Moderate Prohibitionists Meet

At the meeting of the Moderate Prohibitionists, held in the Casino Theatre last night, Mr. J. J. St. John was elected Chairman, and Mr. G. C. Baird, appointed Secretary. The Chairman in a brief speech outlined the object of the meeting, and called for a general discussion as to the steps to be taken with regard to the Plebiscite, which takes place on November 15th next, when the country will be called upon to decide for the Royal Commission's report of a bottle every three months for householders only, or the Moderate recommendation of a bottle a week. Speeches were made by Messrs. S. Merrill, P. Goff, Wm. French, A. E. Barle and W. C. Winstanbury, the trend of whose remarks were that the present system was a complete failure and to safeguard the rights of citizens and save the law from being broken an act that would meet with the approval of the masses was absolutely necessary. Mr. Warwick Smith also spoke on the matter. A resolution made that the old Committee remain, was carried unanimously, and with the exception of Messrs. Warwick Smith and A. E. Barle, who have resigned from any official capacity, the old Executive decided to retain office, until the Legislature had taken action. At 11 p.m. the meeting adjourned with the singing the National Anthem.
