GIRLS AND WOMEN WANTING FRIENDLY INTEREST, HAVE IT

New Society Hopes to Aid Strangers in City and Others in Everyday Life

What promises to be a splendid addition to civic welfare was launched yesterday, when the Calgary Women and Girls' Friendly and Protective society was formed at a well attended meeting of interested women held at the Y.W.C.A. Mrs. C. R. Edwards, president of the Normal School Mothers' club, who had been appointed by her club as convener for organization purposes, was elected president. Explaining the purpose of the society, Mrs. Edwards pointed out that it was merely to fulfill the needs for a friendly and sympathetic interest felt by so many women and girls, both the older and the younger ones, who come to the city strangers, or for any other deserving help.

"Everyone may feel that any confidence or trust placed in any member of our committee will be regarded by that member with the greatest respect and consideration. Every name on our committee is that of a woman worthy of any confidence and also of one who is desirous of giving any advice, assistance, or of displaying a friendly interest in anyone who may come to her. The society and its committee, represent all religious denominations and other organizations interested, so that if a girl or woman asking help or protection may ask it of one of her own denomination or one of interests similar to her own."

Cards will be printed and placed in all public places bearing the name of the association and the advice, "You are privileged to select anyone of the following women as your friend," with the list of officers elected yesterday, which is as follows, and the names of the committee to which some more will be added: President, Mrs. C. ONE POUND SUGAR WILL CAN SIX QUARTS FRUIT

Prices for Preserving Fruits Are Cheaper Than at Any Time This Season

Apples, plums and peaches of fine quality are now rolling in from British Columbia at a record rate and housewives who have not put up their winter supply of preserves should attend to it now or the supply, which is past its peak, will disappear. As preserving factories have not had enough to supply their army contracts the price of canned fruit must rise high.

Sugar is coming down in price, but the small quantity required to preserve fruit, if done according to the following recipe, will not deter anyone from putting up a full supply, says a fruit expert, while in two weeks' time the preserving season will be a thing of the past for 1917.

That fruit is cheaper in Calgary today than it has been at any time during this year is evident from prices. The reason is not hard to seek. This is the time when the famous fruit districts of British Columbia are harvesting their plums, peaches and pears, and as no cold storage is available they must be sold at this time. A glance at the fruit stores all laden with fruit will convince anyone that Calgary is not getting a short supply of fruit.

Following are some rules for preserving six quarts of fruit with one pound of sugar:

Sugar at 8c per lb. costs 1-3 cents per quart jar; sugar at 9c per lb. costs 1-4 cents per quart jar; sugar at 10c per lb. costs 1-5 cents per quart jar; sugar at 11c per lb. costs 1-6 cents per quart jar; sugar at 12c per lb. costs 1-7 cents per quart jar.

Recipe.

Fill 4-quart jars with fresh fruit carefully but firmly packed in layers. Prepare a syrup by adding 1 lb. of sugar to 10 cups of water, or a ratio of 1 of sugar to 6 of water.

Boil the syrup for 10 minutes and allow it to cool; pour it over the fruit to within half-inch of top of jar.

Secure the cover in the usual way. Place the jars in a boiler in which a board should be placed to prevent jars coming in too close touch with the stove. Fill the boiler with cold water up to the neck of jars and allow to come to the boiling point. Jars may be removed then but will not hurt to remain 10 minutes. Stone and other fruit should be boiled 20 minutes before removing.

Seal jars as soon as removed, and after cooling store in a cool place.

Fruit put up in this way requires no further application of sugar when serving and the fruit retains its natural size and flavor.

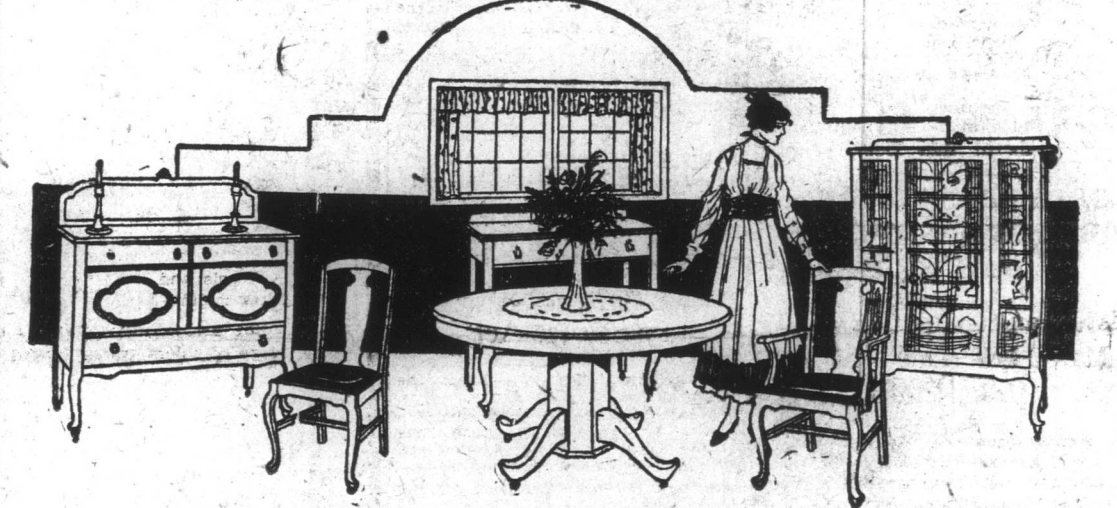
