—A jockey named Armstrong had his leg broken and was otherwise injured yesterday while riding Mr. Fleming's horse in the matinee races at Queen's Park. The horse ran against the fence while coming down the back stretch, and threw him. The animal also received injuries.

—The funeral of the late Charles Parkins, son of Jos. Parkins, who died in Woodstock, took place yesterday at Hyde Park Cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Rhodes. The pallbearers were: Samuel Prince, Benjamin Morley, Edward McLaughlin, Robert Prince, and his cousins, Henry and Norman Wade, of this city.

—The P. L. Marden Company, of this city, have written Chairman McKeough of the Chatham board of works, that they will be there this week to commence the laying of granite walks. There are about twenty altogether. September is the best month in which to lay a granite walk, as the cement does not set too quickly.

—Hugh Hartshorne, the former Londoner who was reported by the Hamilton Herald as missing from Toronto, has been located at Niagara Falls, and he is now being well looked after. He is supposed to have received a sunstroke while out yachting. His ailment was exaggerated by the Hamilton newspapers. His complete recovery is anticipated in a very short time.

—The Great Northwestern Telegraph Company has been advised that a new cable has been opened for business between Che Foo and Taku, China; also that the Tsinan Fu-Pekin courier service is suspended, the couriers not having been able to arrive there. Telegrams have, however, been reforwarded by telegram from Tsinan Fu via Che Foo, and from there by best means possible.

Mr. Barron will preach his inaugural sermon the first Sunday in September.

A DASTARDLY DEED

Thirteen-Year-Old Girl Criminally Assaulted Yesterday Afternoon—The Perpetrator Still at Large.

Little Ila Tufts, the 13-year-old daughter of Robert Tufts, 202 Rectory street, was yesterday afternoon subjected to a criminal assault by some miscreant as yet unknown to the police authorities. Ila, with her two younger brothers and the baby, had left their home for a walk, the object being to obtain quiet in the house, Mrs. Tufts being seriously ill. The children went to the Hamilton road, and walked east some distance back of Rectory street, then turned down a quiet lane leading to the river. The children were knocking down some apples from an overhanging tree, when a stranger rode up on a bicycle, and told the little boys they could get nicer apples nearer the river. The boys then went to get the fruit, and the stranger then knocked some more apples off the tree, and persuaded the girl to get over the fence for them. He immediately followed, and accomplished his foul purpose. The little girl struggled as best she could, but the stranger gagged her to prevent an outcry and easily overpowered her resistance. He then mounted his wheel and rode rapidly away. The girl hurried home, and notified her relatives, and the police are now investigating. It is to be hoped that the miscreant will be captured and due punishment meted out to him.

SPORT IN AFRICA

A Baseball Match in Which the London Company Shows its Superiority.

Sergt. Dixon, late of the Queen's Own Rifles, writes from South Africa as follows:

There is not much going on in the athletic line here just now, as the duties are too heavy to allow much time, but the other day B company challenged A company to a game of baseball, which came off on Thursday, the 12th. At the appointed hour the teams took the field, B company going to bat first and knocking out four runs before the third man hit the dust. After a very exciting game B company won by 16 to 4. Some fellow raked up a couple of balls, but the regulation bat was not obtainable, and one had to be manufactured for the occasion. Pte. Macbeth (Strathroy) went on for B company, rubbed his hands in the dirt in professional style, swiped the ball for a home run and smashed the bat, and prolonged cheers from the spectators. A pick hand was the only substitute which could be found, but it lasted out the game and hammered the covers off both balls.

A feature of the game was Sergt. George Macbeth's magnificent base-running.

Pte. Ballard's (of B company) pitching was splendid. The ball left his hand with all the velocity of a 40-pound shell, but his range-finder was not working properly, and elevation and direction were not good; in fact, batter and catcher discussed the advisability of digging a trench and taking cover, but their ammunition was scarce, and they decided it would be politic to evacuate the position.

The spectators, outside the soldiers, were not numerous, and were mostly colored folk. One black sod took up a position within twenty feet of the home base on the foul line, between third and fourth base, and when a hot liner caught him in the "thicker," he merely grinned in a pleasant manner, as though it was what he was looking for. He was a trifle nervous after that, however, and ducked every time the batter struck, shifting his position after he thought he had been there long enough to indicate his supreme scorn of danger.

Col. Buchanan was an interested spectator of the game, and noted the fine points of play with a critical eye.

Sergt. Sippl's left-hand batting and throwing were great factors in the score.

B company are so proud now that they think of entering a team in the Southern African Republic Baseball League, but C company talk of putting out a team that will wipe them off the face of the earth. B company must, however, first establish a reputation by defeating a picked team from the balance of the battalion.

CRICKET'S WANE IN ENGLAND.

Cricket is said to be losing its popularity in England. In several of the British newspapers this is discussed as an established fact, and it is said to be due to somewhat the same reasons that have led to the decline of baseball in the United States.

Just as professionalism has ruined the national game, so the same evil seems to have arisen in England. It seems that the best cricket clubs are made up of professionals and alleged amateurs who are really professionals and do little else than play the game and reap financial benefit thereby more or less surreptitiously. Cricket has become not a game but a business or profession, and few amateurs are able to devote sufficient time to its exacting demands. So the alleged amateurs are paid salaries as assistant secretaries, but really to enable them to live while they are playing. Meanwhile golf, which is quite as lively and exciting, is becoming popular and has captured many former votaries of cricket, who find in the latter game the added advantage that women can play it.—New York Tribune.

STARVATION OF HORSES.

A writer in the London Times says that the "great blot" on the conduct of the war by the British was that the horses were "systematically starved." They lacked food and died for that lack because the department had "possibly through inexcusable ignorance of their duties" not made preparations for giving the horses sufficient food to keep them alive. The carelessness cost the nation casualties in men counted by the hundreds and in horses counted by thousands. The cavalry horses, he says, were not overworked and had been properly fed they would have been all right. Aside from the point of view of the person who loves animals, the death of the horses was an extravagance. A trained cavalry horse costs about \$300 at the least, and the loss of 5,000 horses unnecessarily is hence an important expense. The writer urges that in future warlike operations care be taken to see that the horses are supplied with sufficient food. The carelessness with which

horses and mules are sacrificed in war nowadays would seem to indicate that with new methods of warfare all love for the "noble charger" has gone.
