Bridgie Webber Was Stabbed by Gangster

Squalor in the Rosenthal Case Was Attacked on New York Street.

New York, June 14.—"Bridgie" Webber, one of the four gamblers who testified against Police Lieutenant Becker and the gunman convicted of the murder of Herman Rosenthal, another gambler, was stabbed in the shoulder shortly after midnight, under circumstances which he seemed loath to explain.

He was in the St. Vincent's Hospital today suffering some pain and weak from the loss of blood, but his wound will have no serious result, unless blood-poisoning sets in. Although branded by the underworld as a "squalor," he closed up tight when the detectives tried to pry from him at the hospital the story of the attack upon him.

At first Webber tried to even hide his own identity and the fact that he had been wounded. The stabbing occurred on East Eighth street. Webber tried to walk away on the arm of a friend, hiding the wound, but on Broadway in front of Grace Church he sank exhausted and admitted to a policeman that he had been stabbed.

Detectives learned that Webber had kept a midnight engagement with Sam Paul, another gambler, whose name was often mentioned in the early stories of the Rosenthal case.

It will be just seven months next Monday that the murder of Herman Rosenthal occurred.

CROPS RETARDED BY UNFAVORABLE WEATHER IN MAY

Many Frosts and General Coolness Made Growth Somewhat Slow.

Seeding in the West Was Rushed, and Grain Is Doing Well.

Ottawa, June 12.—A bulletin of the census and statistics branch issued today gives preliminary statistics of the areas sown to the principal grain crops and reports on their condition at the end of May, according to the returns received from crop-reporting correspondents throughout Canada. The reports show that the month of May proved cold and dry, with frequent night frosts, and that these conditions, while favorable to seeding, retarded the growth of crops sown and caused them to be unseasonably backward.

Increase in Area.
The total area under wheat in Canada is provisionally estimated at 9,816,200 acres, or 57,900 acres more than in 1912, the area in spring wheat being 8,990,900 acres, or 13,100 acres more. Oats occupy 9,698,500 acres, compared with 9,216,000 acres in 1912, an increase of 482,500 acres; barley occupied 1,425,200 acres, an increase of 10,900 acres, and rye 126,500 acres, a decrease of 9,610 acres; for wheat, barley and oats taken together, the increase represents 459,500 acres. The estimated acreage under hay and clover is 7,475,600 acres, compared with 7,623,600 acres last year.

In the West.
For the three north-west provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the total wheat area is estimated at 9,012,900 acres, as compared with 8,861,800 acres; that of oats at 5,207,700 acres compared with 4,913,900 acres, and that of barley is 852,600 acres, compared with 808,800 acres. These differences representing increases of 151,100 acres for wheat, 293,800 acres for oats, and 43,800 acres for barley, or 488,600 acres for the three crops.

Generally Favorable.
On May 31, the condition of the crops was reported as generally favorable throughout Canada. Except in a percentage of the usual standard of 100, taken as representing the promise of a full crop, the condition on May 31 for the Dominion was as follows: Fall wheat 80.62, spring wheat 91.55, oats 91.72, barley 91.13, rye 87.70, peas 88.24, mixed grains 90.15, hay and clover 91.12, pastures 85.58, alfalfa 77. At the corresponding date last year, the condition of fall wheat was only 71.46. All the other crops were then above 90, excepting rye 87.24, peas 83.35, and mixed grains 87.62. That poor condition this year of alfalfa is due to the effects of the winter and cold spring.

PICKPOCKETS CAUGHT

One Was Taken as He Was Stealing Farmer's Roll.

Woodstock, June 12.—Barnum & Bailey circus detectives and local police arrested three men during the circus parade this morning charged with pocket-picking. One man lost eighty dollars in a crowd in Dundas street, and one of the prisoners was caught red-handed as he was extracting a roll of money from the pocket of a farmer. The loss of several smaller amounts was reported.

DIED AT AYLMER

John H. Walker Had Been in Business Many Years.

Aylmer, June 14.—John H. Walker, jewelry merchant, is dead at his home here. Mr. Walker was 67 years of age, and had been in poor health for the last six months. He was a member of the Anglican Church, and a Conservative. The deceased is survived by a widow, three daughters and two sons. Mrs. George Barrett and Mrs. John Gillen, of Toronto, are sisters.

GAS EXPLODED

Three Workmen Were Hurt in Accident at Ayr.

Ayr, June 13.—One man was severely injured and two slightly burned in a fire here today which followed an explosion of gas at the factory of the John Watson Manufacturing Company. Albert Melvin, foreman of the molding department, sustained burns on the face, neck and hands. Richard Watson and John Urquhart were less seriously hurt.

The gas plant was completely destroyed before the fire could be brought under control.
