Report of the Council of the Board of Trade, March 6

It will have been observed from the notices convening this meeting, that it is the first of a series of meetings to be arranged by your Council, and during their term of office it is their intention to hold these bi-monthly, provided the plan is acceptable to the members. The real purpose behind these meetings is to create and maintain an active interest in the work and problems dealt with by the Council and at each meeting a synoptical report will be submitted and discussion invited on the matters referred to therein.

There are many problems affecting the public's interests which may very properly be discussed at a general meeting of the board and it shall be the endeavour of your Council to provide for a full and open discussion of these as they arise.

The Council's report for the present meeting, will naturally be a very brief one as the new Council did not take office until the first week in February. There were, however, several matters turned over by the previous Council and which are referred to in paragraphs 1 and 2.

1.—Inspection of Life Boats, Coastal Service.—Following the stranding of the Prospero in November last and the subsequent disclosure of the condition of the life boats, the Council addressed a letter to the Railway Commissioners, requesting a copy of the report of the Commission appointed to conduct an enquiry into the accident, and further to advise the Council what steps had been taken to ensure that life boats and life saving equipment will be kept in proper condition. A reply has been received stating that the investigation has not been completed but that definite steps have now been taken to make certain that periodical inspection of all life boats will take place and every effort made to keep them in a sea worthy condition.

2.—Insurance at Corner Brook.—Early in January, the Council was advised by the Board of Fire Underwriters that the Fire Insurance business of the Newfoundland Power and Paper Utilities Corporation was being taken out of their hands and authority given to an outside broker to negotiate same. As Mr. Stadler, the manager of this Company had publicly stated that it was the desire and intention to place their business locally whenever the terms and conditions were equal, and being assured that the rates quoted by the Local Board were in line with similar risks elsewhere, the Council communicated with the Company and have since received a reply confirming the appointment of Major Hay of London, England, as their Insurance representative. It would appear that more advantageous rates than those quoted by local agents have been secured and apart from calling attention to the fact that the rates fixed by the Board of Fire Underwriters, must of necessity include a proportion of the Government Tax, while insurance underwritten elsewhere is tax free, the Council are of the opinion that this matter can only be dealt with by the agents interested.

3.—Street Car, Electric Light Charges and Telephone Complaints.—The Council has received many complaints with reference to the above and which matters have been taken up with the Companies concerned. The Manager of the Newfoundland Light and Power Co., has informed the Council that extensive repairs and alterations will be made in the Street Car service, as soon as weather conditions permit. A reduction in electric light rates has already been made. The Telephone Co. have been making certain changes in their system with a view of giving the public a more efficient service. Slight interruptions were unavoidable during this period, and we are now advised the work in question is practically completed.

4.—Removal of West Coast Service.—At the request of a number of members interested in maintaining an adequate service between St. John's and the South and West Coast towns, a letter was forwarded to the Government, suggesting that the decision to send the Glencoe to the ice be reconsidered. We are pleased to learn that there will be no change in the schedule of this steamer and consequently no delay in the movement of supplies from St. John's. Unless a satisfactory service is maintained this trade may be diverted from St. John's to other ports, and the Council feels that where changes affecting the Coastal Service are under contemplation, no definite decision should be arrived at until the Board has been given an opportunity to consider the possible effect of such change.

5.—Tourist Trade.—Your Council believes it should assist the Government in its efforts to carry on an effective tourist policy and have appointed a Committee to initiate a "Tourists Information Bureau" with a competent secretary in charge and in possession of all facts in connection with our scenic and sporting attractions, accommodation, transportation facilities, hiring of guides, etc., etc. A number of citizens have consented to act as advisory committees to the Bureau, and it is felt that the Secretariat and Office expenses will be met by contributions from the shipping companies and the

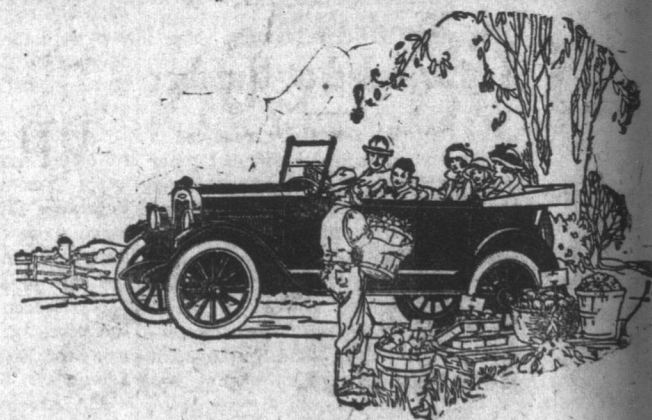
