## Murdered in Hospital.

The "Echo de Paris" gives details of a terrible crime in the military hospital of Casablanca, Morocco, where Jean Esserted, son of a wealthy St. Etienne merchant, shot his wife as she lay in a hospital bed and then endeavored to make out that she had committed suicide. The motive of the crime was the young man's craze for another woman. As a result of paternal pleading, he recently broke with this woman and married Mdlle. Lucie Godart.

A few weeks ago Mme. Esserted fell ill and was removed to the military hospital, where her husband obtained permission to sleep in an adjoining room. In the dead of night, Jean Esserted entered his wife's room unperceived, and, as she lay sleeping, fired a revolver shot at her heart. He then shot himself in the left arm and shouted, "My wife's committed suicide. She shot me in the arm while I was trying to disarm her." Then, seeing his wife still breathing, he shot her a second time.

The suicide theory was at first accepted, but when the dying woman was lying on the operating table she momentarily recovered consciousness and screamed, "Take me away. My husband is going to kill me." Esserted was arrested, and he eventually confessed.
