THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

Toronto, Oct. 31.—11 a.m.—Tonight the
pressure is highest over the Southern States,
and there is a depression south of Nova Scotia
and another over Hamilton. The weather in
the Dominion has been generally fair, but a
few scattered showers of rain or snow have oc-
curred in Ontario and Quebec. Moderate to
fresh westerly winds have prevailed on the
lakes. Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Edmonton, 41°-52°; Qu'Appelle, 38°-49°; Min-
nneapolis, 38°-50°; Toronto, 35°-46°; Montreal,
34°-44°; Quebec, 35°-47°; Halifax, 47°.

TO-DAY'S PROBABILITIES.
Toronto, Nov. 1.—10 a.m.—The indications
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes re-
gion (covering the peninsula and as far west
as the St. Lawrence) are: shifting to south
and southeast winds; fair during the day,
followed by local rain at night; little higher
temperatures.

—A grand trunk brakeman named

known in this city, had four fingers
smashed while coupling cars at Hamilton
yesterday afternoon.

—A meeting of the London Trust was
called for last evening, but Mayor Taylor
and Mr. A. B. Powell, the chairman, were

unable to attend. Another meeting will be
held shortly.

—The horse and buggy which Patrick
Swan drove from St. Thomas to this city
Wednesday evening has found a proprietor

it was returned yesterday.

—Four new drop letter boxes were placed
in position yesterday, at the corners of
