BIARRITZ, France, Dec. 4.—Princess Frederick of Hanover, whose illness here was announced Saturday, has had a sudden hemorrhage, and is dying.

Resigned His Seat.

BERLIN, Dec. 4.—The *Coburger Zeitung* says that the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Duke of Edinburgh, has resigned his seat in the British Privy Council.

World's Fair Victim.

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Elia Ganon, who is said to have arranged the Tunisian Pavilion at the Chicago Fair, killed himself at an hotel here yesterday. In a letter which he left he said he had been disheartened by his losses in Chicago.

Something New.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—It is reported Sir William Vernon Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, is considering, among other expedients to meet the deficit in the budget, a proposal to place a tax of 1 penny on the shilling on theater admissions.

China Supporting Britain.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Standard says that China is preparing to support actively Great Britain's policy towards Siam. Four British gunboats and several Chinese warships are on their way to Bangkok.

Wales & Co., Stock Breeders.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—At the annual cattle show of the Smithfield Club, with an uncounted number of excellent exhibits, the Prince of Wales took first prize for South-down wethers, and the Queen was awarded several prizes for exhibits. Prizes were also awarded to the Duke of Hamilton, the Duke of Richmond and Baron Rothschild.

Good Words for Cleveland.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Commenting upon the President's message, the *Daily Graphic* of this morning compliments Mr. Cleveland upon his continued firmness and consistency.

The Morning Post says there is no indication in it of party excitement. Nearly every paragraph would be instructive reading if printed in parallel columns with some of Mr. Harrison's high-sounding orations.

The Daily News says the message is well worthy of the great national crisis in which it is delivered.

The Times, Standard and Daily Chronicle make complimentary reference to the document.

Death of Prof. Tyndall.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Prof. Tyndall is dead. Several weeks from influenza and rheumatism. He died early last week and seemed to be mending. There was no alarming change until this morning, when he suddenly became very ill. Dr. Winstanley and Dr. Hutchinson, local practitioners, were called at once. They found Prof. Tyndall unconscious and pronounced his condition as critical. His friends and family were summoned to his bedside, and towards noon he rallied sufficiently to recognize them. In the afternoon he became comatose. He did not regain full consciousness, but grew slowly weaker until 6:30 o'clock, when he died peacefully and painlessly. His physicians are unable to certify the cause of his death and an inquest has been ordered.

Narrowly Escaped Defeat.

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Intense interest was manifested to-day in the Chamber of Deputies regarding the declaration of the new Government. Crémieux, the Premier, read the Ministerial declaration. He said the result of the recent elections proved the inalienable attachment of the people to the Republic; the country's aversion to reaction and to Socialists who seek to overturn the principles of the first revolution, including liberty of the individual and property rights. The Government intended to combat Socialism by reforms and the amelioration of the condition of the working classes. Radical reforms would be effected in the system of direct taxation, which would be placed on a more just basis. (Cheers.) The land laws would be recast and a pension fund established for the benefit of old and disabled workmen. The privileges of the Bank of France would be renewed, as the bank was essential to financial stability. The Government would organize agricultural credit and insurance. It would oppose the separation of church and state, and a revision of the constitution. The home and foreign policy of the country would be inspired by the dignity of a great nation able to defend its rights by pacific means. (Cheers.)

Paschal Grousset, Socialist, proposed that general amnesty be granted to all political, press and strike offenders and made an impassioned speech. After a heated debate Grousset's proposal was rejected—257 to 226.

According to the gossip in the lobbies of the House the vote on the amnesty proposal, in which the Government had only a majority of 31, is considered a moral defeat of the Cabinet, and this, too, on the very first vote taken since the new Ministry took office.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News says that personal regard for Cassimier-Perier alone averted a defeat of the Cabinet.

The Times' correspondent in Paris regards the vote as a good omen, and believes M. Roche's eloquence told with unusual force against the Government. About 100 deputies abstained from voting.

The big Gilmour saw mill at Trenton, on the Bay of Quinte, sawed 38,000,000 feet of lumber this season.

Col. Thos. Axworthy, ex-treasurer of the city of Cleveland, lies seriously ill at his residence in Hamilton.

Michael J. O'Connor, father of the late William O'Connor, champion oarsman of America, died on Sunday at Toronto.

Mr. David Jackson, of Durham, has lately decided on transferring the Mechanics' Institute building to that corporation.

The anti-prohibition mass meeting advertised to take place in the Toronto Auditorium on Saturday night did not materialize.

Rev. W. H. Watson, pastor of the Congregational Church, Kingston, has accepted the call to the Emmanuel Congregational Church, Hamilton.

Miss Lettie Leggat, the esteemed matron of the Girls' Home at Hamilton, became suddenly ill on Friday, and has been committed to the asylum.

Waring Kennedy is still the only man in the field definitely for the Toronto mayoralty, and Mayor Fleming continues to hold back his decision.

John Milton Pike, Chatham; Watson Gould Parish, Athens, Leeds county, and John Raphael Kerr, of Barrie, have been appointed notaries public.

Robt. Irwin, of Masham township, three miles from Wakefield, and 30 from Ottawa, committed suicide on Saturday night by shooting himself with a pistol.

Mr. Henry Varley, the evangelist, at the close of his successful revival services at Bradford, was presented with a check for \$200. He is now at work in Toronto.

At Halifax on Monday a young man named Evans, while handling coal on the steamer Othello fell into the hold—30 feet—and died two hours after from his injuries.

Wm. Norton, of Peterboro, has been appointed assistant secretary of the Hamilton Y. M. C. A., in the place of Arthur Jolley, who goes to Galt as secretary of the Y. M. C. A. there.

A new steam barge of 10,000 bushels capacity was launched at Pictou on Saturday. It is owned by Mr. A. W. Hay, one of the most enterprising men in Prince Edward county.

The appointment of police magistrate at St. John's, New Brunswick, is gazetted. Mr. Wood takes the place of the late Matthew Charles Brown.

Edith, the 4-year-old daughter of Mr. Wm. Edige, Yonge street, Toronto, was scalded to death Sunday. A pail of scalding water had been left on the kitchen floor, and the little one backed up against it and fell in.

A subscription has been taken up in Belleville to send the wife and nine children of Lewis Fletcher, the car inspector who was killed on the Grand Trunk last week, back to Scotland, whence they came a few weeks ago.

The town of Parry Sound has struck the highest rate in the Province this year, 38 mills on the dollar. Cressmore comes next with 35 mills, and Bracebridge third with 27; Michipicott fourth with 27-10 mills, and Lindsay fifth with 24 mills.

Twenty-four fishermen employed by Wm. Parker were arraigned Monday morning at Windsor on the charge of fishing on Sunday. Constable Masters was not anxious to push the case, and as Mr. Parker offered to pay the costs—\$25—the matter was dropped.

J. McAuley, the manager of the Buffalo Fish Company in Windsor, says that the catch this year was about the same as last, though his company has 13,000 pounds less in the freezer this year than they had last autumn. The freezer contains at present 1,100,000 pounds, two-thirds of which are trout.

Miss Ada Rixon, third daughter of Mr. Henry Rixon, died Sunday morning of peritonitis. Great sympathy is expressed for the family. Last summer the only son was drowned from the steamer Alberta in Lake Superior under very distressing circumstances.

Searching for the bodies of the men lost on the ill-fated steamer John Fraser near North Bay has had to be discontinued owing to the freezing over of the lake. Four bodies have been recovered: those of Barton, Bonny, McCann and John Wilson. There are seventeen bodies yet to be found.

Dr. William Cox Allan, whose death occurred last week at Fort MacLeod, N. W. T., where he was collector of customs, was for many years one of the best known active opposing candidates to John Sandfield Macdonald at one time and was mayor of Cornwall and afterwards police magistrate of the town. Three or four years ago he married Mrs. P. D. Conger, of Toronto, a well-known Canadian authoress, but they did not agree and recently she entered a suit for alimony of \$100 a month against him, which was pending at the time of his death.

No Retreat!

President Cleveland's Charge at the Opening of Congress.

Tariff Reform the Most Important Issue.

American Manufacturers Must Have Wider Markets—Impossible Under a High Tariff—Steady Employment for the Workingman Desirable—The Injustice to Hawaii to be Undone.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—President Cleveland brought down his much-looked-for message at the opening of Congress this afternoon. Like all his deliverances it was brief, pointed and clear. Following is a summary:

"Even if the often disapproved assertion could be made good that a lower rate of wages would result from free raw materials and low tariff duties, the

INTELLIGENCE OF OUR WORKINGMEN leads them quickly to discover that their steady employment, permitted by free raw materials, is the most important factor in their relation to tariff legislation.

"A measure has been prepared by the appropriate congressional committee embodying tariff reform on the basis herein suggested which will be promptly submitted for legislative action. It is the result of much patriotic and unselfish work, and I believe it deals with its subject consistently and as thoroughly as existing conditions permit. I am satisfied that the reduction of tariff duties provided for in the proposed legislation, added to existing international trade, will in the near future, though perhaps not immediately, produce sufficient revenue to meet the needs of the Government."

(Signed) "GROVER CLEVELAND."

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The Grip in Europe

A Modified Form of It Sweeping the Continent.

Prof. Garner Mourns the Death of His Favorite Monkey.

A New Explosive—The Jesuits in Germany—A Daring Aeronaut—London Poor Don't Want Clear Weather.

Influenza in Europe.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—An outbreak of an infectious type of influenza is the prevailing topic of personal concern, not only in England, but throughout Europe. Its latest form differs somewhat from the Russian variety. The attacks are almost as sudden as a stroke of paralysis. There come rather severe pains through the body.

The prostration is often so great that the sufferer is unable to stand. The disease usually occurs without catarrh, and the seat of inflammation is the eyes and throat.

The lungs become involved unless great care be taken. The disease is not so dangerous or prolonged as the more familiar grip, but is more infectious. It is almost like measles in this respect. The victims include all classes. The attendance at Parliament has been cut down by it. Many schools are closed in the Midlands and Germany. An important effect upon the death rate is that the mortality from lung diseases has nearly doubled in London within a month.

Dynamite Out-Done.

A new explosive has been discovered which, so the Swiss inventor asserts, will supersede dynamite. The explosive was tested the other day at Thun. The Jesuits in Germany.

The vote of the Reichstag in favor of admitting the Jesuit Fathers into Germany is the sensation of the week, not only in Germany but throughout the Catholic world. Never, perhaps, since Prince Bismarck resigned the Chancellorship, was his absence from the Reichstag so noticeable as Saturday. No previous concession has been obtained by the Center party with so little debate and intrigue.

In the Kulturkampf struggle Prince Bismarck poured the vis of his wrath upon the Jesuits and so earned for himself the opposition of German Catholics as a whole. Since then the Pope and the Emperor have become reconciled and the position is much changed. According to the calculations of the newspapers the bill was to be rejected, but their anticipations were disappointed by the votes of different members, who believe there is nothing more to fear from the Vatican in political affairs.

"Socialists and Anarchists," said Count Hensperg, the Center leader, "are free to preach the destruction of every social institution; the Jesuit alone is expelled for preaching God's word."

A Daring Dead.

The people of a village rushed, astonished, on Thursday to a man slowly climbing the lofty spire of the parish church. He reached the weather vane, swung around a few times, and then threw his necktie back to the waiting crowd below. Turning his back to the vault he waved his arms to the horror-stricken people and leaped to the ground. As he did so he unfolded a parachute, and instead of being dashed to pieces he landed unhurt upon the pavement.

Coal Still Very Dear.

The country has by no means recovered from the widespread disaster of the coal war. The price of coal is still 50 per cent. above the normal, and the supply is limited. Many factories are still idle on account of the lack of fuel, and the number tends to increase rather than diminish. The Clark thread mills, the greatest in the world, shut down Saturday. The coal was exhausted. Much indignation has been aroused this week by the reports of many mines stopping coal shipments since they resumed operations in order to maintain the high prices. The miners threaten to publish a black list of the mine owners pursuing this policy, and it probably will be abandoned.

London still enjoys a single blessing connected with the city. The city is still fogless. But this means severe suffering among the poor. The temperature Saturday was several degrees below freezing. The chimneys of the poor were smokeless because the price of coal is still prohibitive. A clear atmosphere is therefore a dearly bought luxury.

Financial Affairs Improved.

Financial affairs in London were much improved last week. The business house about which there was great anxiety several days ago, is in a safe condition, and the rumors which disturbed the city are subsiding. The foolish talk about the Bank of England has also ended. The governors of the great institutions offered a shock to their dignity and self-respect from which they will not recover for years. All the blame is laid upon Cashier May, and his indiscretions, to use no stronger word will never be forgiven. See early a day paper.

IN CONGRESS.

The Tariff Bill Likely to Come Up Within Ten Days.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 4.—Chairman Wilson of the committee on Finance says the bill now before the House will be reported to the House within the next ten days, and that the internal revenue features will be reported separately and at a later date.

The official estimates sent to Congress today by Secretary Carlisle ask for \$411,879,041 for fiscal year 1895, as against \$421,612,215 for 1894 and against \$432,456,526 appropriated for 1894.

In the Senate to-day Mr. Delph gave notice that in tomorrow he should ask the Senate to indulge him in a few remarks on that part of the message which referred to Hawaii.

Political Comedy.

Political comedy throughout Europe still keeps tragedy in the background. The preparation for tragedy still goes on everywhere, but there is nothing startling at the moment in the various war rehearsals.

France has furnished a week's novel entertainment for herself and foreign spectators. Italy, in much more serious plight, hopes to postpone the critical hour a few days longer by a temporary Ministry. England is still leading her vast hunger, and is forgetting to grumble in her satisfaction over the great improvement in the condition of the masses above two weeks ago.

Pathetic Death of a Monkey.

Prof. Garner, who is said to sail for America in a few days, is quite disconsolate over the death of Elisha, the most intelligent monkey ever found. Garner made the acquaintance of Elisha and her husband, Aaron, in Africa, and induced them to come north with him. The death of the poor creature in Liverpool on Thursday was quite pathetic. She died in the arms of poor Aaron, who had been assisting in his attentions during her whole illness. Prof. Garner was present during her last moments, and when he put his hand to her heart to see if it had ceased to beat, Aaron put his hand there too, looking in the professor's eyes and inquiring if that was all he could do. Aaron would not permit his dead companion to be taken from him. The sadness in Aaron's countenance could not have been more clearly portrayed on the face of a human being. His grief was inconsolable.

When the professor visited his protegee on Saturday, Aaron was not content until he had put his hand in that of the professor, and by signs and sounds was telling him his distress.

Terrible Work of Brigands.

Brigands in the Caucasus are becoming bolder than ever before. Extraordinary stories of their recent outrages are coming to hand. The following is a typical instance.

The other day a band of 24 men, with a pack horse and ammunition, approached the village of Zaturli, in the Baku province. They met four peasants in the road, where the richest man lived. The first peasant refused to pay, and was immediately cut down. The second, declining to give any information, was stabbed. The other two led the brigands to the house of a benevolent, wealthy man, Hadshi Hussein. The latter hesitated to say where his money was kept, but a dagger driven through the muscles of his right arm and left there induced him to lead the robbers to his safe.

He found 10,000 roubles in gold and valuables worth an equal amount. Hadshi Hussein was afterwards despatched.

His housekeeper wore gold earrings, which attracted the attention of the murderers. In a moment her ears were cut from her head. She sprang to the door, but was stabbed. Her cries had alarmed the villagers, who opened a fusillade upon the robbers. The latter made a desperate sortie, regained their horses, and made good their retreat, leaving four dead victims. All efforts have failed to unearth the band.
