have been made. We were the first to state that an investigation into the coal and steel industries in Nova Scotia was necessary. We made the statement in our reply to the Corporation's application for a Conciliation Board, and we had to reply as required by section 19 of the Industrial Disputes Act. So far we have seen no sign of the fair, impartial and exhaustive inquiry we suggested. Further, we don't expect Mr. Wolvin to agree to it if it does come, and any form of inquiry he asks for or agrees to is unlikely to satisfy us. We want an inquiry that will show: (1), Mr. Wolvin's true relation to the Company in Montreal that carried Besco's insurance; (2), Where the money paid Sir Richard Squires came from; (3), Where the money that sustains the Company's slush fund comes from, and a dozen and one other things that have already been specified. We have already dealt with the extraordinary spectacle of Mr. Wolvin maintaining the sacredness of contracts. That appears to us as beyond reason. When he cleans his own hands he can come into court against us. We will then undertake to show that we are under no contract such as he states and that his accusations are merely more misrepresentation.

#### ANOTHER BANK ROBBERY.

TUCKAHOE, N.J., March 13. Three robbers to-day held up employees of a local bank and escaped in an automobile with a large sum of money, the amount of which has not been determined. Local police and State troopers, who were notified, pursued the hold-up men and are believed to have surrounded them in Marshallville woods, two miles from here, it was reported. Edward Tomling, Director of the Institution, was shot by the robbers.

#### PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT GETTING BUSY.

HALIFAX, March 13. Hon. A. S. MacMillan, Minister of Highways, left to-night for Cape Breton to secure further and more definite information regarding the actual distress there, according to a statement given out by Hon. Wm. Chisholm, Minister of Mines.

#### SAILED UNDER JUDEAN FLAG.

NEW YORK, Mar. 13. Decorated from stem to stern with flags of the international code, and bearing a six-pointed star shield on her funnels, the steamship President Arthur, of the American-Palestine line, sailed yesterday for the Holy Land, beginning a new steamship service and linking Palestine directly with New York. A crowd that numbered 15,000 persons, gathered to see her off. Jacob H. Stiehl, President of the Line, stated it was the first time in more than two thousand years that the flag of Judah had flown on the high seas.

#### CANADA AND THE LEAGUE.

GENEVA, March 13. The expected decision of the League of Nations to throw the whole problem of arbitration, security and disarmament into the next Assembly, registered to-day by resolution was quite overshadowed in League opinion by Canada's note to the League in which she announced her willingness with some reservations to consider acceptance of compulsory jurisdiction.

#### KILLED BY DYNAMITE EXPLODED BY CIGARETTE BUTT.

JONQUIERES, Que., Mar. 13. James McLaughlin, aged 33, with family residing at Manchester, N.H., was instantly killed to-day, when he dropped a cigarette butt into a box of detonating powder alongside a box of dynamite, on which he was sitting. The powder took fire and communicated to the dynamite.

#### NEXT MOVE FROM OUTSIDE.

SYDNEY, March 13. Apart from the activity of relief workers in Glace Bay area, complete

stagnation marked the strike situation to-day. The next move is generally expected to come from outside.

#### EX-GOVERNEUR GRANT SERIOUSLY ILL.

HALIFAX, March 13. Former Lieut.-Governor MacCallum Grant, was reported to-day to be seriously ill at his home here. The nature of his illness was not stated but it was said at his home that he was very ill.

#### FISHERMEN DROWNED.

CLARK'S BR., N.S., Mar. 13. Ernest Brown, 50, and his son Kenneth, 18, were drowned, it is believed, in the heavy seas that were running out here yesterday morning when they left home to attend to their lobster traps off Stony Island. No word has been heard of them, though they should have returned yesterday at noon, up to a late hour to-night, and it is thought their craft must have capsized with fatal results. Although an inshore wind had been blowing the last two days, searchers have failed to discover any trace of the missing men.

#### ONLY FIFTEEN SURVIVORS.

TOKIO, March 13. The casting ashore of fifteen survivors of the small steamer Uvalima Maru, off Takohima, northwestern Japan, seems to have established that the ship "sundered with about 100 passengers in a gale that swept the coast on Thursday. Many fishing boats were wrecked, and it is feared there will be much loss of life.

### Judge Coderre Condemns Montreal Police System.

Miners' Reply to Wolvin Contains Serious Allegations—U. S. Must be a Party to the Protocol Before Canada Consents—Judean Flag Flown on the High Seas.

#### REPORT CONDEMNS POLICE SYSTEM.

MONTREAL, Mar. 13. The exposure of glaring faults in the system of police administration, of regular influences exercised by the police, of the ridiculous inadequacy of the force, and of flourishing commercial vice and drug traffic here, are contained in the report of Mr. Justice Coderre with which he has concluded the probe he conducted into conditions here. Summarized, the Judge's incompetency in high places in the police in regard to theatre and night cases, Aldermen meddling in police affairs, the strength of the police force should be fifty to one hundred per cent greater, the recorder's conditions are not in accord with the city of Montreal profiting to the extent of \$60,000 a year which the Province takes part for municipal charges, a system of warning whereby houses when raids were being off, and in part voluntary, and in part deliberate inertia on the part of police in fighting commercialized vice, a laxity with betting and gambling houses, the existence of a second hand store and ransom system encouraging robberies, detectives hunting stolen goods but not the robbers, error of the executive committee of the City Council in not naming a director of public safety and in assuming his duties itself.

#### MINERS REPLY TO WOLVIN.

SYDNEY, Mar. 13. The following is in part the statement given out to-night by District 26 Executive, United Mine Workers of America, as a reply to the statements of R. M. Wolvin, President of Besco, as quoted in to-day's news, regarding the Nova Scotia coal industry in the present dispute.—"The total cost of coal at the pit mouth is only 70 per cent of the total average selling price of coal. The total labor cost of coal is only 40 per cent of the total average selling price of coal. Assuming the average selling price of coal to be \$5.50 per ton, \$2.20 goes to labor, who gets the remaining \$3.30. Now the Company wants 53 cents duty per ton, which will be added to the price to the consumer, 23 cents cut in wages per ton, with rail, subcontracting, increased production, lowering overhead and improved appliances lowering overhead cost at the time. Then the selling price will be \$6.03, of which \$1.98 goes to labor. Who gets the remaining \$4.05? On an annual production of four million tons at this figure of \$6.03, labor would get eight million dollars, and the Corporation would get sixteen million dollars. These calculations are based on the Corporation's own figures given to us and they have never yet given us the truth. The truth would show more glaring inequalities of distribution of income, but surely this is bad enough. It is discouraging to discuss the coal industry with Mr. Wolvin, Mr. C. E. Cameron or Mr. McLaughlin, because they are not familiar with the working of coal mines and cannot see any way of bettering conditions except to cut labour and increase the price to the consumer. But when they purport to give statements to the public, it is our duty to warn the public of their inaccuracy, and for our pains we are termed, "wreckers," "feds" or "destructionists" for stating facts. However, assuming that there are eight millions of dollars to be divided among 12,000 workers and their families, and this is higher production than last year, it means our average annual receipts for all purposes, and including all classifications of labour, is under \$700 per man, and the women and children of lower paid men must face privation and want continually. If the Corporation cannot successfully sell its product at these figures, it is because the gentlemen we name can't run the business. Why they can't run the business is disclosed in several of our published documents and we don't wish to repeat the unpleasant details. Surely, however, the country can accept their own admission that they can't run their business. In view of what we have said we can pass over Mr. Wolvin's statement that we are the best paid miners in the world. Mr. Wolvin takes us to task for not joining in the various suggestions for investigation that
