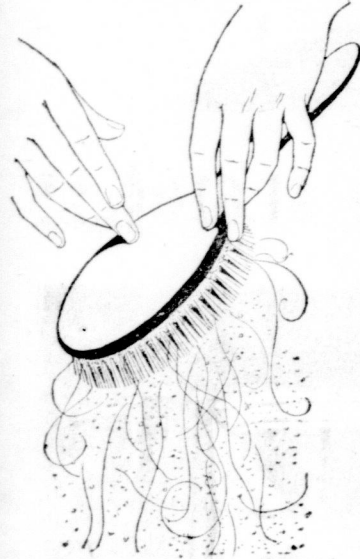

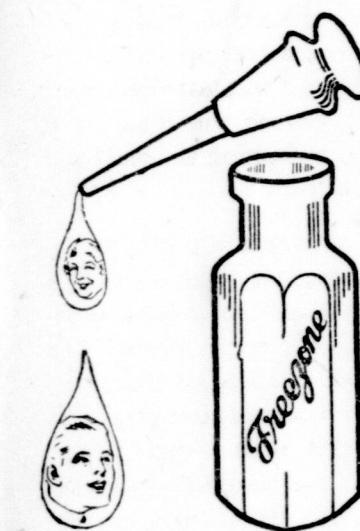

STATES MINERS DISCARD STRIKE ON JOB POLICY

Hon. James Murdock Reports Progress in Nova Scotia Situation.

CLASHES WITH MEIGHEN

Minister of Labor and Opposition Leader Discuss Gillen Board.

OTTAWA, April 21.—(By Canadian Press).—The "strike-on-the-job" policy has been abandoned by the Nova Scotia miners. This information was given to the house tonight by Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, and it preceded an interesting verbal passage-at-arms between the minister and Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition.

Introduction of the main estimates of the department of labor at a late hour this evening precipitated the discussion on the situation in the Nova Scotia coal mines. On an item of \$50,000 to provide for administration of the conciliation and labor act and the printing of the Labor Gazette, Hon. H. H. Stevens (Conservative, Vancouver Centre) asked the labor minister, Hon. James Murdock, what progress was being made in Nova Scotia. It appeared from newspaper reports that progress was unsatisfactory.

Mr. Murdock stated that the Gillen board of conciliation had been reconvened, but that the chairman and the representative of the employees had resigned, stating that they had no authority to deal with the situation. The resignations of these two men had been accepted, and the department of labor immediately took steps to institute a new board. The situation now was that the representatives of the employees had made a recommendation for appointment.

Time Has Elapsed.
The company had not yet submitted the name of its representative, and the time allowed them elapsed to-night. If the company failed to submit a name, it would fall to the minister to select its representative. When this was done five more days must elapse to give the two representatives an opportunity to choose a chairman. Failing agreement, the minister would appoint a chairman.

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen said the government had wasted time in reconvening the old board. Under the statute, it could not function. When its representatives resigned, they were leaving positions which they never held. He could not help but think that the minister had been aware of this all along. However, he was glad to see that something had at last been done. He hoped that the new board would go to the root of the trouble and learn all the facts.

Mr. Meighen also expressed the hope that when the minister of labor made a declaration of policy he would be stating the views of the government and not of himself. It was unsatisfactory to have the minister's policy, as stated in the house, denied by his colleagues.

Held Long Debate.
Mr. Murdock replied that he had all along been of opinion that it was impossible to reconvene the Gillen board for the purpose of reinvestigating the reference. The leader of the opposition had suggested that action for the sake of placing some reflection on himself or other members of the government.

Then followed a long argument between Mr. Meighen and the minister of labor, regarding the former's remarks in connection with the reconvening of the Gillen board. When this concluded the item carried.

Labor department estimates totaling \$272,000 were carried. On the request of Hon. H. H. Stevens (Conservative, Vancouver Centre) the last item of \$100,000 for unemployment relief, was allowed to stand.

The premier stated that private members' resolutions on the order paper would be taken up on Monday. If these were gone through, supply would be the order of the day. The vote for the relief of unemployment would then be considered.

Mr. King stated estimates of the railway department would be considered on Tuesday.

The house adjourned at 11:15 p.m.

DEBATE LARKIN REPORT.

OTTAWA, April 21.—(By Canadian Press).—Further consideration of agriculture estimates in the House of Commons today gave rise to a sharp discussion on the Hon. P. C. Larkin of Toronto, who recently was appointed Canadian high commissioner in London. It was in reference to the British embargo on Canadian cattle.

Had Mr. Larkin, as reported in special cable dispatches, it was asked, represented to members of the British cabinet that failure to remove the cattle ban would place a potential weapon of considerable power in the hands of annexationists of the Prairie Provinces?

Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture, was frankly skeptical that Mr. Larkin had ever made such a statement, but eventually intimated that he would make inquiries.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, observed that similar sentiments had about a week ago been attributed to an unnamed Canadian. Now they were being attributed to Mr. Larkin, and perhaps without Mr. Larkin's knowledge.

Denies Statements.

While on the question of "annexationists" Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition, took occasion warmly to deny that he had at any time ever said anything reflecting on the loyalty of Western Canada.

A. J. Lewis (Progressive, Swift Current) read a special cable from London to the Montreal Gazette which attributed the statement to Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian high commissioner at London, that unless the British embargo on Canadian cattle was removed it would place a

potential weapon of considerable power in the hands of the annexationists of the Prairie Provinces.

This statement, Mr. Lewis said, should not be permitted to pass unchallenged, and should be dealt with immediately by Parliament. It constituted a reflection on the loyalty and integrity of the people of the Prairie Provinces.

Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture, declared that he did not believe Mr. Larkin made any such statement. He had conversations with Mr. Larkin just prior to that gentleman's departure for England, and they both agreed that while they should endeavor to get the embargo removed, they should use the "light pedal."

It was impossible to approach the British government with a club, and Mr. Motherwell felt confident that Mr. Larkin had not indulged in the words attributed to him. Mr. Motherwell added that he would maintain this until evidence to the contrary was submitted to him.

Cable Costs High.
H. C. Hocken (Conservative, Toronto) asked if the government would get in touch with Mr. Larkin by cable, and let the house know what actually had occurred. Mr. Motherwell objected that there would be a large cable bill involved.

The matter was interrupted by shouts of laughter from the Conservative and Progressive benches, and Mr. Hocken interjected: "I'll pay the bill."

"If everything which appeared in the press was made the subject of a cable it would run up a considerable bill," Mr. Motherwell added.

"I wouldn't be surprised," he continued, "that as a result of yesterday's debate some really remarkable cables appeared in the London papers."

Mr. Lewis declared that the Gazette correspondent in London should be made to retract his report of Mr. Larkin's statements if it were found to be untrue.

Urges Prompt Action.
Right Hon. Arthur Meighen declared it was remarkable that the question of costs should intervene. It was the duty of the government to find out immediately whether or not Mr. Larkin had made the statement attributed to him. Mr. Motherwell should take action without delay fully to inform the house on the situation.

Mr. Motherwell stated, as the subject appeared to be dismissed, that he would reconsider his decision and that when this estimate was through committee he would take whatever steps might appear necessary. There had been a great deal of comment about "annexationists in the West," he added.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, rose at this point with the newspaper in his hand, and said that found in it the same article as had been published a week ago, founded on a statement said to have been made by some Canadian who was then unnamed. Apparently that statement had now been credited to Hon. Mr. Larkin, and perhaps without Mr. Larkin's knowledge.

T. W. Caldwell (Progressive, Carleton Place) spoke of the "annexationist" charges as having been made by prominent men, including the leader of the opposition.

Might Be Misquoted.
This brought Right Hon. Mr. Meighen to his feet to declare that no words of his could have been interpreted as reflecting on the loyalty of Western Canada; even the newspaper dispatches could not have been read in that way. Mr. Larkin might have been misquoted, said Mr. Meighen, adding that he had sympathy for the high commissioner in that regard.

"No word of mine could be construed as a reflection on the loyalty of the West," said Mr. Meighen. "But when a statement gets around that when a group of men are seeking office are ready to fall into the very things they previously condemned then it might be so construed."

The leader of the opposition added that if Mr. Larkin was going to repeat statements after they were so treated then the sooner he was recalled the better. However, Mr. Meighen was prepared to accept Mr. Fielding's explanation.

Mr. Motherwell rose to say that he had not mentioned Mr. Meighen's name in the matter of annexation talk, but the leader of the opposition had done the cap and pulled it away down over his ears. Mr.

FAMOUS ARTIST IS VISITING ST. MARYS

Arthur Streeton Gains Honors as Australia's Greatest Artist.

WIFE IS CANADIAN

Couple Who Are Internationally Known Holidaying in Stone Town.

ST. MARYS, April 21.—St. Marys is at present host to two persons of world fame in the realm of art—Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Streeton. Mr. Streeton is Australia's greatest artist, and his wife, formerly Nora Clench of St. Marys, who has won high international honors as a violinist, are holidaying at the home of the latter's mother, who will go to Europe with her daughter soon.

"I was born in Australia; my wife is a Canadian, and our hostess is a Cockney, born in London," said Mr. Streeton. "So you see we are pretty well representative of the British Empire."

Mr. Streeton has traveled a great deal.

Many of his collections of paintings are in England and in the Carnegie Museum in Pittsburgh. His latest picture, a painting of Sydney Harbor, was purchased by New South Wales and presented to Princess Mary as a wedding gift. It has been placed in the Royal Academy in London, England. A reproduction of it Mr. Streeton carries with him.

He received his first award from the Salon in France in 1892. In 1909 he received the gold medal, which permits him to send two of his best pieces to the Salon each year.

During the war Mr. Streeton served in France as the official Australian war artist.

Although he has done little work in Canada he hopes to return to Canada to make a number of landscapes in British Columbia.

Mrs. Streeton, his noted wife, toured Europe several times.

On one occasion, by special request, she played before the late Queen Victoria.

She studied under various masters, and one of them, Joachim, once said: "I have three favorite pupils in whom I have taken a great interest, and one of these is Nora Clench of Canada."

Mrs. Streeton played in all the European capitals, being a member of a quartet, the other members being Misses May Muckle, Lucy Stone and Sicilia Gates.

LONDONER HELD ON THEFT CHARGE

TORONTO, April 21.—Earl Henderson of London, Ont., James Russell and Alice Chic of Toronto, were taken into custody today on a charge of theft from the T. Eaton store. The three are alleged to have stolen a number of dresses. There is an additional charge of having drugs, against Henderson, the police claiming that they found two packages of morphine in his possession.

STEAMER GROUNDS AT COLLINGWOOD

COLLINGWOOD, April 21.—The Canada Steamships freighter Canadian, bound for Fort William, Canadian, ashore on the rocks a mile east of Grant's Tomb, 25 miles east of this port. Her bottom has suffered damage, but it is expected that she will be released without further injury.

Meighen retorted that Mr. Caldwell had specifically referred to himself. Complaints Made.
Donald Sutherland (Conservative, South Oxford) said the vote under discussion was the most important of all those listed in the agriculture estimates. He noted the practically the whole of the amount asked for was to be distributed in Western Canada. He asked Mr. Motherwell whether he had received any complaints against commission men operating on the livestock exchange.

Rumors of such complaints having been made were current, and he thought that if they were unfounded the country should know.

Mr. Motherwell replied that practically no complaints had been received.

Mr. Sutherland turned to the British cattle embargo again, expressing the opinion that difficulties were placed in the way of the federal government when it made its effort last year to have the embargo removed.

Some of these difficulties were due to the interference of provincial ministers. One of these ministers had been rebuked by the electorate who had turned him out of office and refused to accept him as their representative in the federal house. He referred to Hon. Duncan Marshall.

"What happened to your own leader?" interjected Mr. Motherwell.

Mr. Sutherland replied that he was not referring to election results except in their relationship to the livestock question.

The vote of \$1,000,000 for livestock was then passed, as was the last vote in the department of agriculture, \$20,000 for administration of the agricultural instruction act.

BLAME BLAST ON STATE FOES

Monastir Authorities Believe Catastrophe Result of National Enmity.

Gas Fumes Hinder Work of Rescuers Searching For Victims.

MONASTIR, Jugoslavia, April 21.

Salvage work in the section of the city laid waste by Tuesday's explosion is being carried on with the greatest difficulty. Lack of water is hampering the task of putting out the numerous fires, while gas fumes are rendering the soldiers and gendarmes who are searching for victims. Two hundred bodies have been recovered, and there is little likelihood that any more persons will be rescued alive, as the cries of the wounded amid the wreckage, which were heard throughout yesterday, have now died out altogether.

Escapes Explosion.
It is still impossible to estimate the total number of persons killed, but several hundred are wounded, many of them hopelessly. Great numbers of them have been removed to the United States Hospital, which somewhat removed from the scene of the explosion, escaped with but slight damage.

Executives of the American Women's Hospital at Vro arrived last night, bringing coats and blankets. H. H. Reeder, head of the American Relief in Belgrade, is hurrying to Monastir with doctors, nurses and medicine.

Most of the houses of the city, flimsy affairs of wood and terra cotta, collapsed under the terrible explosions, burying their occupants in a mass of debris. The ruined area covers many square blocks. The only structures which resisted the explosions were Turkish minarets, which are built of solid masonry.

Day of Mourning.
King Alexander has decreed a day of mourning throughout Jugoslavia. The cabinet has ordered that a commission of army and government experts make a strict investigation to fix responsibility for the disaster, which in some quarters was attributed to enemies of the state.

FEAR LOCKOUTS EFFECT ON MILLION WORKERS

LONDON, England, April 21.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Negotiations between the employers and representatives of the Amalgamated Engineers' Union which had been in abeyance for a while, were resumed today, but they broke down just when there seemed encouragement for the belief that an agreement would be reached.

The point of difference arose on the union representatives' suggestion that the lockout notices, which had been posted up some time since, be removed, and the employers' proposal to withdraw if the men would accept as a basis of settlement the terms in the letter accompanying the notices, namely that the employers reserved the right to review the wage conditions.

This the engineers refused to do. If the threatened lockout became effective, about a million men will be involved, it is said, as kindred trade unions are concerned in the engineers' trouble.

ARRANGE ECONOMIC PACT

Soviet Russia Concludes New Treaty With Chitan Government.

MOSCOW, April 21.—A new economic treaty has been concluded between Soviet Russia and the Far Eastern republic of Siberia, the Chita government, it is learned today.

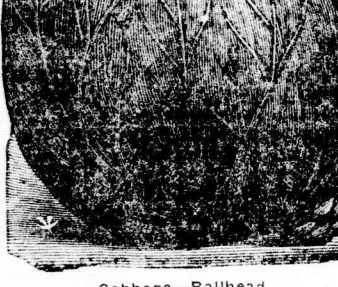
The treaty gives Russia preferred rights on all concessions in the Far Eastern republic, and in general accords Russia a great degree of economic control in Far Eastern territory.
