Turkey as the scapegoat.

Gen. Von Der Goltz, on hearing of the report, immediately cabled, demanding Mukhtar's recall.

### BRITISH SHIPBUILDING.

Lloyd's Register for the quarter ended June 30, shows a most remarkable activity in British shipbuilding. There are four hundred and forty-two steamers, aggregating more than a million and a half tons, under construction for the merchant service, twenty-one of them being over ten thousand tons gross. We are building seven and a half times as much tonnage as the Germans have sunk since the "blockade" began. As the prevailing high prices are in part due to the shortage of shipping, it is perhaps legitimate to regard those employed in ship construction as engaged in war work.—Pall Mall Gazette.

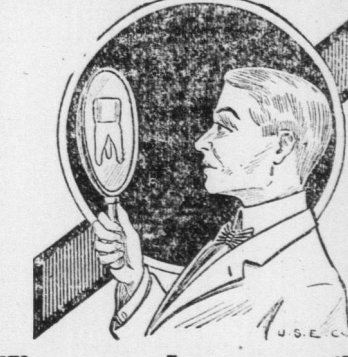
