

UP-TO-DATE WORK OF THE BURGLAR

London, Sept. 7 .- A story of up-todate burglary, scientific in its way but not very successful, comes from Birm-irgham. The attempt was made on the establishment of a large firm of jewellers, and it was lucky for them that the thieves' supply of oxy-hydrogen gas failed them; otherwise there might have been a very different tale

When a policeman on the beat found the place had been broken into, an investigation revealed an attempt at burglary of a character which was quite new to the English police at Having located the strong room in

the shop, the thieves cut a large hole in the brick and cement wall eighteen inches thick. How they removed the debris, which amounted to about two cart loads, is a mystery. Then they made their way to the door of the strong room, which is of heavy steel, and using gas cylinders got to work with an oxy-hydrogen blowpipe. By this means they burned out of the steel door a circular hole a couple of inches deep. Behind this two inches of steel, however, was a packing of asbestos and another inch of solid

steel. Apparently at this stage the supply of gas failed, and the thieves had to leave their work unfinished. Whether the men were disturbed or not is not known, but they left behind them their gas apparatus, a complete set of bur-glar's tools of up-to-date pattern and a portable electric plant, by which communication was made with an upper room, in which a man could be placed to give an alarm on the ap-
