The eleven remaining cases of continued fevers in the Hospital at the end of the last month, seem to have been rather varying towards a Typhoid Type; and the 33 cases admitted during the present month, were decidedly that Typhus characterised, by authors by the name *Mitior*.

Michael Hays died of Pulmonic affection, he had been a convalescent of the fever and sent under a tent, in order to avoid the danger of a relapse, and in one of these extraordinary cold and wet nights of the month he caught a fatal cold.

Michael McDonought was almost dying when admitted, and so was John Handly. General bleeding and thoroughly clearing, the *primæ viæ* were the usual preliminary course of treatment. Tartar emetic and calomel, ($\frac{1}{4}$ of a grain of the former with two or three grains of the latter every 3 hours) have been chiefly employed for the cure; limonade, plenty of diluting drink, cleanliness and ventilation generally completed it.
