At the City Hall.

The Municipal Council held its regular weekly session Thursday evening. The Mayor presided, and Councillors Ayre and Vinnicombe were present.

After reading of minutes, etc., the following matters were disposed of: The Secretary Public Works Department wrote that attention would be given to the holes opposite the Seamen's Institute on Water Street, where arch was erected.

The Superintendent of Constabulary wrote that he had given instructions to have the owner of land on New Gower Street that was in a dangerous condition, notified to put same in proper repair.

The Reid Nid. Co. acknowledged Council's letter and said matters would be attended to.

The Secretary of the Gas Co. stated attention would be given to lamp, Circular and King's Bridge Road.

Gibbs & Barron sent a communication protesting against Council's action in refusing a permit to build on the Southside to Mrs. Dillon. In the opinion of the Council it would be a backward step to allow houses to be built where there was not water or sewerage.

Greely & Hammond were given permission to build shed rear 92 Duckworth Street.

A. McNamara's request to erect coach house on Robinson's Hill was acceded to.

Jas. B. Hall's plan of house, Prince of Wales Street, was passed.

Chas. F. Lester was given permission to install an electric motor in workshop.

A number of residents of Casey Street and vicinity asked for a light corner of Casey Street and Flower Hill. City Engineer will report on this.

Application of residents of Wickford Street for a tank will be acquired into.

Mrs. Wm. Scott's application to repair dwelling and build addition, was granted.

Jas. W. Moore requested permission to build outhouse rear of 81 Duckworth Street. The law for that erection calls for buildings of brick or stone. And unless addition conforms to the law, a permit cannot go.

Moses Butt's application to build shed on Flower Hill, was deferred for plan and particulars.

Dugald Munn requested permission to build garage on Topsall Road. Plan will have to be submitted and the engineer in the meantime is to report on the widening of Shaw's Lane near his property.

The City Engineer's report on work in the various departments throughout the city, was read.

It was decided on the report of the Engineer to place a light at the corner of Coronation and Charlton Streets.

C. M. Hall's plan of dwelling house and shop, Bate's Street, was approved.

J. T. Martin was given a temporary permit to erect shed in Sheehan's Sheds; shed to be removed by June 1st.

The Health Officer's weekly report was submitted.

Plan of proposed layout of property LeMarchant Road, was submitted and will be referred to the owners for consideration.

After disposing of routine business and passing pay rolls and bills, the meeting adjourned.
