No Use Talking
Of SettlementUntil Tuan and the Empress Are
Beheaded,Is the Declaration of a Lady Who Passed Through the Siege
of Pekin—Arrival of Escaped Legationnaires at San Fran-
cisco—Emperor Blames His Ministers for
the Whole Trouble.

San Francisco, Oct. 2.—The passen-

gers on the steamer Coptic, which ar-

rived from China Sunday night, were

released from quarantine yesterday.

Among them were 26 who passed

through the siege of Pekin. These in-

cluded Miss M. E. Andrews, F. M.

Chapin, wife and three children; Miss

Duow, Miss Dudgeon, Miss Rutherford,

C. H. Fenn and wife and two children;

Dr. J. H. Ingram and wife and two

children; C. H. Oliver and two sons;

Miss Cecile Payne, W. F. G. Squires,

Mrs. M. S. Woodward and daughter,

and Dr. W. G. Becker.

Miss Rutherford, in telling of her ex-

periences in Pekin, said: "We women

did not have the excitement which fell

to the share of the men to keep our

courage up. We were eager for work

to do, and anything that had to be

done was well and promptly done, you

may be sure."

Rev. F. M. Chapin, a Methodist mis-

sionary, said: "They were dark days

and we had all but given up hope when

the glad news of the entry of the re-

lief column reached us. Our privations,

while severe, were not so bad as

they might have been."

Miss Duow said: "There is no use

talking settlement until we have the

heads of Prince Tuan and of the em-

press dowager. It is foolish to think

of honest peace while they are living.

In my judgment they should be be-

headed before negotiations for peace

are entered into."
