AUSTRIA'S PROPOSAL. London, Oct. 2.-The Austro-Hungarian foreign office, says the Vienna cor-respondent of the Morning Post, has received a circular note which France has addressed to the powers, in which she agrees as to the necessity of obtaining satisfaction for the anti-foreign attack, but suggests that the ministers in Pekin should immediately begin negotiations on the other questions at issue. The note also proposes the permanent prohibition of the import of arms and ammunition into China, the razing of the fortifications between Pekin and the sea, and the maintenance of legation guards.

Tien Tsin, Sept. 29, via Taku, Sept. 29, via Shanghai, Oct. 2.—Li Hung has abandoned his decision to proceed to Pekin, and will, it is announced, begin negotiations with the Russian min-ister to China, M.
