States makes it altogether impossible for Great Britain to recognize its doings, either directly or indirectly. THE FLYING SQUADRON. London, Jan. 22.-Rt. Hon. Geo. G. Goschen, First Lord of the Admiralty, in a speech at Grinstead, said he wished to dissipate the alarming rumors that were in circulation. Referring to the flying squadron, he said it was intended for use in any emergency in any direction. It would go to Berehaven without taking sealed or other orders, except to proceed to that place and await instructions. The squadron was not intended as a to any country, nor was it destined for any particular quarter of the world. It would be used as other squadrons are used. Mr. Goschen appealed to the public if they heard that the squadron had been ordered anywhere not to imagine that it had been sent to menace anybody. The disposal of the squadron would not be guided by political considerations while the situation remained as it is now. He denied the rumor that the Government meditated placing another squadron in commission. Nevertheless, it could not afford to rest on its oars. It did not propose to adopt sensational measures, but would continue, as to steadily augment hitherto, number of ships, guns and men in order to maintain supremacy on the sea, and to secure the nation from panic whenever there were clouds on the political horizon.

BRITAIN AND BRAZIL. London, Jan. 22.-The British Minister has handed to the Brazilian Foreign Office a note from Lord Salisbury in which are embodied the points held as the foundation for England's claim to the Island of Trinidad. The British Prime Minister says that, while the English are in actual possession, in exercise of a conciliatory spirit, Government is willing to accept arbitration as a means of determin-

ing the rightful ownership. Brazil must reply definitely as to whether she will accept this friendly proposition at the end of the current month

or on Feb. 12.

The note further says that when the British Parliament opens, the declaration that England now occupies Trinidad will be announced in the Queen's speech, and that unless Bra-zil gives reasons for delay in arbitrating the dispute, by showing better proofs of ownership than whose already advanced, the island is lost to the republic.

A special from Buenos Ayres says: France, through her Minister, has informed the Brazilian Government that she agrees to arbitration of the Amapan boundary question. She will, however, absolutely refuse to discuss the details of the affair of May 16, 1895, in which French subjects were attacked in the Amapan territory. In this incident she in-sists that the guilty Brazilians shall be dismissed from office in the con-tested territory, and that they be punished without delay.

BRITAIN SECURE, EVEN IF ISO-LATED.

London, Jan. 22.-Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, made a speech last night at a banquet given by natives of Queensland residing or visiting in London. He referred to the solidarity of the Imperial sentiment which made it laced officials come high. impossible for a blow to be struck or a chord sounded in the most distant part of the empire without its being rein every part of her Majesty's dominions. Great Britain, he said, had been guilty of many sins of omission and commission towards her colonies. Still she alone among the nations of the earth had been able to establish and maintain col-onies in all parts of the world. A few weeks ago, he added, Great Britain seemed to stand alone, surrounded by jealous competitors, and was assailed with altogether unexpected Long-standing differences hostility. appeared to suddenly come to a head and assumed threatening proportions. The quarters whence she might have looked for friendship and consideration confronted her instead with suspicion and even hate. England had to recognize that her success, however legitimate, was imputed as a crime, that her love of peace was taken as a sign of weakness, and her indifference to foreign criticism as an invitation to insult. He regretted to be forced to admit that such feelto fulfill her obligations, was equally determined to maintain her rights. England, if isolated, stood secure in the strength of her own resources, in the firm resolution of her people, without respect to party, and in the abundant loyalty of her children from one end of the empire to the other.
