### Have American Silver Withdrawn From Canadian Circulation.

Government to get rid of American shown The Advertiser today.

It is a petition from the London Board of Trade, dated March 21, 1868, from circulation, and establish a minifor the coinage of silver in Canada. The local board of trade was one of the first bodies to ask for this, and may be classed among the pioneers of the movement.

One of their requests has been granted—the establishment of a mint, and the other-that American silver be gathered in-bids fair to be accomplished within a short time. About 40 years elapsed, however, be fore anything was done, demonstrating that such movements are of some-

what slow growth. The Petition. The petition is as follows:

To the Honorable the Commons of the Dominion of Canada: The Memorial of the Board of Trade of the City of London, Ontario,

Sheweth: "First-That the trade and comnerce of the Dominion and particularly that of Ontario, is suffering a serious and continuous loss by the large quantity of American and British silver coin now in circulation, and they pray that prompt measures be taken the Government to remedy the

"Second-That your memorialists respectfully submit the following mode of dealing with the question, namely that the Government make arrangement through the banks of the Dominion to call in the silver at a current rate not exceeding five per cent discount, paying therefor legal tender notes, and that its circulation be suppressed by some special enactment.

"Third-That the Government shall cause to be established a mint for the Dominion of Canada, that a standard for the currency of the Dominion be fixed by legislative enactment, and that the English sovereign be recognized for the basis. (Signed)
