SHARP PRICE DECLINES

Bears Direct Attacks Against Market Leaders in the Industrial List.

Heavy selling broke out again today on the stock exchange, carrying prices down sharply, in some instances close to the August lows. The pressure was confined almost wholly to the industrials and was largely the result of professional bear attacks, directed against a number of leaders.

U. S. Steel dropped below 88, against its high above 93 a few days ago. Baldwin Locomotive, getting down under 116, was about three points from the Friday top. Dupont fluctuated rather freely, and as it got through 120, completed a decline of approximately ten poins from its best price of the previous day.

Corn Products, American Can. the Fan.-Americans, Studebaker and U. S. Industrial Alcohol all went well below their bottom figures of Friday. Marland Oil was actively dealt in at its lowest price for the year. Under 21 it was several points from its top midway through the week, toward the close wherever prices showed a disposition to harden. Their movement suggested the covering in short commitments, made earlier in the week and by the more nimble bear traders, who have volatile industrials.

PRICES REACTIONARY IN STOCKS AND BONDS

Downward Trend Increases the Activity in Wall Street-Money Firmer.

Several reasons were assigned for the decline. Failure of operators on the long side to attract a public following was reported to have induced a resumption of speculative operations.

The reduction in the forward buying of steel and the continued unsettlement of the oil industry also have been regarded as contributing factors. The Spanish revolution, the Greco-Italian orisis, the dispute over Fiume and the delay in reaching a reparations agreement likewise were believed to have had a pessimistic effect.

The downward trend was accompanied by increased activity, the New York Stock Exchange on Thursday witnessing its first 1,000,000 share market since last June.

Car loadings for the week ending Sept. 1, the latest figures which are available, established a new high record for all time, and exceeded the previous record established the week before by more than 22,000 cars. Commodity prices were generally firm.

Money rates were somewhat firmer as a result of the calling of loans in anticipation of federal income tax payments today. Call loans touched 6 percent for the first time in six weeks, and time money was on a 5½ per cent basis.
