## Bloody Pogroms.

5000 Jews Massacred in Ukraine --  
 Nationalists Ask Government to  
 Interfere -- U. S. Officials do  
 Not Approve Mexico's Reply --  
 Trouble in Mesopotamia--Borden  
 Asked to Postpone Retirement.

**MURDERS IN THE UKRAINE.**  
 BERNE, Dec. 18.  
 Reports of a fresh wave of pogroms  
 in the district of Ukraine occupied by  
 General Denekine's forces are printed  
 by the newspaper Galette Wisnoco-  
 via, according to Lemberg advices  
 to-day. The newspaper declared that  
 some five thousand Jews were killed  
 in Yeka territory alone.

**CUSTOMS RESTRICTIONS REMOVED.**  
 LONDON, Dec. 18.  
 Sir Auckland Geddes, Minister of  
 National Service and reconstruction,  
 announced in the House of Commons  
 to-day that in view of the decision of  
 Justice Sir John Sankey of King's  
 Bench division that the Government  
 possessed no power to prohibit the  
 importation of certain goods the Customs  
 had been instructed to allow the  
 importation of all articles affected in  
 the Government prohibitory proclama-  
 tion pending an appeal.

**FORM THE NATIONALISTS.**  
 LONDON, Dec. 18.  
 The National Party in the House of  
 Commons has given notice of motion  
 on the Irish question reading as fol-  
 lows: "The House in view of the fact  
 that the Sinn Fein organization had  
 made it abundantly clear that it will  
 not accept any form of rule retaining  
 the Sovereign powers of Government  
 at Westminster declines to proceed  
 with legislation which cannot be ac-  
 ceptable to any considerable section  
 of opinion in Ireland and calls upon  
 the Government to enforce law and  
 order in that country."

**PRINCE WELCOMED AT LONDON.**  
 LONDON, Dec. 18.  
 Sir Edward E. Cooper, Lord Mayor  
 of London on behalf of the city to-day  
 formally welcomed the Prince of  
 Wales home after the Prince's visit  
 to Canada and the United States. The  
 ceremonies took place in the Guild-  
 hall in the presence of a representative  
 gathering. The Prince, replying to the  
 Lord Mayor's address said the warmth  
 of welcome he first experienced in  
 Newfoundland followed him through-  
 out his trip to North America. He en-  
 joyed his visit to Canada and the Un-

ited States where he was accorded  
 the hospitality for which these coun-  
 tries are famous and expressed his  
 appreciation of the cordiality with  
 which he was entertained.

**PREMIER BORDEN.**  
 OTTAWA, Dec. 18.  
 From present indications there is  
 some possibility that Sir Robert Bor-  
 den may be induced to have post-  
 oned his proposed retirement from the  
 Premiership. Urgent requests have  
 been made by his colleagues that he  
 should remain, and every mail brings  
 shoals of letters expressing regrets  
 at his illness and hope that his retire-  
 ment will not be necessary.

**PROBABLY WERE ASLEEP.**  
 BARCELONA, Dec. 18.  
 The bodies of two civil guards who  
 had been killed with blows from butt-  
 ends of their own rifles were discov-  
 ered by watchmen here this morn-  
 ing. The murders created a sensation.  
 Investigation is being conducted by  
 the military judges of the city.

**CHARGED WITH MURDER.**  
 BUDAPEST, Dec. 18.  
 Bela Kun, former Communist dicta-  
 tor of Hungary, although still in Aus-  
 tria, was placed on trial here to-day  
 on the specific charge of abetting in  
 the murder of artillery Captain Franz  
 Midner, of the Ludovica military  
 academy.

**COAL STRIKE IN BELGIUM.**  
 BRUSSELS, Dec. 18.  
 The strike of coal miners is spread-  
 ing and is endangering the entire field  
 of Belgian industries, according to  
 reports received here to-day.

**MEXICAN REPLY MAKES UNFAVOURABLE IMPRESSION.**  
 WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.  
 The official text of the Mexican re-  
 ply to the last note of the State De-  
 partment respecting Consul General  
 Jenkins, was said to-day to differ only  
 slightly from that contained in the  
 despatches of Tuesday night from  
 Mexico City, in which it was stated  
 the release of Consul agent Jenkins  
 had removed all motive for misunder-  
 standing between the two Govern-

ments regarding the Jenkins issue.  
 While officials said they would have  
 no comment to make until they had  
 time to thoroughly study the note, it  
 was indicated that at first reading the  
 communication had not made a fa-  
 vourable impression.

**TURKS ON WAR PATH IN MESOPOTAMIA.**  
 LONDON, Dec. 18.

A Turco-Arab movement of con-  
 siderable proportions has developed in  
 Mesopotamia and there is a danger  
 of a flare-up if the trouble should  
 spread, according to the War Office  
 to-day. The Arabs are reported to  
 have burned the Government build-  
 ing at Beheezar and appear to be  
 still in possession of it. The report  
 states that numerous Bedouins were  
 encamped in the neighborhood, and  
 it is presumed they were brought in  
 to help deal with the movement, and  
 got out of hand. A Turco-Arab col-  
 umn is reported moving down the  
 Euphrates in the direction of Bagdad.  
 British authorities, it is announced,  
 are taking measures to handle the  
 situation.

**HOLD MEMORIAL SERVICES.**

PARIS, Dec. 18.  
 Memorial services for the soldiers,  
 sailors and nurses of France and the  
 Allied nations who gave their lives on  
 the field of honor were celebrated un-  
 der the auspices of the French Red  
 Cross in the Church of Madame this  
 morning.

**OF INTEREST TO MOVIE PATRONS.**

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.  
 A group of physicians viewed here  
 to-day a concave screen which the in-  
 ventor, Professor J. Louis Peach, head  
 of faculty of medicine at the Univer-  
 sity of Montpellier, in France claims,  
 gives to motion pictures a third di-  
 mension or an illusion of thickness or  
 depth and prevents eye strain.

**JAPAN SEEKING PRIVILEGES IN MEXICO.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.  
 Japan has entered into negotiations  
 with Mexico looking to the acquisition  
 of special privileges or territory in  
 that country, the State Department  
 was informed to-day by Mr. Shidehara  
 the Japanese ambassador.

**NOT TRUE.**

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.  
 An unqualified denial of a news-  
 paper item to the effect that the sum  
 of \$35,000,000 had been brought to  
 Canada as this country's share in the  
 profits of the British expeditionary  
 force canteen system was given this  
 evening by high officials of both the  
 Militia Dept. and the dept. of over-  
 sea military forces of Canada.

**AFGHANISTAN DECLARES FOR INDEPENDENCE.**

LONDON, Dec. 18.  
 General Petura, the Ukrainian com-  
 mander, has fled into Poland. It is as-  
 serted in a Moscow despatch received  
 here to-day. The greater part of  
 Petura's troops have been disposed  
 of, the message declares. Another  
 message dated at Tashkent, Turke-  
 stan, reports that the Amur of Afghan-  
 istan has issued a manifesto of inde-  
 pendence, and declares that Afghan-  
 istan will attain it by strength of arms.

**30,000 JAPS REPORTED IN SIBERIA.**

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 18.  
 The Bolshevik claims that thirty  
 thousand Japanese troops are station-  
 ed between Vladivostok and Omsk to  
 guard the trans-Siberian railway, are  
 reported in despatches received here  
 to-day from Helsinki.

**CANADA SENDS GOLD TO U. S.**

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.  
 Gold coin amounting to \$2,500,000,  
 has arrived in New York from Ottawa.  
 This is the balance of the \$10,000,000  
 shipment made by the Canadian Gov-  
 ernment to stabilize exchange between  
 New York and the Dominion. It is  
 understood a further shipment of  
 \$10,000,000 will follow within the next  
 few days.

**BRITISH ELECTIONS SOON.**

LONDON, Dec. 18.  
 Recent predictions that a general  
 election will be held in the near fu-  
 ture are revived by several morning  
 newspapers in connection with rum-  
 ours current in Parliamentary lobbies  
 yesterday. Parliament will be pro-  
 longed next week until the second  
 week in February, when, according to  
 widespread belief, the Government  
 will immediately prepare for dissolu-  
 tion of Parliament and election to test  
 the country's confidence in the Coal-  
 ition Cabinet. Members of the Labor  
 party, it is stated, are convinced that  
 is the Government's intention and are  
 pushing plans to put four hundred can-  
 didates in the field.

**FROST AND FIRE IN ST. JOHN.**

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 18.  
 With the mercury sixteen below,  
 fire gripped a block of wooden houses  
 here about one o'clock this morning,  
 and gave practically the whole city  
 fire department a fight till daylight.  
 Except for business houses there was  
 little insurance and an early estimate  
 places the loss at fifty thousand dol-  
 lars.
