FOR The Hospital for Sick Children COLLEGE ST. TORONTO

Dear Mr. Editor:-Thanks for your kindness in allow-Thanks for your kindness in allowing me the privilege of appealing at this Christmas time on behalf of the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto. It would take more space than you can spare to tell of the good work done for the sick and deformed children of this Province. Let me, however, in a few words, tell you of the progress of the work of the Hospital.

One purse six little white beds. a

One nurse, six little white beds, a few dollars, a few friends—this was the beginning. The beds have grown to 250, the dollars to thousands, the friends to hundreds. 1875, the first year, 44 in-patients, 67 out-patients; 1913, last year, 1,648 in-patients, 25,507 out-patients; 1875, 1 nurse; 1913, 70 nurses.

nurses.
Since 1875, thirty-eight years ago, the Hospital has admitted within its walls 21,018 children as in-patients, and 159,231 as out-patients, a total of 180,249, or an average of 4,743 per year. Of the 21,018 in-patients, 15,200 were from Toronto, and 5,818, from other parts of the Province; 10,150 of the total in-patients were cured, and the total in-patients were cured, and

the total in-patients were cured, and 6,367 were improved. In the Orthopedic Department last year, of the 1,648 in-patients, 278 were treated for deformities, 25 hip disease, 37 Pott's disease, 2 knock-knees, 19 bow-legs, 62 club feet, 8 lateral curvature of the spine, 44 infantile paralysis, 6 wry neck, and 75 tubercular disease of knee, hip and ankle. In 1913, the of knee, hip and ankle. In 1913, the Surgical Apparatus Shop manufactured 427 appliances for in-patients and outpatients, including ankle braces, spinal braces, hip splints, bow-leg splints, club-faet splints, plaster jackets, etc. In this Department in 38 years nearly 800 boys and girls have been treated for Club Feet and 650 corrected. Half of these came from places outside of Toronto. Surely we have a

this Province.

#### THE HYU. AULIC RAM.

Simplest and Best Device For Raising Water by Water Power.

Water by Water Power.

To most people a hydraulic ram is a mystery. As a matter of fact, it is the most simple and efficient mechanical device for raising water by water power. This is probably what makes it seem so mysterious to those who have never seen a ram at work. Hydraulic rams are not only adaptable for pumping water for household purposes, but they can be used for delivering large quantities of water for irrigation, town waterworks, railroad tanks, etc. Where the least possible expense must be incurred for pumping water for any of these purposes. ing water for any of these purposes, there is naturally a great demand for rams. This apples particularly to irrigation, as it enables the farmer to raise corps at a minimum cost per

Hydraulic rams can derive the Hydraulic rams can derive the power for operating them from a spring, brook, flewing artesian well or river, and if the ram can be located at such a point that a constant stream of water can be supplied to it through a pipe having an incline fall of three or more feet in a given distance, the conditions being such that the power water which escapes at the ram can be drained away, it is possible for the ram to deliver a at the ram can be drained away, it is possible for the ram to deliver a steady stream of water to a point at an elevation thirty times the difference between the levels of the ram and the water supply. This stream of water, once started flowing, will continue without interruption, day and night, winter and summer, requiring no attention nor expense except for the renewal of rubber valves on the ram once every year or two. This is

ram once every year or two. This is a trifling expense, as the valves cost but little.

The efficiency of a ram can be very great, reaching under favorable conditions 80 per cent. or more. This means that the ram will pump more water to the same height than any water to the same height than any other kind of engine which pumps water by means of water power. The amount of water that may be

pumped per day by such a ram is remarkable. It will pump as much as a quarter of a million gallons a day. If a delivery of two million gallons a day is required, a "battery" of rams can be installed—that is, two or more

rams are placed side by side.

Where pneumatic pressure tanks are used instead of gravity tanks, rams will not only supply the water, but also maintain the air pressure up to 100 pounds, as may be desired.
