List of Troops To Take Part in the Celebration at Moraviantown.

Detailed arrangements for the celebration to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Battle of the Thames and the death of Indian Chief Tecumseh are contained in divisional orders for the first division, issued Thursday evening by Col. Hodgins, commanding the first division. The celebration is to take place at Moraviantown Thursday, the 16th inst.

A number of troops will take part in the demonstration among them three companies of the Twenty-sixth Regiment, in the membership of which is included a number of Indians.

The troops participating will be represented as follows: K Company, R. C. R.; composite companies from each of the following regiments: Seventh Fusiliers, Twenty-first Fusiliers, Twenty-fourth Kent Regiment, Twenty-fifth Regiment, Twenty-sixth Regiment, A, B and C Companies.

The Seventh Fusiliers will furnish the King's color, the party to consist of one subaltern and two color-sergeants.

The band will also accompany the composite company. The order of dress is to be review order, all ranks in scarlet, and the staff in blue.

The staff has been announced as follows: Lieut.-Col. B. Robson, Twenty-sixth Regiment; major, Lieut.-Col. H. D. Smith, Twenty-fourth Regiment; major, S. C. Robinson, Twenty-first Fusiliers; adjutant, Capt. G. J. Ingram, Seventh Fusiliers; sergeant-major, D. Borland, R. C. R.; bandmaster, W. O. Slater, Seventh Fusiliers.

The Seventh Regiment, with band and the regimental staff, will leave by special train on the Grand Trunk at 8 a.m. on the morning of Thursday, Oct. 16, and will mobilize at a point on the G. T. R. in the vicinity of Thamesville. Returning, all troops will entrain at 5:30 p.m.

MANY PLANS FILED FOR NEW SUBDIVISIONS

Half a Dozen Submitted to Board of Works for Approval.

From the look of the committee table at the board of works last night, the real estate exploitation from the west has been transferred to Ontario with a vengeance. No less than half a dozen plans of new subdivisions were submitted to the board for approval before being sent on to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

The subdivisions were: Adam Beck's, Merwin Heights, Wilsall Park (Dundas street east), MacArthur Farm (Wharfedale road), unnamed subdivision in East London.

Two unnamed subdivisions, north of Huron street and west of Waterloo street.

With the exception of the Beck survey, which is on Wellington street between Sydenham and St. James streets, between 500 and 1,200 lots is contained in each of the subdivisions.

STAMP REVENUE IS STEADILY INCREASING

Figures for Six Months Were Near \$7,000,000 Mark.

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, Oct. 10.—The postage stamp revenue of Canada for the first six months of the fiscal year was \$6,748,690, an increase of \$501,164 over the same six months last year, and \$4,112,000 greater than the half year ten years ago. The September receipts increased by \$128,105 to a total of \$1,163,555.

For some time the storm-water sewer on William street, past the works of the McClary Manufacturing Company, has been blocked. An investigation was ordered, and the cause of the blockade was found in a 4-inch gas main laid through the tile. This was, correctly speaking, the primary cause only, however. A little toy boat was the real one.

Ship Sailed Away. Some time in the past this little frigate broke away from its youthful owner and went on a voyage of exploration and discovery down the subterranean river that ran through the storm sewer. All was well till the enemy's country was reached. There a boom across the river, in the form of the gas pipe, stopped its progress to the Thames. The boat rammed the pipe head on, but tipped up and stuck.
