

NORWAY INDIGNANT OVER SHIP SINKING

Beldridge Has "Norway" in Large Letters Painted on Sides.

BUT SUBMARINE FIRED

Norwegian Press Discusses Possible Means of Retribution.

CHRISTIANIA (via London), Feb. 21.—Indignation at the sinking of the Norwegian tank steamship Beldridge by a German submarine, near Polkestone, is expressed by the morning papers, which discuss possible means of demanding satisfaction.

"We presume the Norwegian Government will ask Germany to make a declaration whether the sinking of the Beldridge was a mistake or a deliberate action," says the Morgenbladet. "Presumably, neutral powers in their notes to Germany made all reservation regarding compensation for life and property which may be lost by the carrying out of the German threat to torpedo ships without previous examination."

May Seize German Ships. Legitimate claims of neutrals to indemnity are refused, the respective countries naturally will consider the question of placing an embargo on German ships lying in their various ports until a satisfactory arrangement is made of this economic question."

The Aftenposten considers there is no longer any reason why neutral countries should not seek means to avert the danger menacing shipping.

Won't Abandon Rights. The Norwegian Journal of Commerce and Shipping says: "The torpedoing of the Beldridge is an event which is unnecessary further to characterize. The ship was bound from one neutral port to another. She had been ordered to paint the word 'Norway' in large letters on her sides, which surely was done. A repetition of the case may easily result in the greatest obstacles in the way of good relations with Germany. Needless to say, we shall not abandon the right of thousands of years to sail the open sea as neutrals."

MAP OF ST. LAWRENCE IN THE POSSESSION OF ARRIVALS FROM ITALY

Disguised as Russian Immigrants, But May Be German Officers.

PORTLAND, Me., Feb. 21.—Private sources received here from Canadian sources state that two men, who arrived from an Italian port at Boston, today, are under surveillance as suspected German spies.

It is asserted that the men were disguised as Russian immigrants, but that an examination of their baggage revealed evidence that they were German officers. This evidence, it was said, included a map of the St. Lawrence River and the bridges over it. It was said that the men were bound for Canada.

SLAYER OF INDIAN REFUSES TO PLEAD

(Special to The Advertiser.) SARNIA, Feb. 21.—Sidney Shorkey was arraigned in the Port Huron police court Saturday on a charge of murder and through his attorney, Alex. Moore, refused to plead, and a plea of not guilty was entered by Judge Black. Shorkey was remanded to jail without bail and his examination was set for next Saturday morning.

Owing to several features of the case which have developed since the tragedy on Russell Island, it was decided by the prosecution to place a charge of murder against the man, which embodies manslaughter. Shorkey weighs about 240 pounds and is suspected his mind is not exceptionally bright.

It is understood that a plea of self-defense may be put in.

SUBMARINE SINKS BRITISH VESSEL WITHOUT WARNING

Crew of Cambank Given No Time To Prepare—All But Four Escape In Boats—Downdrive Was Another Victim of Explosive.

LIVERPOOL, via London, Feb. 21.—Without warning a German submarine torpedoed the British steamer Cambank, a few miles east of Llandudno, in the Irish Sea, about 11 o'clock Saturday morning. The explosion killed the third engineer and two firemen. Another member of the crew was drowned in an attempt to jump into a boat. The rest of the crew and the pilot, twenty in all were saved.

TORPEDO STRUCK AMIDSHIPS. One of the men, in describing the experience of the Cambank, said:

"We were bound from Huelva, Spain, for Liverpool with a cargo of copper. When outside of Amlweh, on the north coast of Wales, we took aboard a pilot. We had gathered speed when a periscope was observed about two hundred yards away. The engines were reversed, but while the vessel was turning, the submarine discharged a torpedo, which struck us amidships."

CREW BARELY ESCAPED.

"We launched the lifeboats and managed to pull clear before the Cambank sank. We had not time to save anything and most of us were scantily clad and much exhausted when a boat took us in charge and towed us into Amlweh Harbor."

A steamer, which has arrived here, reports that she had been warned by the Cambank that there was a submarine in the vicinity. She at once put on full steam and, being a speedy vessel, reached port safely.

SUBMARINE U-12 SINKS IRISH COASTING CRAFT.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—6:50 p.m.—The small Irish-coasting steamer Downshire was sunk last night by a German submarine off Cape of Man, an island in the Irish Sea. The Germans gave the crew five minutes in which to leave their ship. The crew landed last night at Durdun, County Down.

The submarine which sank the Downshire was the U-12. The Germans fired three shots at the steamer before her captain gave up. After the crew of the Downshire had taken to the boats, the Germans placed a bomb amidships of the steamer, and exploded it, the Downshire sinking in a few minutes.

The German submarine U-12 is one of the class built in 1910-11. She is of 250-ton displacement, and has a maximum cruising radius of 1,200 miles. The

vessel has a complement of twelve men. Her armament includes three 18-inch torpedo tubes, and two one-pounder, high angle guns. She has a speed of thirteen knots above water, and eight knots submerged.

AUSTRIA GETS INTO PIRATE CLASS ALSO.

GENEVA, via Paris, Feb. 21.—4:40 a.m.—Austria will follow Germany's lead in its treatment of neutral shipping in the Adriatic, although possessing few submarines, says a dispatch from Innsbruck.

It is reported here that Emperor William of Germany and Francis Joseph of Austria-Hungary with their staffs soon will hold a conference at some town near the frontier between the two countries. The rulers have not met since the war began.

COUNTER ATTACK BEGUN BY RUSSIA

Tables Turned In East Prussia German Assault Expected In Galicia.

LONDON, Feb. 22—3:10 a.m.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Times says that the Russian counter-move against the German advance from East Prussia has begun along a front of 100 miles to the north of the Bzura and Sarew Rivers.

The Russian losses in East Prussia as given by the German commander, are described as "fanciful," although they were undoubtedly heavy. In Petrograd it is thought that the German movement in East Prussia is a diversion to conceal more important operations in Galicia, to which country the Germans apparently intend to direct their main effort.

Six new German army corps have been concentrated south of the Carpathians.

Germany's Blow Falls Short. "The crushing blow, which Germany hoped to deliver against the Russians from East Prussia, has fallen short," telegraphs the Daily Mail's Petrograd correspondent. "The Russians have exterminated their main body from the German pincers, and the Germans, instead of attacking are being attacked. Russian reinforcements are arriving constantly in large numbers."

"A fierce attack from the direction of Lomza compelled the Germans to bring troops from the north and abandon for the moment their advance toward the river Niemen, where only their cavalry is operating in small bodies. The German movement toward the fortress of Novo Georgievsk, conducted less energetically. All along the line, in fact, there is noticeable a slackening of effort."

MINE DESTROYS AMERICAN VESSEL

Steamer Evelyn Goes Down Off German Coast—She Carried Cotton.

BERLIN, via London, Feb. 21, 7:40 p.m.—The American steamer Evelyn, which sailed from New York on January 29 with a cargo of cotton for Bremen, struck a mine off Borkum Island, in the North Sea, yesterday. The vessel sank. Her captain and 27 of her crew were saved.

It has not been learned of what nationality was the mine which destroyed the Evelyn.

The Evelyn is the first American vessel to meet with disaster as a result of the sea warfare of the European nations. She did not sink within the war zone included in the German Admiralty's decree of February 4, which went into effect on Thursday. Borkum Island lies directly off the German coast, at the mouth of the Ems River, and is German territory.

Believe All Rescued. Maritime records give the complement of the Evelyn at 25 men, so that it is possible that all on board the vessel were rescued.

The Evelyn was a single screw steamer and was commanded by Capt. Smith. She belonged to the firm of Harris-Bray and Voce, and was taking a cargo of cotton to Bremen. She was 232 feet long, 27 feet beam. She was built in Southampton, England, in 1883. Her home port was Philadelphia.

The Evelyn was last reported as arriving at Rotterdam on February 17.

WRECKED ZEPPELIN ONE OF THE LATEST

Danish Aviator Inspects the Remains of Aircraft On Fanoe Island.

Copenhagen, Feb. 21.—Via London, Feb. 22.—The Danish aviator Alfred Nerve, who went to Fanoe Island to inspect the wreckage of the Zeppelin airship, which drifted ashore on the island of Fanoe last Wednesday, telegraphs the local newspapers that the disaster was due chiefly to the fact that the dirigible ran short of gasoline and also had engine trouble, which made her unmanageable in the heavy wind.

"A visit to the wreckage," says Nerve, "shows that the crew destroyed the wireless apparatus, code books and most of the machines before abandoning the airship. The dirigible was about 550 feet long and about 50 feet wide. The fittings show that it was one of the latest German products. The bomb-throwing apparatus and several bombs were still intact."

The fuel tanks had a capacity for about ten hours only, indicating that the possible radius of the airship was not over 200 miles."

WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY

President and Officials Join in Celebrating Occasion.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Washington's birthday was being commemorated here today with appropriate exercises. Government business was partially suspended with the closing of the executive and judicial departments, and President Wilson and other high officials joined in honoring Washington's memory. The legislative branch of the Government, however, was in session. The principal celebration was at Memorial Continental Hall under the joint auspices of various patriotic organizations with President Wilson on the program as the principal speaker.

NOT JAPS' BUSINESS

Former Diplomat Says European Struggle Does Not Concern Them.

New York, Feb. 22.—Speaking on "Japan in the great war," before the New Rochelle forum yesterday, Dr. Toyokichi Ikenaga, formerly lecturer in the University of Chicago, who has been in the Japanese diplomatic service, declared that the European struggle has "no direct bearing on Japan." The war, he said, was "none of our business," and he declared that the European nations should be allowed to settle their own affairs.

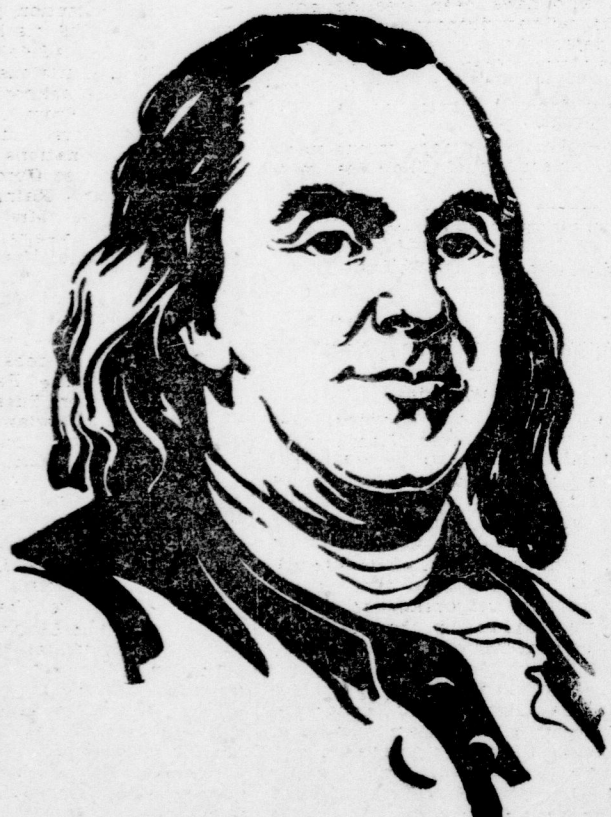

WOULD GIVE LAND TO PLEASE ITALY

German Paper Suggests That Austria Make Concessions To Neutral.

London, Feb. 22.—The Frankfurter Zeitung, in a leading article, suggests that Austria should make territorial concessions to Italy to insure the latter's neutrality, according to the Amsterdam correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company. The paper is quoted as saying:

"It is not conceivable that the correction of the frontier should in any way be prejudicial to the position of Austria-Hungary as a great power, seeing that she has recently so brilliantly displayed her strength against mighty Russia."
