SPANISH STEAMER TORPEDOED.

MADRID, May 18.

The newspapers here report the

torpedoing of the steamship Villa de

Soller, of 850 tons, the property of

Papa & Sons, of Barcelona. This is

the fourth vessel this shipping con-

cern has lost within a short time.

FIELD MARSHAL'S REPORT.

LONDON, To-day.

In sharp operations around Loos,

French troops made an important ad-

vance on a front of more than two

miles, and captured over four hun-

dred prisoners, according to Field

Marshal Haig's report from British

headquarters in France to-night. The

text reads: "During the night the

French troops carried out successful

raids east and northeast of Loos. All

their objectives were gained on a

front of some four thousand yards,

and over four hundred prisoners were

taken. Local fighting occurred early

this morning north of Albert, as a re-

sult of which a few of our men are

missing. A party of our troops rushed

a German post east of Hebuterne,

and captured a few prisoners and two

machine guns. The hostile artillery

has shown considerable activity to-

day, with gas shells, in the section

north of Bethune.

MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

1918.

EVERY MAN in Class 1, that is all

unmarried men between the ages of

19 and 25 inclusive, must report to the

Registrar at the Militia Building, St.

John's, on forms provided, before the

24th day of May, 1918, or send an ap-

plication for exemption.

Report and Application can be sent

through the Post Office or may be

made personally at the Militia Build-

ing to the Registrar.

Claims for exemption must be made

on the following grounds:

(a) That it is expedient in the na-

tional interest that the applic-

ant should, instead of being

employed in military service, be

engaged otherwise.

(b) That he has one or more broth-

ers and one of them is serving,

or has served, in His Majesty's

Naval or Military Forces dur-

ing the present war.

(c) That he has three or more broth-

ers and two of them are serving

or have served in His Majesty's

Naval or Military Forces dur-

ing the present war.

(d) That he has persons mainly de-

pendent upon him for support,

such as parents, brothers or

sisters and

(e) Ill health or infirmity.

EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS

may be made to the Registrar and

outside St. John's direct to the Com-

missioners (magistrates) appointed

by the Tribunal. Commissioners have

power to grant exemptions subject

to confirmation by the Tribunal on

grounds (b), (c), (d), and in cases

where a man is so obviously infirm as

to be unfit for military service. Ap-

plications for exemption may be made

by the
