DISTINCTIVE HANDWRITING!

Important Evidence Presented at the Trial of the Sifton Will Case.

Numerous Witnesses Say That the Signature to the Disputed Will Is Not in the Writing of Joseph H. Sifton—Experts Reach the Same Conclusion, and Explain Their Methods of Analyzing Handwriting.

With no opposing counsel to cross-examine, and so double the length of their stay on the stand, the witnesses in the Sifton will case yesterday afternoon gave their evidence expeditiously and made way for the next comer. Owing to the course adopted by the defense in withdrawing and letting the case go by default, the hearing of the action progressed at a rate seldom witnessed in a court of law, and the case, which was expected to be a lengthy one, will probably have, after all, occupied only a moiety of the time which the public thought would be required. It was not till after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon that the interesting testimony which had been looked for was developed. Four experts, two recognized as foremost members of their profession in the United States, and the other two equally well known in their line in Canada, took the stand

MORE MEN FOR GEN. KITCHENER

British War Office Decides to Enlist 5,000 Yeomanry Volunteers.

The Fifth Royal Irish Rifles Asked To Go—Proposal to Shoot All Boers Wearing Khaki—Severe Fighting in Cape Colony—Losses During the War.

London, Jan. 16.—The government has decided to send large reinforcements to Lord Kitchener, and the War Office in carrying out this decision, has determined to enlist 5,000 yeomanry volunteers. At a meeting held at the War Office yesterday (Tuesday) afternoon, this plan and others for securing more men were discussed and approved, and it is understood that the government will in the course of a day or two issue a communique on the subject.

It is learned that the War Office asked the Fifth Royal Irish Rifles (militia) to volunteer for service at the front in South Africa. The colonel of the regiment replied that he believed the men would gladly do so.

SHOOT BOERS WEARING KHAKI.
The correspondents at Pretoria say that in view of the Boers' continuous treacherous use of khaki, Gen. Kitchener is about to issue severe regulations warning the Boers that if they are captured wearing British uniforms or badges they will be shot.

METHUEN'S MOVEMENTS.
Important and sweeping movements are about to be taken by Gen. Methuen, whose headquarters is at Vryburg, 102 miles south of Mafeking. His operations will extend a long distance east and west of Vryburg.

GEN. BRABANT'S WORDS.
Cape Town, Jan. 15.—Gen. Brabant, addressing a meeting of the peninsula mayors, held to discuss the question of recruiting, said that the military authorities were very anxious to keep the war away from Cape Town if possible, and that the only hope of doing this was in sending eight hundred or a thousand men to the front from Cape Town. No precaution must be omitted against the enemy coming further down. He added that so far as he could judge the Boers had met with no response to their appeal for colonial volunteers. He hoped to be able to send a sufficiently strong force to the front to make it absolutely impossible for the invaders to get nearer to Cape Town than they are now.

THE INVADERS.
It is stated that the Boers have arrived at Clan William, about 85 miles north of the capital. The British who are pursuing them are three hours behind.

Welcomed Home.

ON WHITE HORSES.
Two thousand people greeted King'sville's returning soldier boys at the railway station Tuesday morning. A address of welcome was read by the mayor. The seven boys and Trooper Allen, of Windsor, who recently returned, were quickly mounted on white horses. The Kingsville cavalry, 50 strong, the Leamington company of the 21st Battalion, 40 strong, and the Leamington company of Daughters of the Regiment, 30 strong, accompanied by the Leamington and Kingsville brass bands and the Windsor bugle corps, formed the military part of the parade. There were also three of Chatham's returned soldiers belonging to the artillery corps in line. The old veterans of 1870 of Essex county, in hacks, led the procession. A fifteen minutes' thanksgiving service was held in the Methodist Church. All the ministers of the town participated in the services on the conclusion of which the men reformed, and the parade was continued through the main street, and ended at the town hall. The crowd from the surrounding country had by this time swelled to three thousand. All the churches in town were open to accommodate the crowd. At the military concert each returning lad was made the recipient of a solid gold watch suitably engraved.

NOTES.
Lieut. H. Z. C. Cockburn, of the Canada Mounted Rifles, is aboard the Galeka, which is due at Southampton on Thursday afternoon.

A royal reception awaited Frank Loosmore, lately returned from South Africa, on his arrival in Whitby, to resume his position in the Dominion Bank there.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., gun squad have attended all the receptions tendered the Niagara Falls men who went to South Africa, and each time with their dynamite cannon have added to the enthusiasm of the different processions.

Military men, who claim to know the circumstances of the case, say that the government is going to give Manitoba a chance to distinguish herself by supplying the thousand men wanted by the Baden-Fowell constabulary.

A benefit concert was given by Brockville to the blind trooper, Mulloy, Monday night. The total receipts amounting to \$180, were presented to the blind hero.

An enthusiastic crowd of citizens of Picton, Ont., turned out to welcome home and do honor to Dr. Robinson, of Coneseon; Trooper Terrill, of Wellington and P. Guest, of Picton, who recently returned from South Africa. The boys were met at the station by a large crowd and there was a big procession. The afternoon was made a public holiday.

The Railways.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 15.—Andrew Carnegie chose Conneaut, Ohio, for his new tube plant so that proximity to the lake route would enable him to deal with the Pennsylvania Railroad, which had doubled its freight rates from the seaboard. The railroad is now making all kinds of concessions.

General O'Grady-Haly has heard nothing of the report that recruiting for the South African Constabulary has been postponed. He is continuing his preparations for the enrollment of recruits in Canada.

The north wall of the new drill hall being constructed at Vancouver, B. C., by Mr. Lachance, of Quebec, fell in on Saturday, doing damage estimated by the contractor at \$6,000. Lachance attributes the mishap to severe weather.

Lieut.-Col. Hudon has received a telegram from the officials of the G. T. R. at Montreal to the effect that the bag of money which was left in the train had been recovered and would be forwarded at once.
