SANSONE CAPTURED AT SOMBRA Company Seeks License For Fleet of Buses In London

S. SANSONE CAUGHT IN CORNFIELD

London Youth Who Escaped
From Guelph Jail Again
in Toils.

FOUND AT SOMBRA

Provincial Officers Seeking
Harlton Find Hunted
Prisoner Instead.

Sarnia, Sept. 19.—Sensationally sleeping in a cornfield a mile north of Sombra, Sylvester Sansone, 20, who walked out of the Wellington county jail at Guelph, Wednesday, was captured by Provincial Officer William A. Scott and License Inspector Fred F. Elliott of Sarnia, at mid-night Friday.

Officers had hoped to find Edward Harlton wanted at London for murder of a traffic officer, when they received a call from the St. Clair village Friday night. Civilians who had seen a stranger with a car around the village thought it might be Harlton.

The officers searched the environs of the village for several hours before noting Sansone's car, which had been stolen at Kitchener, parked inside the fence of a cornfield. Lying in the corn they found Sansone and pounced on him. He was unarmed and had no opportunity to give any trouble. Wednesday he walked out of the Guelph jail gates while his attendants had disappeared. He was determined to get some tools. Sansone escaped from Guelph jail where he was awaiting trial on the charge of breaking his parole at the reformatory.

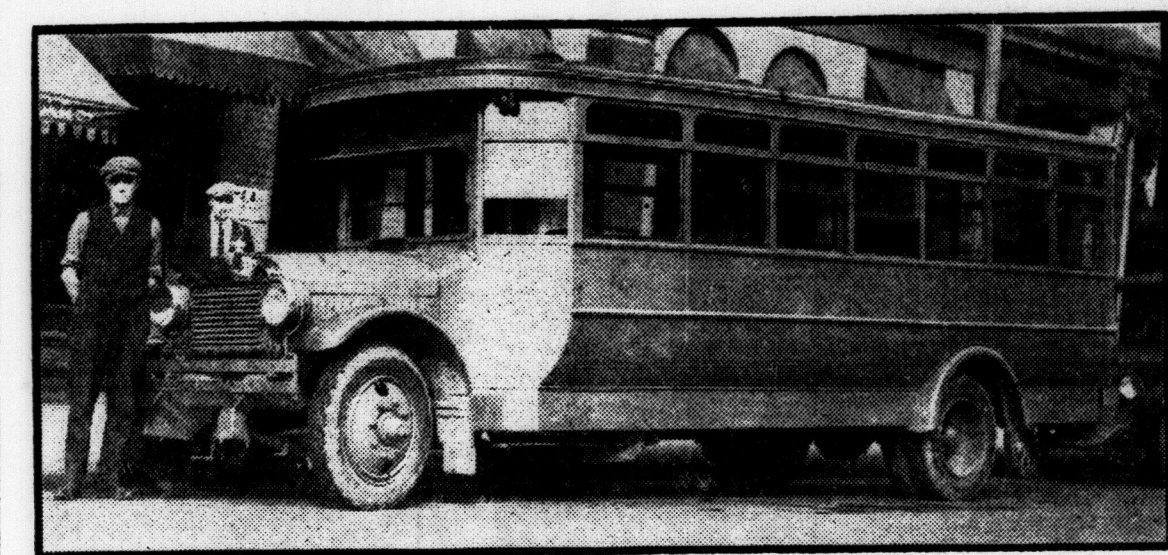

Second Children's Day Brings Crowd of 26,000 To Close Fair In Triumph

Attendance Reaches New Record When Total For Week
Rises to 147,000.

Rising to new heights, Western Fair closed last night with an attendance of 147,000 people for the week. It remained with second Children's Day, with 26,000 people, to contribute the crowd needed on the last day to shatter the previous high record of 142,500 people, made two years ago.

On three counts, besides the attendance, can the 1925 fair lay claim to being the biggest and best show yet seen at Queen's Park—the number and quality of the exhibits in all departments, the approval voiced by the exhibitors with the management of affairs, and, most important of all, the general goodwill of all who attended the fair.

Satisfaction with the Western Fair this year stands out as the predominant and pre-eminent fact after it is all over.

Bigger Next Year.
And that satisfaction is already bearing fruit. The crowds will be back larger than ever next year, the directors believe, and they are seriously considering ways and means of improving the fair for next year.

On the way, definitely so, are the following improvements: New judging arena building, remodeling of the permanent roads throughout the grounds, park benches sufficient to seat thousands of people around the main bandstand, and adequate lavatory accommodation.

The record attendance at the fair this year established the 25-cent admission. Last year the weather was so bad that the lower admission had not a fair chance to prove its worth, since the attendance ran only to 131,000 people.

Probably the most appreciated selection rendered by John Philip Sousa and his band at the arena last night was that which came at the conclusion of the first half of the program. The Old Home Town. In a wild outburst of applause the three thousand or more Londoners who made up the audience unconsciously paid tribute to a London composer, for Wilfrid Traber, 663 Maitland street, wrote and arranged the stirring march.

Woods Creates Big Impression

LEAGUE ASSEMBLY WORK NEAR END

All of Actual Negotiations Are Likely To Be Completed Early Next Week.

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 19.—The sixth assembly of the league of nations seems a fair way to finish work by the end of the coming week. There are two reasons for this belief.

The first is that the sub-committee on disarmament has practically agreed to recommend that the league's "co-ordination committee" go ahead with technical preparations for a disarmament conference. Secondly, the juridical sub-committee has agreed in principle not to interfere with the statutes of the permanent court of international justice so as not to create difficulties for the United States which it is hoped here is on the verge of adhering to that tribunal.

WILL ENLARGE SCHOOLS.

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 18.—At a meeting of the Windsor council's finance committee tonight a debenture issue for \$120,000 was recommended to cover the cost of extensions to Victoria avenue school and to Douglas avenue school. Work will start on the new wings Tuesday, provided the council approves the recommendation at its meeting Monday night.

RIFFIAN SOLDIERS DESERT TO FRENCH

Unconditional Surrender Is Proposed by Delegation of Tribesmen.

Fez, French Morocco, Sept. 17.—Abd-el-Krim's native forces are reported as deserting in wholesale lots to the French army. A delegation of Beni-Zeroual tribesmen today called on General de Chambrun, one of the French commanders, and proposed unconditional surrender providing French troops moved forward into the Beni Zeroual territory to protect the country against reprisals by the rebellious Rifian forces.

The religious frenzy of the Beni Zerouals which caused them to rise against the French in a holy war has subsided, the spokesman of the delegation told General de Chambrun.

The French command is said to have accepted the offer of the emissaries and will advance into the territory of the Beni Zerouals shortly. At dawn today the Moorish rebels against a French outpost at Oued Hamrine, but were driven off by grenades after a short struggle. French aviation units carried out a severe bombardment of the enemy lines on the western section of the central front.

A deserter from Abd-el-Krim's rebel troops who reached the French headquarters today reported that the rebel leader and his brother are surrounded by European soldiers of fortune of various nationalities. These are entrusted with the task of handling machine guns and cannon and with the construction of block-houses and other defensive work to prevent further advance by the French and Spanish troops. The Moors have established a new line in the Djebel Ayas territory in the middle Atlas mountains.

AUSTRALIAN PREMIER ANNOUNCES ELECTION

Labor Leader Says Immigration Act Amendment Will Be Issue.

Melbourne, Australia, Sept. 19.—Via Reuters.—A general election is pending in Australia. Prime Minister Stanley Bruce officially announced last night that parliament would be dissolved when the tariff bill and the supply provisions had been adopted. He was not able to announce the date of the election. Hunter-Charlton, the Labor leader in the house of representatives, also announced that his party will not oppose any bills now on the agenda of the government, but will demand an early election and give the people an opportunity of expressing their views on the recent legislation, especially the amendment to the immigration act, providing for the deportation of persons not of Australian birth who cause labor trouble.

Charlton stated recently that if the Labor party was returned to power at the next general election this amendment would be repealed.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES.

Toronto, Sept. 19.—Commercial failures, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co. for the last week totalled \$9, as compared with \$9 for the corresponding week of last year. This week's failures by provinces were as follows: Quebec, 30; Ontario, 15; British Columbia, 5; Manitoba, 4; Saskatchewan, 2; Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island both had one each.

RAFFLES USES SON IN CRIMES

Dope Addict Admits Entering Drug Store With Help of 8-Year-Old.

REMAINED BY COURT

Harry Kaltenback Believed To Be Responsible For Many Robberies.

Using his eight-year-old son as an accomplice in burglary, Harry Kaltenback, dope addict, admitted to police today that he had entered the drug store of Isaac Wildern, 158 Wortley road, Monday night and had stolen a quantity of cigarettes, cocaine and a bottle of rubbing alcohol.

Kaltenback was arrested last night by Constable Mervyn Coatsworth as he and his son were about to break into a Dundas street drug store in quest of a further dope supply. Kaltenback was remanded for sentence in court this morning.

Constable Coatsworth came upon Kaltenback and his son lying in a clump of bushes in the rear of Sumner's drug store last night. The boy carried a heavy steel jimmy. Kaltenback was brought to police station and there confessed to Detective George Walsh to the Wortley road robbery when confronted with his finger prints which had been reproduced from a pane of glass found the morning after the burglary.

Kaltenback took advantage of his boy's frail physique by prompting him to enter small apertures in broken store windows, which he himself had made, according to Crown Attorney A. M. Judd. In this manner he was gained in court today after he had pleaded guilty to the burglary charge and elected summary trial. "But I wouldn't get my boy in wrong for nothing," he added, taking full responsibility for the theft.

Kaltenback has twice been sent to the reformatory because of his addiction to drugs. He served one term in penitentiary.

There is no hope for you but a long term for sentence in order that you are liable to fourteen years," Kaltenback requested to be sent to the reformatory where he could "get the fresh air and get away from dope." Upon the request of Crown Attorney Judd he was remanded for one week for sentence in order that the other drug store robberies might be investigated by the police.

MANITOBA GOVERNMENT WANTS RATES CHANGED

Immediate Cancellation Will Be Asked at Ottawa Hearing This Month.

Winnipeg, Sept. 19.—Immediate cancellation of the recent order of the board of railway commissioners reducing westbound rates of export grain, will be asked by the Manitoba government at the hearing set for Sept. 29 in Ottawa.

According to information gleaned in government circles, the province will be represented by the order enforcing the judgment of the board should not have been issued until after a general investigation, Manitoba will not send special counsel to the hearing, but will present its case in documentary form.

GERMAN DELEGATION TO CONFERENCE SAILS

Berlin, Sept. 19.—Thirty members and ex-members of the German reichstag, including President or Speaker Paul Loebe, will take part in the twenty-third conference of the inter-parliamentary union. Most of them left Bremen on the steamer Bremen today.

The delegation includes eight members of the Democratic party, eight Socialists, six members of the German People's party, four Catholics or Clericals, and three members of the Bavarian People's party. There are five women in the delegation—two Socialists and one member each from the Bavarian and German People's parties and the Centre party.

Girls Kicked But In Vain

Chicago Doctor Made Them Carry Vaccination Marks on Arms.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Insubordination on a large scale was threatened by girl employees of the health department yesterday when all were ordered vaccinated after it was found a victim of smallpox recently visited the department.

The girls did not object to vaccination. It was the place of vaccination that aroused the trouble. Dr. Herman Spalding, who issued the order, insisted that the girls be vaccinated on the left arm.

The girls maintained this would mean unsightly scars when wearing party dresses, and suggested legs. The doctor refused, on the ground that "present scanty dress invites street dust, often laden with infectious germs," and threatened the girls with suspension. They capitulated, and have sore arms today.

CAMPAIGN OPENED BY LLOYD GEORGE

Former British Premier Aims To Retrieve Fortunes of Liberals.

London, Sept. 19.—Former Premier Lloyd George has embarked upon a "back to the land" campaign which, if it succeeds in attracting the votes of the agricultural areas to the Welshman's banner, may do much to retrieve the ill-starred fortunes of the Liberal party.

Astute political observers, however, believe there is little chance for the new Lloyd George program to be adopted for many years.

Lloyd George launched his campaign Thursday at Kilkenny park, Exeter, where an outdoor audience of 25,000 stood in a drizzle listening intently. He unfolded a new agricultural policy for the Liberal party, the result of the two-year deliberations of the Liberal land committee.

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FRANCHISE REQUEST MAY GO TO PEOPLE IN DECEMBER VOTING

Company Asks Definite License For Fleet of 25 Buses in City.

SIX READY TO START

Plan Is To Operate Big Passenger Vehicles on the Main Arteries of London.

A franchise to operate passenger buses on every main artery in the city of London is sought by a new bus company now in the process of organization. They propose to put into operation a fleet of 25 or 30 buses, operate a regular schedule to all parts of the city and charge a five-cent fare. Already they have made arrangements to secure a half dozen buses which they will put into operation within 10 days' time if a city license is secured next week.

According to aldermen who have studied the bus proposal the company will seek a definite franchise to operate on the streets of London. The people of the city will voice their opinion on the matter in the December elections.

First Service.

South London, Chelsea Green, Ottaway avenue, Ealing and Broughdale will be served by the first fleet of buses, which will be put into operation this season. If city sanction for a franchise follows motor transportation will be provided for all parts of the city.

Aldermanic support has not yet been tested, though several prominent members of the council have been interested. Ald. L. H. Douglass, M.D., Ald. Harry Robinson and ex-Ald. Gordon Drake were amongst those who saw a demonstration run to South London yesterday. A number of London associates. They were impressed with the style of bus and service offered.

"They have the real goods," was the enthusiastic comment of Ald. Douglass. "They have a splendid bus financial backing and facilities for operating a fast service at a nominal rate of fare. This answers the South London demand for service. It answers the paving problem in all parts of the city. It is going to mean rapid, comfortable service at a reasonable fare."

Control Discussed.
Method of council control is now under discussion, and the new bus company will bring its proposals before the finance committee at next Wednesday's meeting.

"We haven't any way of controlling these buses," says the mayor. "All we can give them is a license from year to year. The city will be cluttered up with all sorts of bus lines if we let this thing go on indefinitely. I don't know much about it," professes Ald. Edwin Smith. "I don't see how we can control these buses."

Other members of the council have another theory. Ald. Douglass declares the new company is ready to put its control "in the hands of the council."

Seek Assurance.
"The company wants a definite agreement," he points out. "They don't want to be ordered off."

FORKE PREDICTS STRONGER GROUP

Progressive Leader Announces His Decision to Assume More Aggressive Tactics.

Pipstone, Man., Sept. 19.—"The Progressive party will be returned at Ottawa with a united front," said Robert Forke, Progressive leader, in an interview with the Canadian Press here yesterday. "There is no break in the Progressive party," said Mr. Forke. "On the contrary, the group will be more effective and efficient when it returns to the next parliament because of the experiences of the last four sessions."

"Personally I am determined to take a more aggressive attitude than ever on matters of progressive policy. The party is entering the campaign with confidence and courage."

Mr. Forke will speak at a series of nominating conventions in Manitoba commencing at Shoal Lake on Sept. 23 and continuing almost daily until Oct. 1, at Selkirk. Mr. Forke will then spend several days in his own constituency of Brandon before going to Saskatchewan, where he will address a series of meetings.

FOUR-CORNERED FIGHT.

Winnipeg, Sept. 19.—A four-cornered fight in the federal election in North Winnipeg, between the Liberals, Conservatives and representatives of two Labor parties, became certain last night, when the North Winnipeg branch, Independent Labor Party, and the Winnipeg branch of the Canadian Labor Party each nominated a representative to stand for the seat.

Alderman A. Heaps was the unanimous choice of the Independent Labor Party, and H. M. Bartholomew was chosen by the Canadian Labor Party.

SITUATION IN SYRIA GROWS PRECARIOUS

Display of French Forces Fails To Quell the Druse Tribesmen.

Beirut, Syria, Sept. 18.—The Jebel Druse tribesmen, undaunted by the display of forces being gathered under General Gamelin in preparation for a march to the relief of Suedia, struck another blow at the French yesterday by a surprise attack against Mousseiere, 15 miles southwest of Suedia, where the French garrison had been beleaguered 42 days.

There have also been raids reported, conducted by Druses and Bedouins in the Ghazouie district, about 12 miles south of Damascus.

The correspondent of Le Temps in Syria admits that the situation is precarious, and asserts that unless Suedia is relieved within a few days the garrison may be forced to surrender owing to lack of food.

TIME LOSS IN STRIKES SHOWS BIG DECREASE

Ottawa, Sept. 19.—The time loss caused by industrial disputes was less in August, than in the previous month or in August last year, says the federal department of labor Gazette. Seventeen disputes were in progress at some time during the month, involving 13,063 employees and resulting in a time loss of 102,515 working days. Corresponding figures for July were as follows: Sixteen disputes, involving 12,882 working people and 320,443 working days; and for August 1924, 16 disputes, 9,472 employees, 206,118 working days.
