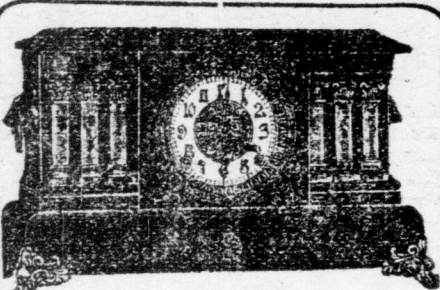

To Put the School Grounds Into Shape for Playgrounds.

At a special meeting of the board of education held on Wednesday afternoon it was decided to engage a supervisor of playgrounds for the city at \$125 a month for a period of six months.

A deputation from the Playgrounds Association, consisting of Messrs. Geo. S. Gibbons, Sheriff Cameron, E. T. White and W. J. Hill, were present, and urged upon the board the necessity of this action. The members of the board were heartily in favor of the proposition, and by a unanimous vote it was decided to engage an expert for the work. The appointment will be in the hands of No. 1 committee, who will report to the board at a special meeting to be called for that purpose.

The contract for improvements at the various schools were awarded as follows: Heating, Simcoe Street, Noble & Rich, \$5,800; Victoria School, Eggett & Co., \$4,552; Empress Avenue, Eggett & Co., \$3,155; Brickwork—Simcoe Street School, Scott Murray, \$1,740; Victoria School, T. W. Copp, \$1,229; Empress Avenue, T. W. Copp, \$1,019. Noble & Rich were awarded the contract for the plumbing at Simcoe Street School for the sum of \$2,812.

The appointment of Miss Clara Pennington as supervisor of kindergartens was ratified by the board, and Mr. Claude K. Bluet, assistant principal at St. George's School, was appointed to a position in the Collegiate, made vacant by the resignation of Mr. S. Perry.
