CHILD MURDER AGAIN STIRS NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, May 3. — Charles Murray, four and a half years old, was murdered tonight near his home on Lower East Side. The child's mutilated body was found in the hallway of a deserted house, not far from the scene of the murder of Leonore Cohen, aged five. The Cohen girl's body was found on March 19 last, and like that of the Murray boy had been hacked with a knife. The murderer was never captured.

Charles Murray was seen playing in the backyard of his home tonight, 20 minutes before the crime occurred. A six-year-old sister of the murdered boy gave the police a description of a foreigner she said saw her carry out of the hallway before the finding of the body. A man who was accused by young girls of chasing them with knives was taken into custody shortly before the body of the Murray boy was found.

BREWERS AND RETAILERS CONDEMN LIQUOR TAX

LONDON, May 3.—The Allied Brewery Traders' Association, composed of those trades which supply machinery and other materials and supplies to brewers, adopted resolutions at a meeting today bitterly condemning the plan of David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, to restrict the liquor trade. The resolutions say that Mr. Lloyd George's plan is designed to satisfy only the extreme prohibition faction, and that some bold political objects, against which we will protest with every means in our power.

All the retail liquor dealers in London, through their trade organization, have united in a protest against the proposed increased taxation on spirits, wines and beers. They assert that since the war began, drunkenness had decreased in London, and declare that "it would be an act of the grossest injustice to penalize the millions of inhabitants because in some distant parts of the country the conduct of a few workers is condemned."

Again there are over twenty names appearing in the casualty list from this city and district. Three more Londoners are added. Brantford, which city has, to date, suffered to the extent of thirty officers and men put out of action, has heard of even more of her sons being wounded. These seven are included in the total of thirty. One of the seven, Pte. J. White, is a German, who felt that his country was in the wrong and went to fight with the Allies. He has received a German bullet.

Twenty-three Brantford men promptly volunteered, and were accepted for service when the call came from the Hamilton camp for men to fill the gaps.

SEVEN MORE ADDED TO BRANTFORD LIST; ONE IS A GERMAN.

BRANTFORD, May 3. — Casualties from this section of the province continue to become known, and over the week-end the Brantford list mounted to over thirty men and officers. The latest additions are: Pte. I. F. Scott, a young Englishman, who was employed as a showman and died with his uncle, Pte. C. Dawsell, of 14 Webbing street, a young Canadian whose parents are at present in England, and who was employed at the Adams works; Pte. Joseph Hodder, a Scot, who was transferred to the 48th Highlanders; Pte. Harry Coppin, of Mohawk street, a veteran, who served in the famous "Death of Glory Boys," 17th Lancers, a popular scoutmaster at Trinity Church in this city; Pte. H. Houlding, of Murray street, an unmarried implement maker at Messrs. Harris' works, who served three years in the 38th Dufferin Rifles; Pte. E. Phipps, of Greenhew street, who was seriously wounded at Langemarck, and Pte. J. White, of 145 Henry street.

They are all expected to recover. The last-named, Pte. White, is a German, who has lived in Brantford for a number of years, and who felt, as he stated, the injustice of his own fatherland. Therefore he enlisted on the side of the Allies and has fought against his own countrymen at Ypres, receiving wounds which may have meant death.

TWO CHESLEY MEN ARE AMONG WOUNDED.

Both young men were born here and their parents and near relatives live here.

GALT ADDS THREE TO THOSE WOUNDED.

GALT, May 3.—Ptes. Albert E. Wilkins, Alex. W. Grant and Charles Pinner, of the 29th Regiment's detachment in France, were this morning reported wounded in telegrams received by relatives from the militia department.

Pte. Wilkins was 20 years of age and was born in Galt and had lived here all his life. He is well known in sporting circles, having played both baseball and hockey, and was a very popular member of the Amity Club. Galt's leading young men's organization. His father, Philip Wilkins, a brother and sister, Harry and Josephine, live at 23 King street.

Pte. Alexander Walker Grant had been a resident of Galt for four years. He is 24 years of age and was born in Aberdeen, Scotland. He has a sister, Janet, who lives at 51 Forest road, and has two brothers in the Old Country, one of whom is now with the artillery.

He was a well known football player, a star member of the Sons of England team of last year. He has a brother, James, with the 34th Battalion now stationed at Guelph. Pinner is about 23 years of age and was born in England and had lived in Galt nearly two years, being employed previously at the Goldie & McCulloch Works.

DOHERTY DENIES REPORT OF SHERBROOKE MEETING

OTTAWA, May 3.—Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, who returned from Montreal and Sherbrooke late tonight, classified the statements made in a dispatch sent to the Montreal Herald-Telegraph from Sherbrooke that the Governor-General refused to sign an order for the dissolution of Parliament as an absolute fabrication. He stated to the Canadian Press after reading the dispatch:

"I said nothing of the kind. Nothing that I said in Sherbrooke could be interpreted in the way that it was by the correspondent of the Montreal Herald-Telegraph. It is absolutely untrue; an absolute fabrication. I don't know that I can put it more emphatically than that. Moreover, I did not speak at a public meeting in Sherbrooke. I did speak to friends, both in French and English, but did not make any such statements as credited to me. Again, I repeat, they are an absolute fabrication."

He also stated that a man who had been substituting for him temporarily in the trenches had been killed.

DRAWN LIGHT SENTENCE ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

CHATHAM, May 3.—Rube Atkins, the Camden township young man sentenced to a month in jail for having carnal knowledge of a girl under fourteen years, it is understood that Atkins made restitution to the parents, hence the light sentence.

Six months in the Ontario reformatory was the sentence drawn by James Mills, a farm laborer, found guilty of attacking his employer Mr. Wilcox.
