THE BOER DELEGATES STILL AT KROONSTAD

Communications Pass Between Them and Steyn.**Military Men Take Little Stock in the Negotiations.****British Dragoons Have a Hot Fight With the Enemy-Boers Lose Heavily in Rear Guard Engagement.**

Kroonstad, Orange River, Tuesday, April 1.-The Transvaal delegates are still here. It is believed that General Dewet is influencing President Steyn not to meet acting President Schalk-burger.

A MILITARY VIEW.

Pretoria, Wednesday, April 2.-Communications have passed between President Steyn and the Transvaal mission at Kroonstad, but nothing is yet known of the result. The majority of the military men and civilians here expect more from the continued pressure of the troops than from the present negotiations. It is pointed out that once before, when hard pressed, the Transvaalers showed a desire for peace, but this was promptly

OVERRIDDEN BY PRESIDENT STEYN.

Nothing in the present situation so far as known, indicates that President Steyn is less irreconcilable than previously. Indeed, the known facts seem to point to a greater determination to continue the struggle. The effect of the blockade system. MANITOBA VOTES DOWN THE REFERENDUM BILL

A Large Adverse Vote Polled in Winnipeg.**Was Defeated by a Straight Majority of Several Thousands.****Bad Roads and Division in the Temperance Ranks Contributed to the Defeat of the Measure.**

Winnipeg, Man., April 2.-The Liquor Act, which was today submitted to a popular vote, has been defeated by a straight majority of several thousand. The Referendum Act stipulated that in case it should appear that only 45 per cent of electors, both on and off the list, vote in the affirmative, or (2), that at least 60 per cent of all such persons have voted, and that at least

to be others, acting in the liquor interest. But this was soon rectified. The vote against the act, starting from the city with its tremendous majority of three thousand, seemed to run generally along the railway lines due south and west.

OUTSIDE THE CITIES.

Following the lines along the south-west, the villages and towns went against the act, until Mountain, Hon. Thomas Greenway's constituency, was reached, where the vote swung the other way. For instance, at Crystal City, Greenway's headquarters, the vote stood 51 to 119 in favor of the prohibition branch. The vote generally was against the act. At Neepawa, Hon. J. A. Davidson's seat, which has been a prohibition town always, the vote was 173 against and 14 for.

The vote generally in favor of the act is from the great bulk of farmers away from railway centers, towns and villages. The vote was materially reduced by the bad roads in the country, many of which are still under water or in an otherwise impassable condition.

SPLIT IN TEMPERANCE RANKS. A split in the temperance ranks and consequent inactivity greatly reduced the temperance vote. The Dominion Alliance leaders taking the stand that the act was passed by the legislature, it should be enforced without a referendum.

There was a very large vote against the act in St. Boniface, although the French section, Brandon and the other large centers of the province also followed Winnipeg in declaring against prohibition. Returns from municipalities were greatly delayed owing to the spring freshets. Those received up to 1 p.m. show a majority in the rural districts for prohibition.

LIQUOR MEN SURPRISED.

Winnipeg, April 2.-[Press dispatch]-The figures for the province received up to about midnight, exclusive of the city, were 7,241 for and 10,465 against. The vote was an agreeable surprise to the anti-prohibitionists, who hardly expected to poll such a large vote. There is little doubt but that the act will be defeated with a majority of over 5,000. In many places where the liquor men had used any influence, they were not successful.

Taken all in all the country places were fairly divided on the question, in some places the vote being a tie. As regards the city, no other result was expected.

MACLEAN WANTS MORE BANKS

Parliament's Consent Not Needed, He Thinks.**Budget Debate in Commons Due to Wind Up on Tuesday.****Conservative Members Plead for More Protection for Woolen and Cotton Industries-New Member Introduced.**

Ottawa, April 2.-The division on the budget will take place in the House of Commons on Tuesday.

Mr. Wm. Power, the newly-elected member for Quebec West, was introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick. His appearance was greeted with hearty and vigorous cheers from the government benches.

Upon the motion for the second reading of Mr. Guthrie's bill incorporating the Crown Bank of Canada, Mr. W. F. Maclean suggested to the finance minister that the bank act should be amended, so that anyone could engage in banking without coming to parliament. If that were done he believed that the banks would be established this year. If there was anything that Canada wanted, he said, it was enlarged banking facilities, and he thought that now was the time to make a change in the law. Banks should also be allowed to increase their capital without coming to parliament for a special act.

Mr. Fielding, minister of finance, replied that if any practical inconvenience or evil had arisen through the present law he would be disposed to agree with Mr. Maclean, but there had been nothing of the kind. The lines within which the bank charters were granted were clearly laid down, and all anyone had to do was to ask for a charter, when, as a rule, it was given.

Mr. Henderson, of Halifax, emphasized the fact that the granting of a parliamentary charter was one of the things which gave great stability to the banking system. The bill was given a second reading.

C. P. R. LAND. Replying to questions by Mr. Oliver, Hon. Clifford Sifton stated that 9,464,572 acres of land had been patented to the C. P. R. up to March 1, 1902, and 1,002,000 acres to the Calgary and Edmonton Railway Company up to the same date, also that the government intended to continue issuing patents to these companies until all their land had been patented to them. Mr. Sifton further stated that after consultation with the deputy minister of the interior it had been decided the best way of determining the question of the termination of the exemption from taxation of the C. P. R. land grants would be for one of the municipalities to enter suit in the courts. Arrangements are now being made for the same.

TALKING ON THE TARIFF. Mr. R. A. Pringle resumed the budget debate and made a high protection speech. He professed that the preferential tariff was damaging the cotton and woolen interests of Canada.

Mr. J. R. Lavell also talked protection and pleaded for the woolen industry.
