Articles du Luxe. me very interesting particulars reing the home industries of Egypt are n in a recent report which the Austrian sul at Cairo made to his governmen

consul at Cairo made to his government. The greater part of the goods manufactured find a sale principally among tourists and foreigners visiting the country.

Speaking generally the Egyptian industries of to-day may be divided into three groups: The minor or "house" industry, agriculture and the factory industry. Of the first group one of the oldest is the ceramic industry, which is carried on in pottery works on the riversides in Cairo, Alexandria and Rosetta. The chief articles of this class produced are the porous bottleshaped vessels and bulging refrigerators known by the name of Alkaraza, as well as filters known as Sir, the latter chiefly made at Keneh. The finer classes of goods, such as ornamental vases, lamps and ornamental articles generally, come from Assiout and Upper Egypt.

The wood industry, besides employing a large number of joiners engaged in producing ordinary European furniture, includes also some establishments in Cairo and Alexalso some establishments in Cairo and Alex-andria, where art furniture in the Arabian style is turned out. Lightning and Trees. Dr. D. Jonesco has compiled statistics oncerning trees which are struck by ning, and arrives at some interesting conclusions, which are given in the last issue of The Electrical World. It has been supposed for a long time that certain kinds of trees are particularly subject to destruction by lightning, while others are quite free from danger. Among the first in the case and among the latter. others are quite free from danger. Among the first is the oak, and among the latter the laurel. An investigation of this statement led that writer to the following conclusions: "At very high potential electrical discharges all kinds of trees may be subject to destruction from lightning. Trees containing oils are less subject to be struck, those containing very much oil being protected the most. Lightning appears to prefer those trees which contain oil to a slight degree, only in summer. The quantity of water contained in the tree has no effect on their liability to being struck. Dead limbs of trees of those containing oil, are particularly subject to being struck. Cambium, bark and leaves do not alter the conductivity of trees. The alter the conductivity of trees. The nature of the soil has no connection with the frequency of destruction of the trees by lightning."
