The butter and egg dealers of the

A meeting of the Finance Committee  
of the City Council was held yester-  
day afternoon in the office of City  
Solicitor Meredith, when the by-law  
embodying the agreement between the

was gone over and approved. It will  
be presented at the special Council  
meeting this evening.

bearer and the bank is relieved.

## RESIDENTS IN THE NORTH INDIGNANT

Much Needed Sewer Still in  
Dim Future

Conditions North of Grosvenor  
Street Quite Unsanitary

Largely Signed Petition Apparent-  
ly Disregarded

Citizens residing on Richmond street  
north are highly indignant at the de-  
lay in City Hall circles in putting  
down the sewer for which they peti-  
tioned. Residents north of Grosvenor  
street are especially interested in the  
fact that nothing seems to be on the  
taps to relieve the hardships under  
which they are laboring. A sewer is  
being put down as far as Grosve-  
nor street, but north of there, things  
are apparently being left much as they  
were before.

It is a shame the way in which  
our interests are being neglected," re-  
marked one man who has large prop-  
erty holdings in that portion of the  
city. "Why they have stopped the  
sewer, connecting with Grosvenor street  
is beyond me, and I think it is up to  
Mayor Beck to see that the sewer is  
extended a good bit past his place.  
The petition was largely signed and  
has been in long enough for the sewer  
to have been put down a couple of  
times over, had the authorities been in  
earnest in the matter. There will be  
trouble for some one unless something  
is done mighty quick."

This gentleman, in continuing, pointed  
out that a good deal of sickness  
had been caused in that vicinity  
through nothing else than the poor  
sewerage facilities. He made the claim  
that the sewerage from the Aged  
People's Home was especially prolific  
of trouble for those who lived near by.

"The smell is terrible when the wind  
is in the right direction," he remarked,  
and went on to say that one man near  
him had fever in his house to such  
an extent that for several weeks he  
had been unable to eat a meal in his  
own home. Another family of five  
well all down with the typhoid fever,  
and in fact things were in anything  
but a sanitary condition, and all due  
to the lack of a proper sewer.

The statement is made that public  
school grounds near the Aged People's  
Home are becoming infected by the  
unsanitary conditions, and one man  
has already communicated the facts  
in the matter to the Minister of Edu-  
cation with the hope that provincial  
intervention may eventually result in  
redress. Failing this, the whole  
question will be taken to the Provin-  
cial Board of Health, so it is said.

**TO IMPROVE FIRE  
ALARM SYSTEM**

Rowing Recommended by  
Committee

Lessons Learned From Big Fire  
at Toronto

Damage to Sidewalks by Circus  
Wagons

Matters connected with the fire de-  
partment occupied a considerable  
amount of attention at the meeting of  
No. 3 Committee last night.

Fire Chief Clark reported that there  
had been considerable trouble with  
the fire alarm system, but "everything  
was righted last night." He had  
spent about five days, along with Man-  
ager Richmond, of the Bell Telephone  
Company, in examining the wires. He  
was informed that the average age of  
the Bell wires was ten years, and the  
fire alarm wires were now twenty  
years old. He also thought it was un-  
desirable to have the wires run in  
connection with the telephone and trol-  
ley wires.

On the motion of Ald. Garrett it was  
resolved to ask the local electric com-  
panies for tenders for rewiring the  
system.

Fireman Swanwick, who was badly  
injured at the Stirling fire, requested  
that he be given some light duties  
during the fire, until he is fully  
recovered. It was voted, "yes," how-  
ever, that if Fireman Swanwick is al-  
lowed to work around the fire hall, the  
insurance money he now receives,  
would cease, and the department would  
be further burdened, and it was stated  
that the insurance expires on the 6th  
of July.

On the motion of Ald. Greenlees, it  
was resolved to take no action in the  
matter.

It was resolved to instruct the fire  
chief to get prices for hose-pipe cou-  
plings from firms in the city, to suit  
the threads on the couplings in use  
at St. Mary's Street. Ald. Garrett  
Chatham, Hamilton and Toronto, all  
of which places have fire engines.

This is in accordance with the sug-  
gestion of Mayor Beck, who pointed  
out that at the big Toronto fire, the  
threads of the couplings of the brig-  
ades who had come to assist, did not  
fit the Toronto hydrants, thus in each  
case rendering the hose useless.

A discussion took place as to the  
flooring of the bathroom at the fire  
hall. A tender was received for tiling  
the floors, but this was considered  
much too expensive, and on the mo-  
tion of Ald. Greenlees it was resolved  
to ask the chairman and Ald. Garrett  
to get prices for a good cement floor.

Regarding the recent visit of  
Ringling's circus to the city, Ald. Mat-  
thews said that about fifteen feet of  
the sidewalk had been destroyed on  
Rectory street.

It was resolved, on the motion of  
Ald. Garrett, that Inspector McCul-  
len be authorized to warn the circus  
managers that if the sidewalks are dam-  
aged they will be prosecuted. Ald.  
Garrett jokingly suggested that if the  
circus men refused to make good any  
damage, the whole show would be  
seized.

This was considered rather a large  
order, and it was suggested that the  
seizure of a lion or an elephant might  
make up for any loss sustained by  
the city.

It was reported that the amount  
collected for licenses to this date, since  
first January, was \$1,118.

How to Obtain the Real Benefit of a

fect rest. The British Empire Minis-  
ter answered it in his own way by simply  
eschewing his usual work. There is  
a great deal in the thought and ac-  
tion of dropping the harness and simply  
browsing.

Leisure means deliberation. To  
strain of hurry is, after all, at the  
bottom most of our tired. The stress  
of our life of the American people is  
of the fact, however, that the aver-  
age man and boy carry the same  
strain into their play. The weak school  
boy will start on an exhausting tramp  
enter tennis lists without training  
play football, run long races, row long  
matches and in the end return to his  
work more exhausted by far than  
he had remained at home.

The learned specialist in his advice  
to intellectual workers strikes at the  
root of the matter when he advocates  
plenty of sleep. It is "nature's sweet-  
restorer," that as surely relieves ten-  
sion as loosening the string of the  
spent bow. But the average man has  
such a fear of being considered la-  
sypathetic or indifferent that he must  
needs even in his recreation be  
ways up and doing.

Recreation also in its wider  
implies change of routine, altera-  
tion of habits, diversion of purpose. The  
tired plodder must virtually trans-  
fer all her compensations for fire,  
and offset the stress of business  
relaxation and indolence.
