

Mr Shearer's district extends from a line running through Wetaskiwin, from east to west, and along the eastern boundary of the province from that line to the boundary of the United States. It contains about 60,000 square miles. This district comprises three presby-tenies, viz: Calgary, Red Deer and Lacombe. It has 77 mission fields and emented charges. It draws \$3 14 augmented charges. It draws out.
723 from the home misison funds, being a little less than what the same district contributes to all the schemes of the church. Mr. Shearer expressed the hope that before very long the synod of Alberta would support its own mission work, without aid from the churches.
