MORE MEN FOR GEN. KITCHENER

British War Office Decides to Enlist 5,000 Yeomanry Volunteers.

The Fifth Royal Irish Rifles Asked To Go--- Proposal to Shoot All Boers Wearing Khaki---Severe Fighting in Cape Colony---Losses During the War.

London, Jan. 16 .- The government | has been a severe engagement, with has decided to send large reinforcements to Lord Kitchener, and the War Office in carrying out this decision, has determined to enlist 5,000 yeomanry volunteers. At a meeting held at the War Office yesterday (Tuesday) afternoon, this plan and others for securing more men were discussed and approved, and it is understood that the government will in the course of a day or two issues a communique on the sub-

It is learned that the War Office asked the Fifth Royal Irish Rifles (militia) to volunteer for service at the front in South Africa. The colonel of the regiment replied that he believed

the men would gladly do so. SHOOT BOERS WEARING KHAKI. The correspondents at Pretoria say that in view of the Boers' continuous treacherous use of khaki, Gen. Kitchener is about to issue severe regulations. One correspondent says these will take the form of a proclamation warning the Boers that if they are captured wearing British uniforms or

badges they will be shot. METHUEN'S MOVEMENTS. Important and sweeping movements are about to be taken by Gen. Methuen, whose headquarters is at Vryburg, 102 miles south of Mafeking. His operations will extend a long distance east and west of Vryburg. GEN. BRABANT'S WORDS.

Cape Town, Jan. 15 .- Gen. Brabant, addressing a meeting of peninsula mayors, held to discuss the question of recruiting, said that the military authorities were very anxious to keep the war away from Cape Town if pos-sible, and that the only hope of doing this was in sending eight hundred or a thousand men to the front from Cape Town. No precaution must be omitted against the enemy coming further down. He added that so far as he could judge the Boers had met with no response to their appeal for colo-nual volunteers. He hoped to be able to send a sufficiently strong force to the front to make it absolutely impossible for the invaders to get nearer to Cape Town than they are now. THE INVADERS.

It is stated that the Boers have arrived at Clan William, about 85 miles north of the capital. The British who are pursuing them are three hours be-

HOT WORK. The casualty list shows that there

a loss of six killed, seventeen wound-ed and five missing, at Murraysburg, of which the Dutch are said to have been joining the invaders. Murravsburg is sixteen miles west of Graaf Indications are not wanting that the

decision of the government to reinforcements has not been taken a moment too soon. Col. 'Colville's mobile column, which has been pursuing the Boers, has been obliged to rest at Greylingstad, to erect a blockhouse and to sease operations until reinforced by mounted troops. Gen. Paget has taken his force to Pretoria to refit. Many of the men are suffering from enteric fever.

CONVOY CAPTURED. Three hundred Boers captured a small British convoy at Bronkhurst-spruit, near Pretoria, but made off af-

ter liberating the prisoners. A Cape Town dispatch says: Sir Alfred Milner's consultative committee of uitlanders is telegraphing to the various committees of the uitlanders throughout the country the terms of the formation of guards for mines. Each mining company is to pay and furnish its own men.

NO TIME FOR JUBILATION. Lord Roberts emphasizes the unsatisfactory condition of South Africa in a letter to the mayor of Portsmouth proposing the presentation of a sword of honor from that city. He says: "It is most distasteful to me to be honored and feted and called upon to rejoice while so many are in bitter grief and before we can properly return thanks that the cloud has been rolled away which has for more than a year darkened the homes and crushed the

hearts of so many in our country." MAFEKING COMPENSATION. Came Town, Jan. 16.-The war losses compensation commission has awarded £103,128 for the damage done to Mafeking by shell fire. The sum of £25,000 goes to the railways and government, £12,000 to the farmers, £28,000 to the natives, and £23,000 to the

inhabitants generally. LOSSES DURING THE WAR. London, Jan. 16.-The war office has issued a table showing the total casualties in the South African force to Jan. 1, 1901. The fact that the war is not over is shown by the fact that the casualties during December totaled 2,424, of which number 211 were killed in action, 456 died of disease in South Africa, and 25 were accidentally killed.
