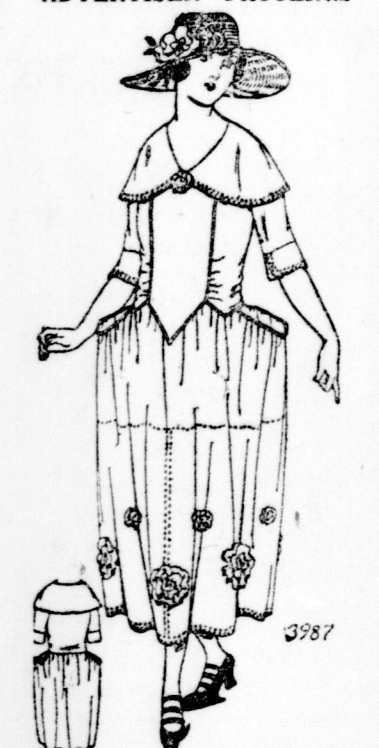
LEARNS MANY THINGS.

TORONTO BARRISTER DIES

Henry W. Maw Succumbs to Attack of Acute Indigestion.

TORONTO, July 6.—Stricken with acute indigestion, death came suddenly this afternoon at his summer home at Restoule, in the Parry Sound district, to Henry W. Maw, a well-known Toronto barrister. Mr. Maw left Toronto on his vacation a week ago and was apparently in excellent health until the attack occurred. His wife was with him when he passed away.

The late Mr. Maw, who was in his 62nd year, was born at Elora, Ont., and was a son of the late Robert Maw. After graduating at Osgoode Hall, he began the practice of law in Toronto.

He was for many years associated with H. Hartley Dewar, K.C., as a member of the legal firm of Dewar, Maw and Hudson, but about the beginning of the present year he entered into partnership with Captain Norman Macdonnell under the name of Maw & Macdonnell. He was a Methodist and a member of Ashlar Lodge A. F. and A. M.

RED CORD GUIDE COMES TO CANADA

An even grander personage than a "mere" holder of a blue cord (though there are none yet possessing such standard of efficiency in Canada) is to be in this country from England for the next few months holding officers' training camps. Miss Bruges, the exponent of girl guiding, whose visit has been anticipated with much interest, is a red cord guide, and no less, according to information just received by Mrs. Harmon Westland, secretary of the Ontario Provincial Council, from Miss Herrington of Napanee, recently-appointed organizing secretary of the Canadian Council of Girl Guides. She is booked to go to British Columbia for July, which means that hopes of securing her to conduct a commissioners' training camp for the province in this city in August are rather slender. Arrangements may be possible, but it is stated the Canadian West is manifesting a very live interest in the Girl Guide movement, and the prospects are a strong effort will be made to keep her there as long as she can stay.

Under any circumstances, before she returns to England a provincial training camp for officers to qualify for the blue cord will be held some place near Toronto. Several took a

similar course last August at the camp held at Haverhill College, Jarvis street. Though an excellent showing was made by a number of the candidates, Miss Maynard, the blue cord instructor and examiner, did not consider that any quite measured up to the desired standard of efficiency. So close to the mark were some, however, that they were awarded provisional blue cords. These will have an opportunity to complete the qualifying, while it is expected a large number of others will endeavor to realize the difficult objective.

HAMILTON WOMAN KILLED BY TRAIN

HAMILTON, July 6.—Mrs. Edith Gibbs, wife of William Gibbs, this Russia and Great Britain, it is said, by a G. T. R. train near the Desjardines Canal.

KILLED WHEN PLANE FALLS.

DETROIT, July 6.—Captain George C. Tinsley of the army aviation corps was killed at the Selfridge Aviation Field, Mount Clemens, near here today, when his plane crashed to the ground from a height of 150 feet, and burst into flames.

CLAIMS LOAN IS HOPE OF CHINA

Members of Parliament Engaged in Intrigue To Gain Control.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen Insists On Restoration To Presidency.

PEKING, July 6.—Despite the fact that the Provincial Assembly in Kwangtung has expressed sympathy with the unification plan, the authorities here are considerably worried over the return of Dr. Sun Yat-sen's troops toward Canton and the stubborn attitude adopted by Sun himself. Trouble is also threatened from the mid-China province, while Gen. Chang Tso-lin's attitude still is uncertain.

Without a large loan it is impossible to see how the country can be unified and the troops disbanded. All the official departments are clamoring for money, while the disorganization is greater than ever. Gen. Wu Peifu

is being severely criticized for turning south to train troops at leaving the government which is virtually named to shift for itself. There is every sign of a split in the Chih-Li party, which succeeded in overthrowing Gen. Chang. Members of Parliament, soon to be convoked, are engaged in intrigue to form a dominating group in the body. Fears are expressed that this will lead to jealousies and unrelenting action which characterized former sessions. The people are apathetic concerning the opening of Parliament.

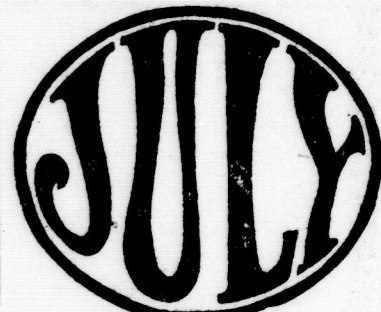
HERBERT C. BARROWS.
