After the long reign of the Duke of Sussex the late King Edward as Prince of Wales, became Grand Master, and ruled from 1874 to 1901. when the Duke of Connaught suc

> ceeded him. During these fifty years Freemasonry in England has made, as we all know, great advances in numbers and influence. That progress must in part be ascribed to the diffusion of prosperity and the increase of culture which have disposed a much larger proportion of the population to enjoy the amenities of the Craft.
