It is Taken for Granted that the United States will Aid to Put Down the Conspirators—Speculating on Their Objects.

London, July 26.—The British press, irrespective of politics, agree in the belief that England can rely on the good faith of America to prevent a renewal of the attempt of the conspirators against the British government.

The Manchester Guardian says: America will doubtless omit no effort within its capacity to discharge its obligations not only towards international fellowship but to the common interest of humanity. The difficulty is to see what more America can do to prevent infernal machines from being shipped than England to prevent their landing. The same journal doubts the wisdom of asking federal or state authorities to put a check on the safety valve supplied by the vaporings of the Fenian press.

The Standard thinks the American police could surely by this time have discovered something as to who shipped the infernal machines. Public opinion, it says, will demand full enquiry, and we are sure the American government will consistently with its own municipal law show every desire to help us. We hope due diligence will now bear the same interpretation as in the Alabama case. We demand no damages, we only ask for friendly aid in checking an infamous conspiracy.
