Poultry is a Sideline

Prof. Creelman, of Ontario's Agricultural College, says the Great Possibilities of Poultry Raising on the Farm is not Fully Appreciated. An Intelligently Managed Flock Paying Branch of Farm Work.

Do the farmers who constantly complain that there is not a branch of farming but which carries grave feasts of failure from natural conditions ever contemplate the poultry business and its possibilities? If a town or city resident can make a good thing out of chickens, often paying high rent or purchasing a few acres exclusively for the business and buying everything for his fowls, do they not see that they have at their fingertips the best possible paying proposition as an auxiliary to their farming interests? Farmers have no extra expense as regards rent, and they can easily put up a set of hen houses at little cost. They have also a lot of grain not of first class quality, but excellent for chickens. There is no doubt but that if the average farmer only realized the money to be made out of poultry he would soon get to work to keep a flock of two hundred or more. The idea of keeping twenty or thirty chickens, as the majority of farmers do, running semi-wild all over the place may have been all right in the past when eggs sold for eight and nine cents, and young fowl at twenty-five cents a pair, but the population of this country is increasing so rapidly, that the demand for eggs and chickens is increasing so rapidly that the average farmer will reap a harvest within the next few years. The thrifty farmer will get to work and build another chicken house and stock it with some early hatched pullets from a good laying strain. If managed right, the pullets will have paid for themselves by spring. The present possibilities of poultry raising were emphasized by President Creelman of the Ontario Agricultural College, in a recent address at Campbellford, Ont. He was of the opinion, he said, that the profits that could be made from an ordinary flock of from fifty to one hundred hens such as the average farm could support were not appreciated generally. Those who had given this branch of farm work as much attention as dairy ing or any of the other departments of the farm had reaped good reward. Intelligent management was necessary he said, but that is also necessary in any line of work.—Canada Farmer.

The appropriation for rivers and harbors in Nova Scotia aggregate \$445,075, of which \$233,925 is devoted. The principal places to be benefited in Western Nova Scotia are: Yarmouth Harbor improvements, \$100,000. Annapolis ice piers, \$25,500. Anderson's Cove breakwater extension, \$3,000. Brooklyn (Queen's) breakwater, \$50,000. Cape Negro, Swain's Cove wharf, \$1,500. Centreville, C. S. L. wharf, \$1,200. Delap's Cove, harbor improvements, \$1,300. Digby Harbor, improvements and repairs and additions to pier \$8,700. Ed Brook wharf, \$1,200. Litchfield, extension to breakwater, \$2,400. Margaretville, repairs to breakwater, \$2,000. Meteghan, restore and extension wharf, \$13,000. Parker's Cove, breakwater extension and repairs, \$2,100. Phinney's Cove, extension of breakwater, \$2,400. Port Lorne, repairs to breakwater, \$1,000. Salmon River, harbor protection works, \$1,000. Stony Island, repair breakwater and construction work, \$3,400. Wedgeport wharf, restoration and extension \$1,750. Woods Harbor, completion of breakwater at Bell's Point, \$1,800.


KING'S CHAPLAIN DISROBED.
