PETROGRAD, June 25 (via London, June 26.-3:48 a.m.)-The following Russian official statement regarding the progress of hostilities was given out here

"During the course of the night of June 24 and the whole of the following day, in the Shavli region an artillary duel proceeded with advance guard encounters on the front Latzkovo-Pope-liary and along the right bank of the Niemen River. To the west of the middle Niemen the German offensive during he night, between the Kovno-Wirballen Railway and the Amalya marshes, was

repulsed by our fire. "On the Narew front the fighting was confined to sharp artillery firing and local outpost encounters. The fighting local outpost encounters. was most violent the night of the 21st in the district of the Omulew and Orzyc valleys. After artillery preparation, the Germans took the offensive along these rivers, but were soon stopped.
