## FOR ONE WEEK

The Town of Medicine Lodge, Kansas, Will Be Under  
Mrs. Nation's Rule.

Medicine Lodge, Kan., April 18.—Mrs. Carrie Nation, the saloon smash-  
er, is to conduct the municipal affairs  
of this place for one week. If, during  
that time, according to the agreement,  
Mrs. Nation betters the condition of  
trade and social relations in Medicine  
Lodge, her ideas will be adopted per-  
manently and the city run along the  
lines thus laid down. If business  
should fall off during the week and a  
majority of the citizens grow dissatis-  
fied with her conduct of affairs, then  
the city officers will continue to run  
it "wide open."

It is said that Mrs. Nation will form  
a colony and make the race into the  
new Kiowa and Comanche reserves,  
soon to be thrown open to settlement.  
Then they will be able to get a whole  
town site cheap and an ideal town can  
be started.  
The Women's Christian Temperance  
Association promises to co-operate  
with Mrs. Nation in her experiment  
here.

## SMITH-DORRIEN

IS PROMOTED!

To the Rank of Adjutant-General to the  
Forces in India.

Gen. Kitchener Reports Good Progress Made by Plumer's  
and Douglass' Forces—The Situation Stated by  
Milner—Praise for Col. Hughes.

PROMOTION FOR SMITH-DORRIEN.  
London, April 18.—Major-Gen. Hor-  
ace Lockwood Smith-Dorrien, now in  
South Africa, is to be promoted to the  
rank of adjutant-general to the forces  
in India.

**BRITISH SUCCESSES.**  
London, April 18.—A dispatch from  
General Kitchener, dated Pretoria,  
Wednesday, April 17, says:

"Plumer has occupied Rathfont, cap-  
turing thirteen prisoners and a num-  
ber of rifles and ammunition.  
"Douglass' column has occupied  
Dullstrom. Six Boers were killed.  
"On General Kitchener's advance  
from Lydenburg the Boers blew up a  
Long Tom. Thirteen prisoners were  
captured.  
"Elliott's division has brought in a  
large number of cattle."

Col. Plumer has occupied Chumies  
Port without opposition. The place is  
a difficult pass, flanked by precipitous  
mountains. It was expected that the  
Boers would defend it, but they retired  
three days before the arrival of the  
British. The latter found a thick popu-  
lation of Kaffirs reaping an abundant  
harvest. The country is very fertile.  
Col. Plumer's advance has been checked  
by Commandant Beyers' prepara-  
tions to lead his commando into the  
Cape Colony to help the invaders there.  
Col. Plumer has been nursing a  
wound at Warm Baths, refused to re-  
tire on the approach of the British,  
and voluntarily surrendered.  
On March 7 to have been killed at  
Lichtenburg.]

Advices from Heilbron say that An-  
dries Wessels is alive. Wessels accom-  
panied Morgan Dael on his visit to  
the Boers in the capacity of a peace  
envoy, and was reported to have been  
shot by order of Gen. Dewet.

**ENEMY WEAKENING.**  
Col. Harry McMahon, M. P., has  
returned to London from South Africa,  
where he was commander of the War-  
wickshire militia. He says: "Lat-  
tely the Boers have been fighting  
doggedly under very hard circum-  
stances in some sections. In others  
they have been able to maintain  
themselves successfully. The  
British forces are carrying on a  
relentless campaign, marching on and  
fighting most of the time. My per-  
sonal belief is that the enemy is grad-  
ually being reduced to a state of help-  
lessness. It is possible that the cold  
weather may, put an end to military  
operations of any consequence. How-  
ever, there will unquestionably be  
heavy police duties for our men for  
many months in both the Transvaal  
and the Orange River Colony."

**THE S. A. BLUE BOOK.**  
London, April 18.—The South African  
blue book, containing recent dis-  
patches from Sir Alfred Milner and  
other official correspondence, has just  
been issued. Sir Alfred Milner wired  
under date of March 3, requesting  
permission to return home at an early  
date upon leave of absence for the pur-  
pose of resting. Mr. Joseph Chamber-  
lain granted the request, but expressed  
the government's regret that it  
should be necessary for Sir Alfred to  
leave South Africa at the present time,  
"quite recognizing, however, his need  
for rest." But I am reluctant to  
as a possible period of absence.

In a dispatch, dated Feb. 6, Sir  
Alfred Milner reviews the situation  
in South Africa, and says he had  
hoped some definite point would be  
reached at which it might be possible  
to sum up that chapter of history con-  
taining the war, and forecast the ad-  
ministrative reconstruction which  
must succeed it. "But I am reluct-  
antly forced to the conclusion that there  
will be no such dividing line," con-  
tinued Sir Alfred Milner. "I have not  
the slightest doubt of the ultimate re-  
sult, but I foresee that the work will
